

Council Chamber, Ann Arbor, Mich., July 17th, 1911.—Regular Session.

Meeting called to order by Pres. Mills. Present: Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Ramsay, Murray, Lutz, Lindenschmitt, O'Connor, Pres. Mills, 14. Absent: Ald. Schmid, 1. Minutes of previous meeting approved.

Mrs. Armstrong and Mr. Carr of the School Board, presented a proposition to locate a branch library in down town district.

Moved by Ald. Sweet: That a committee of three be appointed by the chair to investigate proposed library matter. Adopted and Ald. Sweet, Manwaring and Lindenschmitt appointed.

Communications.

Office of the Health Officer, Ann Arbor, July 17, 1911.

To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen:— In so far as possible, the Board of Health has tried to carry on its work without disturbing your honorable body. Conditions have arrived, however, which necessitate our coming to you for financial assistance in performing our duties as outlined by law.

The state laws require among other things, that thorough fumigation be carried out following recovery or death from contagious diseases. This has been carried out in all cases. The board of health has supervised the work and the individual or county has paid for the necessary materials. At the last meeting of the board of Auditors, however, under advice of the Prosecuting Attorney, this board disallowed bills for fumigating materials, on the ground that the city should pay for them.

The county has also previously paid bills for laboratory diagnostic bills, such as examinations of sputum for tuberculosis, throat cultures for diphtheria, blood for typhoid, etc. The Auditors now hold that the city should pay for these services.

At the present time the city pays for milk analysis. All this work should be in charge of one man, at a stated salary per year.

The Board of Health or Health Officer, should be empowered to appoint a city bacteriologist, who for a stipulated sum, would do all ordinary bacteriological and chemical work required.

Other cities usually have to pay rather large salaries for such work,

but for the first year, at least, it would seem that in Ann Arbor we could get some one to do the work for 25 or thirty dollars a month.

Failing of such an action by the Common Council, necessary work will have to be continued as before, and charged up piece meal to the city. In this case I fear that the aggregate bills for examinations will be in excess of the sum required to pay the small salary suggested.

The Health Department really should have a separate committee of its own in council, together with a distinct fund.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Driving of Automobiles, Motor Vehicles and other Vehicles Within the City of Ann Arbor," which was given its first reading by title and passed to and given its second reading by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Ramsay, Murray, Lutz, Lindenschmitt, O'Connor, Pres. Mills, 14. Nays, none.

Ald. Manwaring moved that the foregoing ordinance be referred to the Ordinance committee. Adopted as follows: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Ramsay, Murray, Lutz, Lindenschmitt, O'Connor, Pres. Mills, 14. Nays, none.

Ald. Manwaring presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading:

An Ordinance Relative to Garbage, to Regulate the Collection Thereof, and to Prohibit the Keeping of Hogs and Hog-pens within the Limits of the City of Ann Arbor.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That from and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep in, on or about the premises owned or occupied by them, any garbage or decaying vegetable matter whatever or any swill from the house or any substance which may be injurious to the public health, unless the same is kept in a close covered can furnished by the licensed garbage collector.

Section 2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to carry, cart or convey along or through the public streets of the city, any garbage or decaying vegetable matter whatever, or any swill from any house or building in said city, or any substance commonly known as garbage, unless said person is licensed by the city and unless the same is carried, carted or conveyed in close covered cans as provided in this ordinance.

Section 3. For the purpose of this ordinance the word "Garbage" shall be held to include every refuse accumulation of animal, fruit or vegetable matter that attends the preparation, use, cooking, dealing in or storing of meats, fish, fowl, birds, fruit or vegetables; it shall also be held to include kitchen and table refuse of every kind excepting dish water or waste water; or liquids of any kind which in freezing would destroy the garbage cans and excepting any poisonous medicines or glass. If any material should be put in garbage cans other than as specified under the head of garbage, the collector will refuse to take the contents and the same must be disposed of by the householder without delay. Refuse means all rubbish and refuse incident to the ordinary conduct of the household, including ashes, bottles, broken bottles, glass, tinware, crockery, cans and other broken utensils.

Section 4. No garbage shall hereafter be burned on any street, alley, common or public place within the limits of said city; nor shall any person place garbage upon any private property whether owned by such person or not, unless the same shall be enclosed in proper cans as provided in this ordinance.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to throw or deposit or cause to be thrown or deposited, any garbage or refuse upon any private property, street, alley, gutter, sidewalk, or public grounds in said city, or in or along the Huron river, or any of the creeks within the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor.

Section 6. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to throw or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited, the contents of any out-house, privy or vault upon any private property within the limits of the city nor shall the contents of any out-house,

privy or vault be buried within the limits of the city without the written consent of the Board of Health.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of every tenant, lessee or occupant of any dwelling house, boarding house, hotel, restaurant and place of business of any kind having garbage to be disposed of to place in cans furnished by the licensed garbage collector, all the garbage that may accumulate between the times of the collection thereof as the same shall be fixed by the Common Council. Such cans shall be placed in such places as shall be readily accessible at all times for purpose of removing or emptying same (upon the line of an alley whenever possible or convenient) and where said cans or cans shall not be a public nuisance in any respect, or be placed in the limits of any street or alley. Nothing but garbage, as defined in this ordinance, shall be placed in such cans.

Section 8. It shall be lawful for the Common Council to license one or more persons, giving to such person or persons the right to take, carry away and dispose of all garbage and refuse matter taken from the houses, hotels and other buildings in the city of Ann Arbor, and after any such person or persons have been so licensed, to carry, cart or convey upon or along any of the public streets of the city any of the substances hereinbefore referred to; no unlicensed person shall engage in the work; provided, the same may be so carried, carted or conveyed only by the owner or occupant of the building or premises from which the same was taken, and then only in the kind of cans herein-after referred to, and otherwise complying in all things with this ordinance.

Section 9. Each person or corporation applying for a license under the provisions of this ordinance shall file with the City Clerk a proposal in writing, giving the charges which they expect to make therefor, which charges shall not exceed fifty (50) cents per month per can for garbage and they shall file at the same time with the city clerk a bond in the sum of \$500 with at least two good and sufficient sureties, conditioned that they will perform the work required of them by the provisions of this ordinance, and that all garbage removed by them shall be carried only in close covered cans and as aforesaid; that such cans be-

fore being used shall be submitted to and approved by the Board of Health, and that they will be personally liable for any and all damages caused by them in or about the performance of the duties pertaining to the work for which said license is issued. Each application shall be accompanied by a fee of \$25 which shall be in payment for the license for a period of one year from the date of issue thereof, but such fee shall be returned to persons not receiving a license.

Section 10. If such application shall be approved by the Common Council, it shall direct the clerk to issue a license for the purpose herein contemplated. The common council may at any time revoke any license for cause at any regular meeting.

Section 11. The collection and disposition of such garbage, when collected by the licensee, shall be wholly within the direction and authority of the board of health of the city of Ann Arbor, which Board shall make all necessary rules and regulations upon the subject, subject to the approval of the common council, and such rules and regulations when made and so approved, shall be published and issued to each householder, shall become and are hereby made part of this ordinance, and anyone violating such rules and regulations shall be amenable as in this ordinance ordained. Garbage shall be collected at least twice each week.

Section 12. Said City of Ann Arbor may contract for the removal and disposal of said garbage and in doing so may divide the city into districts, if it appears expedient or desirable to do so, and may enter into separate contracts for each district. The letting of such contract, or contracts, may be referred to the City Clerk and in such case it shall be the duty of said City Clerk to advertise for bids for collecting and disposing of said garbage for such length of time and under such conditions as shall be prescribed by the Common Council, and in accordance with this ordinance and such rules and regulations as may be adopted by the board of health. Said city clerk shall contract therefor with the lowest responsible bidder, or bidders, who shall enter into such bond or bonds for the faithful performance of said contract as shall be prescribed by the Common Council; PROVIDED, That the term of such contract shall not in any case exceed three years.

Section 13. It is hereby made the duty of the contractor, or contractors, with the city of Ann Arbor for the collection and removal of garbage, to collect and remove in accordance with the contract with the City all such garbage found within the City limits. Such contractor, or contractors, shall transport and remove said garbage to places outside and at least one-fourth mile beyond the city limits. The said garbage shall be conveyed or transported in cans, furnished by the contractor at his own cost and expense, which cans shall be of a uniform size, not less than fifteen inches in diameter and eighteen inches high inside; the contractor shall leave a thoroughly cleaned can sterilized by steam in place of the one removed, that has been filled or partly filled. All cans furnished by the contractor to receive the garbage and in which all garbage is conveyed or carried away shall be such as will be suitable for the purpose and to securely receive and convey garbage so that no portion thereof shall be spilled out, or dropped or thrown upon any street or alley or adjacent premises within the city, or anywhere within one-fourth mile of the city limits; nor shall the same be kept or stored upon any street or alley or public place except as in this ordinance provided; wagons or other conveyances used to convey the cans shall not be left in any street, alley or public place, or upon any private premises within the city longer than may be reasonably necessary in order to collect and remove the garbage; any such contractor may dispose of the garbage collected as feed for hogs, but only to hogs that are kept at least one-fourth mile from the city limits.

Section 14. All garbage deposited in said cans shall be removed at the expense of the householder who shall pay the garbage contractor such charges per can per month as is agreed to between the contractor and the city, and each householder is required to pay the contractor for only such months as the contractor is required to remove such garbage; Provided, that where two householders are so situated that it is convenient for them to use one can, without overloading between the times of collection they are to have such privilege and pay the usual price for one can only. Provided further, that said garbage may be removed at the ex-

pense of the City under such terms as the Common Council may by resolution provide.

Section 15. The keeping of hogs or maintenance of hog-pens within the City limits is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, and the same shall be and hereby are absolutely prohibited within the limits of said city. All persons who shall hereafter keep hogs or maintain hog-pens within the limits of said city shall be amenable to the penalty provided for violation of this ordinance, as hereinafter set forth.

Section 16. Any person guilty of any of the acts forbidden by this ordinance, or throwing poisonous substances or broken glass into garbage, or failing to perform any of the duties imposed herein, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules of the Board of Health in reference to the same, shall upon conviction, be fined in such sum as the Court may determine, not exceeding one hundred dollars; and in case of default in the payment of such fine the court may make a further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the County jail of Washtenaw County, or any jail or lockup of said city, until such fine and costs be paid; PROVIDED, Such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days. And it is hereby declared to be the duty of the board of health and police department, through their proper officials and agents, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 17. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"
