

Council Chamber. Ann, Arbor, Mich., July 6, 1908. (Regular session).

Meeting called to order by Clerk. Ald. Manwaring called to chair.

Minutes of previous meeting approved.

Communication from the Mayor.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:—I herewith return my approval to that part of your proceedings of June 15 included in the resolution providing for a monthly test of the water pressure in the hydrants about the court house and those at the university campus. The most serious objection to this plan, it appears to me, is the fact that once a month during several hours of the day, while the tests are being made, the fire department will be practically out of commission so far as the proper work of the department is concerned. These tests would require practically the entire department to carry them out, as I understand the resolution, thus leaving the department for the time being unmanned for regular duty. Such a condition would be dangerous and for which neither you nor I would care to assume the responsibility. To properly carry on these tests, therefore, it would necessitate the employment of an additional force of firemen to serve either at the tests or at the department during the tests. This extra force would add materially to the cost of the department and at a time when the funds are scarcely adequate to meet the fixed expenses and other most pressing needs. Again it does not appear to me to be at all necessary in order to determine the pressure at any hydrant in the city to resort to this expensive and possibly dangerous method. In the department building and also in the office of the Water company there is a water gauge which shows at all times what the pressure is, by a simple calculation as to the elevation of any hydrant compared with the elevation of the department building where the gauge is located the pressure at any given hydrant is obtained. A few years ago such an investigation was made and the pressure indicated by gauge was found to be accurate, the actual pressure shown by the stream thrown agreeing with the indicated pressure of the gauge. It might pos-

sibly be well to make such a test occasionally if it be considered necessary to ascertain the accuracy of the gauge, but to do this once a month would seem to be unnecessary. The only possible advantage in such a test as is proposed by the resolution is to determine whether the hydrants are in proper working order and such a test the Water company is required to make periodically. At these tests or flushing of the hydrants members of the fire department are always present, or may be, and thus the city's interests would seem to be properly and adequately safeguarded. I am informed by Chief Andrews that after a careful observation of the pressure at the department building and his experience at fires, together with the added efficiency known to be secured by the new engine, he considers Ann Arbor's fire protection fully equal, if not superior, to other cities of her class as shown by such information as is obtainable on the subject. In view of the facts, I do not feel that the proposed tests are at all essential to our safety in the matter of proper fire protection and therefore a needless labor and expense.
