STREET GRADE RESOLUTION.

By Ald. Burg:

Whereas, in the opinion of the Council the grade on Jackson avenue ought to be changed and fixed and established to the end that such street may be made suitable for public travel and traffic, therefore

Gentlemen—On behalf of the Board of Health the following report is submitted:

The entire board, this forenoon, made a circuit of inspection, visiting such alleyways, rubbish heaps and dumping places as are likely to be in an unsanitary condition. Personal advice was given to many and formal orders for removal of garbage were sent to others. A hundred inspections were probably made.

The board would respectfully submit that the city take such measures itself as is necessary to make good drainage in the several alleys of the city and have all the catch basins that already exist in such alleys thoroughly cleaned and flushed before the warm weather of the summer comes on. This will encourage those who have abutting property upon by-streets and alleys in keeping their premises in good condition. Repaving and drainage is sadly needed in some of the alleys located in the central part of the city.

Whereas, on the 27th day of May last a franchise was granted by the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor to William A. Boland, his successors and assigns, granting him, among other things, the right to enter the city of Ann Arbor with his electric road by private right of way from Dexter avenue, crossing Chapin street and the tracks of the Ann Arbor railroad by overhead bridge, entering Ann

street at the foot of said street, running thence east along said Ann street to Ashley street, thence south on Ashley street to Huron street, and east on Huron street to Fifth avenue, and

Whereas, said Boland intends to begin work upon his said road at a very early day, and

Whereas, said Boland has applied to the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor to fix and locate the position in each of said streets where he shall be permitted to lay his said tracks; and

Whereas, it is important that the Common Council shall act at once in relation to said matter; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That said Boland shall be permitted to lay his tracks from where he strikes Ann street east along the center of Ann street to the corner of Ann and Ashley streets, thence south along the center of Ashley street to Huron street, thence east along the center of Huron street to Fifth avenue; and that the city of Ann Arbor hereby reserves the right to hereafter establish and locate the position of the tracks of said Boland road, so-called, over and along the balance of the streets mentioned in said franchise at such position as shall hereafter be designated by the Common Council of said city.

Ald. Hamilton moved that Mr. Boland be given the middle of the road on Ashley and Ann streets.

Ald. Brown moved as a substitute that the matter be referred to the street committee.

Carried.

By Ald. Coon:

Whereas, This Common Council having heretofore ordered a certain public alley to be laid out and established within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor, running north and south through block three, south of Huron

street, range four east, according to the plat of the village (now city) of Ann Arbor, and having found and declared the said public alley to be a necessary public improvement and the right of way for such alley having been acquired and all damage occasioned thereby having been fixed and determined in condemnation proceedings in the circuit court for the county of Washtenaw, and the said proceedings having been certified to this Common Council; and

Whereas, The damage occasioned by the establishment of such public alley and awarded in such condemnation proceeding has hertofore been ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situate in the special assessment district fixed and designated by this Common Council, as follows, to wit: All of the lots, parts of lots, land, tenements and premises situate and being in block number three, south of Huron street, range four east, according to the plat of the village (now city) of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and as a tax against the owners or occupants of the lands, tenements and premises situate therein, and this Common Council having duly ordered that the cost of the completion of such public alley other than the sums of money so awarded in such condemnation proceedings shall be a charge against the street fund; and all steps and proceedings in the premises preliminary to laying out, establishing and opening such public alley having been duly taken, therefore it is hereby

Resolved, That it is expedient and desirable that said public alley be opened to the public use immediately.

Therefore, The Board of Public Works is hereby ordered and directed to cause such public alley to be opened and made fit for public travel and use. It is further ordered that the property owners whose lands have been condemned for the right of way of said

alley be required to remove all fences, barns, outbuildings, or other obstructions of every kind and nature located on such portions of their lands as have been condemned for the right of way of said public alley, within thirty days after service upon them of a copy of this resolution and order, duly certified by the City Clerk; and in case of default therein on the part of such property owners, the Board of Public Works is hereby directed to sell all such fences, barns, outhouses, buildings or other obstructions of every kind and nature at public sale to the highest bidder, the purchaser or purchasers to remove such fences, barns, outhouses, buildings, or other obstructions from the bounds of said public alley forthwith; due notice of such sale to be given by advertisement of such sale for a period of at least ten days prior thereto, the proceeds of such sale to be applied in accordance with the statute in such case made and provided; provided, however, that such sale shall not take place or said premises be taken possession of by said Board of Public Works until it shall appear by the certificate of the City Treasurer, duly verified by his oath, that the sum of twenty-eight hundred and ninety-seven dollars, being the sum awarded by the jury in such condemnation proceedings, is actually in the treasury for such purpose.
