Ann Arbor Fire Department,

April 1st, 1909.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners:

Gentlemen— I herewith submit the 20th annual report of Fire Department for the year ending March 31, 1909.

#### Apparatus in Service.

Station No. 1 Engine Co.—One second size Nott steam fire engine, complete in every respect, drawn by two horses.

Station No. 1, Hose Co. No. 1—Hose wagon, 1000 feet 2½ in. cotton rubber lined hose, 3 shut off pipes, 1 Eastman set 1 two way Siamese, 4 hose holders, 4 spanners, 4 coats, 1 axe, 1 car, 2 lanterns, 2 hyd. wrenches, 15 ft. ext. ladder, 2 3-gal. chem, 2 extra charges, medicine chest. Drawn by two horses.

Station No. 1 Truck Co.—One American La France aerial truck, 65 ft. aerial ladder, 40 ft. ext. ladder, 30 ft.

24 ft, 20 ft. 16 ft. 12 ft. roof, 2 pike poles, 4 axes, 1 wall pick, 1 plaster hook, 2 bars, 1 door opener, 1 tin roof cutter, 4 lanterns, 2 6-gal. and 2 3-gal. chem., 1 fork, life net, belts, rope, etc., 1 wire cutter, 6 spanners, 6 coats, 6 hose holders, medicine chest, all necessary tools and wrenches. Drawn by 3 horses.

Station No. 1, Chief's Wagon—Used for chimney and grass fires, inspecting buildings and schools, locating hydrants, etc., also making the extra horse for sickness and for horses getting shol.
