To the Honorable the Common Coun-
cil.

Gentlemen:—I am returning to your
honorable body so much of the pro-
ceedings of your last regular meet-
ing as is included in the resolution
relative to the Broadway bridge.

My principle reason for this action
is the lack of available funds with
which to carry on the work,—besides
the necessary expenditures on our
streets for this year will be unusually
large for the reason that we are go-
ing to be obliged to rebuild a number
of our culverts, and I am informed by
the President of the Board of Public
Works that this is absolutely neces-
sary in order to avoid future dam-
age claims against the city should we
have an unusual stormy season.

While the raising of this bridge
would improve the street in many
ways, there are so many other more
important improvements to be made
in the city that I deem it my duty
to disapprove of the resolution at this
time.
