## Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Manwaring presented the following proposed amendments to Charter:

Ry Alderman Manwaring: Resolved, That section 171 of the Charter of the
city of Ann Arbor be and the same is hereby amended to read as foilows:

Sec. 171.-The Common Council shall have authority to assess, levy and collect taxes on all the real and personal estate taxable in said city, which tax shall be and remain a lien upon the property so assessed until the same shall be paid; provided, that the aggregate amount which the Council may raise by general tax upon the taxabie real and personal property for the purposes for which the several general funds are hereinafter constituted shall not, except as herein otherwise provided, exceed in any one year three-fourths of one per cent on the assessed value of all the real and personal property in the city made taxable by law; and provided, further, that nothing herein contained shall be so constructed as to prohibit the Common Council of said city from regulating by tax or otherwise the business of dealing in malt, spirituous or intoxicating liquors.

Proposed, and laid on the table for 30 days by unanimous vote of those present, 13.

By Alderman Manwaring: Resolved, That section 186 of the Charter of the city of Ann Arbor, as amended May 10,1899 , be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 186.-No bond, note or other obligation or evidence of indebtedness of said corporation, except orders on the treasurer, as hereinafter provided, and also except bonds for sewerage and paving purposes and curb and gutters, shall ever be given or issued by said corporation, or by any officer thereof, in his off icial capacity, whereby the said city shall become obligated to pay any money, unless the same shall have been duly authorized by resolution of the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor by a two-thirds vote of the members e.ect, and shall have been submitted to and voted for by three-fifths of the electors of said city voting thereon, in conformity to this act; but the Common Council may allow just claims against the city, and may issue orders therefor on the treasurer, or payable on presentation, from any moneys then in the treasury, on the first day of February thereafter; but such second named class of orders shall not, in any fiscal year, exceed the aggregate taxes levied in such year for the payment of the same. All moneys collected for the use of the city shall be paid into the
city treasury, and no moneys shall be paid from the treasury unless it shall have been previously appropriated by the Common Council to the purpose for which it shall be drawn. T.e treasurer shall pay out no money except upon the written warrant of the mayor and city clerk, which warrant shall specify the fund from which the morrey is to be paid; Provided, that school moneys shall be paid to the treasurer of school district number one of the city of Ann Arbor upon 1he warrant of the president and secretary of said board. The Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution duly adopted by a majority of all the members e!ect, authorize the issuing of bonds, to the amount not exceeding one hundred and fifty thousand dollars outstanding at any one time, for the purpose of paving any alley, street or streets in such city, and for the construction of curbs and gutters, such bonds to run for a period not exceeding ten years from the date of their issues, and at a rate of interest not exceeling five per cent per annum, and the Common Council for the purpose of carrying out this provision may pass such ordinance or ordinances as may be deemed necessary.

Proposed, and laid on the table for 30 days by unanimous vote of those present, 13.

By Alderman Manwaring: Resolved, That the Twenty-second sub-division of section eighty-eight of the Charter of the city of Ann Arbor be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Twenty-second. - To build or purchase water works plant, for supplying the inhabitants with water for domestic use and for other purposes, and to borrow money and issue bonds for the payment thereof, and to pass ordinances for the management, regulation and protection of the same; to establish, regulate and preserve public reservoirs, welis, penstocks and pumps, and to prevent the waste of water; and to authorize and employ, under such regulations and upon such terms and conditions as they may choose, the laying of water pipes in the streets and alleys of the city; and to grant such exclusive privileges as they may deem expedient, to any company organized to supply said city and its inhabitants with water; and to contract with such company to supply the city with water for fire and other public purposes.

Proposed and laid on the table for 30 days by unanimous vote of those present, 13.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Fire Limits and Fires," which was given its first reading by title, and passed to and given its second reading by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Pipp, Flynn, Sherk, Koernke, Manwaring, Sweet, Goodyear, Hochrein, Murray, Lutz, Schmid, Lindenschmitt, Pres. Mills, 13. Nays, none.

Moved by Ald. Manwaring: That foregoing ordinance be referred to the Ordinance committee. Adopted.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to the Licensing of Dogs and Preventing and Regulating the Running at Large and the Slaying of Dogs," which was given its third reading as follows:
An Ordinance Relative to the Licensing of Dogs, and Preventing and Regulating the Running at Large, and the Slaying of Dogs.
The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:-

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to own possess or harbor, or have the care or keeping of any dog male or female, over the age of three months, within the city of Ann Arbor, without first obtaining a license therefor from the said city of Ann Arbor. The fee for which license shall be: For a male dog and a spayed iemale dog, one dollar and twenty-five cents; for a female dog, five dollars. No license shall be granted for a period exceeding one year, and all licenses shall expire on the first day of July succeding their issue.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of every person owning or having the possession or care of any dog, male or female, to cause such dog to be registered in the office of the city clerk, in a register kept by said clerk for that purpose, and to pay the license fee provided in section 1 of this ordinance, into the city treasury; and also to obtain the city clerk's receipt for said license so paid and the metallic plate or check hereinafter described, under the penalties herein provided.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the clerk of said city to provide such number of metallic plates or checks as may be necessary of such size and shape as he may deem expedient (the shape of such check or plate to be changed each year), having stamped theron numbers indicating the year
for which the tax is paid, the number of the license and the letters A. A. D. T., and to deliver one of these metallic plates to each person so paying for a license upon any such dog.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of such owner, possessor, keeper or harborer of any such registered dog, to place or cause to be placed around the neck of any such dog, a substantial collar, and on such collar securely to attach or cause to be attached the metallic plate or check so furnished by the clerk of said city; and if any person shall place or caused to be placed upon the collar or around the neck of any such dog, any counterfeit of the metallic plate or check so furnished by the city clerk, or any such metailic plate without the license for the keeping of such dog having first been pair, he or she will be liable to the penalties herein provided.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the pound master of said city to take up and impound any dog, male or female, found running at large, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, in the city of Ann Arbor, not having a collar around its neck with the metallic plate or check aforesaid attached thereto; and, if said dog shall not be - edeemed as hereinafter provided, within two days after such dog shall have been impounded, it shall be the duty of the poundmaster to slay or cause to be slain the same; or if the animal is worthy and valuable the same shall be sold by the poundmaster, at the pound, by public auction, to the hiohest bidder, at the hour of noon next succeeding the said two days. All moneys over and above the poundmaster's fees, arising from such sales, shall ke paid to the city treasurer by the said poundmaster within thirty days from said sales. But it is hereby provided that any such dog so impounded, may be redeemed or taken from such pound, upon exhibiting to said poundmaster a receipt of the city clerk, showing that the license in this ordinance imposed has been paid for such dog. and upon he payment to said poundmaster of a pound fee of one dollar and the furthor sum of twenty-five cents per lay for each and every day such dog shall have been impounded.

Sec. 6. It shall be lawful for any person and it shall be the duty of the marshal and each patrolman of the city of Ann Arbor, to seize, take up and deliver to the poundmaster any dog. male or female, found running at large in said city in violation of
any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 7. The poundmaster of said city is hereby authorized to collect the fees provided for in Section 5 of this ordinance, for all dogs impounded, and he shall retain such fees as compensation for his services as poundkeeper under this ordinance: Provided, That when any dog which shall have been delivered to said poundmaster $l y$ some person other than the marshal or a patrolman of the said city of Ann Artor, shall have been redeemed in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 of this ordinance, onehalf of such redemption fee shall by said poundmaster be paid to the person , vho delivered said dog to the powidmaster as provided in Section 6.

Sec. 8. It shall not be lawful for any owner, possessor or person having in charge or care, a fierce or dangerous dog, to permit or allow the same to go at large at any time in said city, to the danger or annoyance of any of its inhabitants. Whenever any person shall have been convicted of violating the provisions of this seetion of this ordinance and sha! permit or allow such dog to run at large after such conviction. it shall be the duty of the police authorities of said city to kill such dog.

Sec. 9. It shall be unlawful for the owner, possessor, keeper or harbocer of any licensed female dog, knowingly to permit her to run at large while in heat, and it shall be the duty of the police of said city to seize, take up and deliver to the pound-keeper any such dog found running at large in said city at such time. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster to serve upon the owner or keeper of such dog a notice in writing of the impoundiss of such dog, at once, and any such dog so impounded may be redeemed or taken from such pound $r y$ che owner or keeper of such dog within forty-eight hours after service upon such owner or keeper of said written notice, upon the payment to said poundmaster of the fees as provided in Section 5. In case the owner or keeper of any such dog so impounded shall not have redeemed said dog as herein provided, it shall be the duty of the poundmaster to kill the same, or in case said dog is worthy and valuable the same shall ke sold by the poundmaster, at the pound, by public auction, to the highest bidder, at tho hour of noon next succeeding the expiration of said forty-eight hours.

Sec. 10. It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor
any dog which, by loud and frequent barking, howling or yelping, shall cause serious annoyance or disturbance to any of the citizens of said city.

Sec. 11. Whenever any danger shall be justly feared as likely to result fr sm hydrophobia, the mayor shall publish his proclamation requiring all persons owning or having charge cr keeping any dog or dogs, to confine them on their premises for a prescrived time, and any person who shall omit to secure any dog owned or harlured cr kept in charge by him, or shall allow such dog to escape or go from his premises, shall be liable on conviction before the proper tribunal, to the punishment provided in Section 15 of this ordinance. During the time prescribed by the mayor's proclamation any dog found running at large upon the public streets of said city shall be forthwith slain.

Sec. 12. Whenever any person shall have been convicted of owning, possessing, keeping or harboring any dog that has bitten any person within said city while peaceably walking cr riding without the enclosure of such owner, keeper or harborer, the justice of the peace before whom such verson shall have been convicted, shall issue an order in writing directing such owner, keeper or harborer of said dog to kill the same within six hours after service on him of such order. The owner, possessor, keeper or person having in charge any such dog, who shall refuse or neglect to kill it within six hours after having received such order, shall on conviction bef re the proper tribunal, be liable to the punishment provided in Section 15 of this ordinance, and it shall be the dut of any police officer to lestroy such dog whereever he shall be found at large in said city six hours after service of said order.

Sec. 13. It shall be unlawful io! any person owning, poscessing or harboring any dog to suffer or permit the same to run at large in any street, alley, square, commons, park or other public place in the city of Ann Arbor without having first obtained a license therefor, as provided in this ordinance. Provided that during the months of July and August in each year, no such person shall permit any dog to go at large without being provided with a good and sufficient muzzle, rendering it impossible for such a dog to bite or snap. Provided, further, that bull dogs are prohibited from running at large at any time during the year unless securely muz-
zled.
Sec. 14. Any person allowing any dog to remain and be lodged or fed with.n his or her house, store, building, inclosure or premises, shall be considered as harboring or keeping the same within the meaning of this ordinance.

Sec. 15. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and costs of prosecution, and in the imposition of any such fine and costs, the court may impose a further sentence that the offender be and remain imprisoned in the common jail of Washtenaw county until such fine and costs have been paid: Provided, That such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days.

Sec. 16. Any ordinance or parts of ordinances inconsistent with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days fr im legal publication.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Driving of Automobiles, Motor-Vehicles and Other Vehicles Within the City f Ann Arbor," which was given its third reading as follows:
An Ordinance to Regulate and Con-
trol the Driving of Automobles, Motor-Vehicles and Other Vehicles Within the City of Ann Arbor.
The Common Council of the city op Ann Arbor ordains:

Sec. 1. No person shall operate an autc mobile, motor cycle, or other motor vehicle, on any street or puolic hig' ay in the business and closely built up portions of the corporation, at a greater rate of speed than ten miles an hour, or on any street or public highway elsewhere in the corporation. or on any park driveway, at a greatc: rate of speed than fifteen miles an hour.

Sec. 2. The owner, operator, driver or peason in charge of any cart, dray, wagon, hackney coach, omnibus, automobi: , motor cycle, motor vehicle, carriage or other vehicle, except street cars, used, propelled or driven upon any street, alley or public place of the corporation shall conform to
ard observe the following rules of the roa:

1. All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner, and with due regard for the safety and convenience of otiner vehicles and of pedestrians.
2. Ivery vehicle shall keep on the right side of the road or street, except when necessary to turn to the left in crossing or in overtaking another vehicle.
3. Vehicles going in opposite directions shall pass each other on the right.
4. Every vehicle overtaking another vehicle shall keep to the left of the overtaken vehicle in passing.
5. Vehicles turning to the left into anct $r$ street, shall pass to the rignt of c.rd beyond the center of the street intersection before turning, and in congested districts where traffic policernan are stationed at street intersections, an approaching automobile or vehicle must signal such officer and not enter such intersection until receiving proper signal from said officer.
6. No vehicle shall be driven through a procession, except with the permission of a police officer.
7. Every driver of a vehicle, when such vehicle is approciching a street car stopping for the purpose of talsing on or discharging passengers, shall give some signal plainly visible or audible to such passengers, and shall keep such vehicle at least six feet from the running bcard or lower step of such car; and if, either by reason of the presence of vehicles at the place where such car is stopping, or by reason of the narrowness of the street, it is not possible to preserve said distance of six feet from such running board or lower step, the driver of said vehicle shall stop the same until such car shall have taken on or discharged its passengers and again started.
8. No vehicle shall stand or stop within any street intersection so as to obstruct the free passage of vehicles and pedestrians.
9. No vehicle shall stop at any crosswalk or sidewalk in such manner as to obstruct the free passage of pedestrians on such crosswalk or sidewalk, or for a longer period than is necessary to permit persons to alight from or to enter said vehicle.
10. No vehicle shall stop on any street, except within two feet of the curb, or in any such way as to obstruc free passage on the street, orovided, that this rule shall not apply when a driver of a vehicle is compeil-
ed to stop by reason of rule 7 of this section.
11. No vehicle shall cross any thoroughfare or make any turn thereon at a greater speed than one-half the legal speed limit upon such thorouriofare.
12. Automobiles crossing any th oroughfare shall signal approaching vehicles and the vehicle nearest the approaching street intersection shall have the right of way wherever a traffic officer is not stationed; otherwise rule 5 must be strictly observed.
13. Vehicles moving sowly shall keep as near as possible to the curb on the right allowing more swiftly moving rehicles free passage on their Ieft.
14. Drivers of vehicles in the congested district, before turning, stopping or changing their course, shall mak: sure that such movement can be made with safety and give a plain signal to others upon the street by extending the hand or otherwise.
15. Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other in the congestc - district, shall do so ry turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on that side cf the street toward which the crossing is made.
16. No vehicle shall stop in the congested district with its left side to rhe curb, and no automokile shall stop anywhere in the city with its left side to th. curb.
17. No vehicle shall remain backed up to the curb in the congested district unless it is actually loading or unloading, and in such case no longer than the actual loading or unloading requires.
18. All automobiles shall carry tire proper number of lamps, and shall, during the feriod from one hour after sunset to one hour kefore sunrise, displav the number and kinds of lights required by state law. Automobile drivers may aid themselves in this rule $y$ observing the general rule of lighting street lamps.
19. Automobiles leaving any puinlic garage or alley, must stop before crossing the sidewalk line, and rie proper signal, and the utmost care shall be used in entering same. Signals in such cases may be used freely.
20. The horse or horses attached to a vehicle backed up to the curb in the congested district shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle, and in the direction in which the traffic upon that side of the street is moving.
21. No person while under the influence cf liquor shall drive any kind of a vehicle upon the streets, high-
ways or public places of the city.
22. No vehicle shall be slowed up or stopped without the driver thereof giving those behind warning of his intention so to do, by proper signal.
23. Lights on automobiles being operated or standing upon said streets, mist be kept burning in front and rear during the time the city lights on the streets are lighted, and each of : uch automobiles shall carry the state license exposed in front and rear, as required by the state law.
24. It shall be deemed a violation \& this cruinance for any person in charge or control of any vehicle to make with such vehicle or any device connected therewith any excessive noise to annoy the public or to open the muffler on any vehicle, or to permit such vehicle or any device thereon to emit smoke, gas or steam within the streets, highweys or public places of this city.
25. Each automobile and motor cycle upgil any of the streets, highways or public places of this city shall he provid $>$ d with adequate brakes, and with a suitable bell or horn for giving warning or signal of its approach.
26. It shall be unlawful for any person to use upon any automobile or other vehicle a warning signal similar to that used by the Fire or Police Department of the city of Ann Arbor.
27. All persons using bicycles shall conform to the general rules as in this ordinance set forth.
28. The driver of any vehicle shall stop and start upon the signal from a rolice officer.
29. The Police Department, by and with the consent of the mayor, shall have all powers and duties in relation to the management of the vehicular traffic. Whenever the police department shall deem it advisable for the public safety or convenience temporarily to close any street, or parts of streets, to vehicular traffic, or to ehicles of certain descriptions, or to divert the traffic thereon, or to divert or direct the course of pedestrian trave', said department shall have power and authority to do so.
30. The Police department shall see that this ordinance is posted in e.ll public stables and at hack, cab and other stables, and shall keep copies of them at all of its stations and issue them unon ayplication. And it shall be the duty of the owner and person in charge of all public stables, sarages and other places where vehicles of any description are kept for hire to see that this ordinance is kept posted therein.
31. It shall also be the duty of all persons keeping and operating delivery wagons, trucks, etc., to keep a copy of these regulations posted in conspicuous places in their respective stables.
32. It shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance for any person to hitch onto or get upon or take passage on any vehicle which is passing through or upon any cf the streets of this city, without the consent of the driver or operator of such vehicle.
33. In case of accident to or collision with person or property, upon any of the public streets, parks or parkways of the city of Ann Arbor, due to the driving or operation thereon of any vehicle, the person so driving or operating such vehicle shall stop and give such reasonable assistance as can be given, and shall upon request of the person injured, or any other person, give such person his name and address, and if not the owner, the name and address of the owner of such vehicle, together with the registered number of such vehicle in case wuch vehicle is motor propelled.
34. Any vehicle standing at the curb in the congested district shall move away from such curb at the request of a police officer.

Sec. 3. No person shall drop, place or throw, or cause to be dropped, placed or thrown, upon any street in adid city, chy giass, nails, taciss, wire, sclaps of metal or any ot tice sai)stances rensing to ir ure the tirns of a 4 : luomobile, mator cycle notor vificle (1 other vehicles.
sce 1. Any pers nif violatins any w" tae provisicns of thi, ordinare .l., it le dermed giulty of a misdeniuar:s", ard upon conviction thereof atioll ir fine!! in the sum int exceeding? Fin for a first offense, and by a fine not less than $\$ 25.00$ and not exceering $\$ 50.00$ for a second offense, and by a fine not less than $\$ 50.00$ and not more than $\$ 100.00$, or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, for a third offense, and for any subsequent offense within one year, imprisonment, not less than ten days nor more than thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days irom legal publication.
