Huron, Felch streets and Miller avenue for a distance of twenty feet on either side of the center of its main track, and block the passage of said streets respectively from July 5th, 1903, to September 1st, 1903, and to fill Liberty, First and William streets and obstruct the public travel on such streets from September 1st, 1903, to October 1st, 1903.
