During the month there were forty inspections made. Six papers served on persons having nuisances on their property, and as a result, there were privys abated, one slaughter abated, three alleys cleaned, tour three barnyards cleaned, and twentyseven other nuisances abated.

As to the health of the city: Your Board has to report an epidemic of measles in the city, which has been very mild and as yet no deaths from that cause.

The deaths in the city for the month of May number fourteen, and from the following causes; 1 Cystitis and Neph. ritis; 2 Pneumonia, 1 Chronic Alcoholism, 1 Inflammatory Rheumatism, 1 Shock after eperation for Ovarian Tumor, 2 Consumption, 2 Apoplexy, 1 Meningitis, 1 Suicide, 1 Old age.

Your Board would respectfully ask the Council to instruct the Board of Public works to have the property occupied by Charles Zuern as a butcher shop on E. Washington-st connected with the sewer, as it is impossible to keep that property in a sanitary condition as it is.
