From the Mayor-

## Aug. 10, 1911.

The Honorable Common Council: Gentlemen-I herewith disapprove of that portion of the council proceedings of Aug. 7th, as reates to the resolution accepting the bid for the collection of garbage, the individual to pay for the collection, because I believe that the system of having each householder look after the removal of his garbage is not the proper and sanitary one, and that the price you accepted for such service is excessive.

There are 4,000 houses in this city, and at a very low estimate it would be fair to state that 2,500 of them will want their garbage collected and removed. At the price per can that you accepted, it would mean that it would cost our citizens at least $\$ 950.00$ per month or $\$ 11,40 \mathrm{C} .00$ per cent for the removal of garbage. Even if the indisidual syifem should be the proper one, this price is altogether too high, especially when the garbage is of some value to the collector.

The main reason for the city to see that the garbage is collected and removed, is a sanitary one, and for the protection of the public health. Now, under the system of having each individual look after the removing of his garbage. especially at the price you accepted, would mean, I believe, that the garbage will not be removed, and in many cases householders will use their back yards and fence corners for dumping their garbage, and in a short time the health department will be asking for another assistant to look after the garbage nuisance.

We all pride ourselves on the fact that Ann Arbor has the reputation of being the finest residential city in the state. This reputation has been obtained to a great extent because we have such a clean, sanitary and healthy city. Now, if you insist on adopting a system that will mean that only about one-half the garbage will be disposed of. it will be a step backwards, and an unsanitary one. The desired end, to have a sanitary sys-
tem, which is the most important of all, will not be obtained if one householder will have his garbage removed and his neighbors do not, and for these reasons I believe it is the duty of the city to see to the collection and removal of all the garbage in the city.

I would therefore recommend that you readvertise for bids for the collection and removal of the garbage by the city. If the so-called can system will not allow us to have the garbage removed at a price that will not be a burden upon the tax payers, then that portion of the ordinance should be repea'ed and the system used as at present until such time as we can afford to have the garbage taken care of in sterilized cans as the new ordinance provides.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses, and twenty per cent of the remainder shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits, on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Wells st., within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works, with directions to report to the council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expenses of such public improvement.

## An Ordinance Relative to Streets.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. It shall be un'awful for any person to drive or haul any vehicle upon or across any lawn extension
or curb within the city of Ann Arbor, without the consent of the Board of Public Works.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to travel or drive along or across any street or sidewalk of this city whenever any such street or sidewalk is obstructed by reason of any work being in progress for the construction, repair or improvement of said street or sidewalk.

Sec. 3. It shall be un'awful for any person to remove, take down, or in any way interfere with any barrier or barriers placed upon any street or sidewalk, closing said street or sidewalk while said street or sidewalk is being constructed, repaired or improved.

Sec. 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and costs; and in the imposition of any such fine and costs the court may make the further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the common iail of the county of Washtenaw, or the city lockup, until the payment thereof, provided the term of such imprisonment shall not exceed the period of thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

## Ordinance Relative to Fire Limits and Fires.

Ald. Manwaring presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading as follows:
An Ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, "An Crdinance Relative io Fire Limits and Fires," passed October 7, 1895, approved October 12, 1895; amended June 4, 1900; amended March 19, 1906; amended December 3, 1906.
The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. That section 1 of an $\mathbf{r}$ dinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Fire Limits and Fires," passOctober 7, 1895; approved October 12, 1895 ; amended June 4, 1900 ; amended March 19, 1906 ; amended December 3,1906 , ke and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter place, enlarge, or erect any building or other structure
on any lot or part of a lot fronting on any of the following streets or parts of streets, to wit: On Main street, between Kingsley and William streets; on Huron street, between First street and Fifth avenue; on Washington street, between the Ann Arbor railroad and Fifth avenue; on Liberty street, between the Ann Arbc: railroad and State street; on Catherine street, between Ashley street and Fifth avenue; on Ann street, between Ashley street and Fifth av que; on Fourth avenue, between Kingsley and Liberty streets; on the west side of Fifth avenue, between Kingsley and Liberty streets; on Ashley street, between Catherine and Wiliam streets; on State street, between William and Huron streets; on William street, between State and Maynard streets; on Maynard street, between Wiliiam and Liberty streets; on the south side of Liberty street, between Maynard and State streets; on Detroit street, ketween Fourth avenue aond Depot street; on the block bounded as follows, to wit: On the north by Fuller street, on the south by Kingsley street, on the east by North State street and on the west by Elizabeth street; and on North University avenue, between South State and South Thayer streets, in this city, unless such building or such other structure shail be constructed of stone, reinforced concrete, brick or with party or fire walls of the same material.

Provided. That the board of fire commissioners may, in its discretion, grant permission for the erection within said limits of buildings or other structures veneered with brick, and for the erection of frame buildings, dwellings, karns, and outhouses in and on all of that part of the above described district lying north of Catherine street, west of Ashley street, south of Liberty street, and on State street, between Liberty and Huron streets.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Driving of Automobiles, Motor Vehicles and other vehicles Within the City of Ann Arbor," which was given its third reading as follows:
An wodinance to Regulate and Control the Driving os Automobles, Motor-Velicles and Other Vehicles Within the City of Ann Arbor.
The Common Councll of the city of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. No person shall operate an autc mobile, motor cycle, or other motor vehicle, on any street or puolic highway in the business and cose'y built up portions of the corporation, at a greater rate of speed than ten miles an hour, or on any street or public highway elsewhere in the norlora: on. or on any park driveway, at a greate: rate of speed than fifteen miles an rour.

Sez. 2. The owner, operator, Ariver (r pe:son in charge of any cart, dray, wagon, hackney coach, omnibus, automok..., motor cycle, motor vehicle, carriage or other vehicle, except street cars, used, propelled or driven upon any street, alley or public place of the corporation shall conform to ard observe the following rules of the roa

1. All vehicles shall be driven in a careful manner, and with due regard for the safety and convenience of otitr vehicies and of pedestrians.
2. Ivery vehicle shall keep on the right side of the road or street, except when - lecessary to turn to the left in crossing ol in overtaking another vehicle.
3. Vehicles going in opposite directions shall pass each other on the right.
4. Every vehicle overtaking another vehicle shall keep to the left of the overtaken vehicle in passing.
5. Vehicles turning to the left into anc: r street, shall pass to the right of :-1 beyond the center of the street intersection before turning, and in congested districts where traffic foliceman are stationed at street intersections, an approaching automobile or vehicle must signal such officer and not enter such intersection until receiviag proper ignal from said officer.
6. No vehicle shall be driven through a krocession, except with the permission of a police officer.
7. Every driver of a vehicle, when such vehicle is approaching a street car stopping for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers, shall give some signal plainly visible or audible to such passengers, and shall keep such vehicie at least six fect from the running bcard or lower step of such car; and if, either by resson of the presence of vehicles at the plase wher $\epsilon$ such car is stopping, ir by reason of the narrowness of the street, it is not possible to preserve said distance of six feet from such running board or lower step, the driver of said vehicle shall stop the same until such car shall have taken on or discharged its passengers and again started.
8. No vehicle shall stand or stop within any street intersection so as to obstruct the free passage of vehicles and jedestrians.
9. No vehicle shall stop at any crosswalk or sidewalk in such manner as to obstruct the free passage of pedestri:ns on such crosswalk or sidewalk, or for a longer period than is necessary to permit persons to alight from or to enter said vehicle
10. No vehicle shall stop on any street, except within two feet of the curb, or in any such way as to obstru free passage on the street, orovided, that this rule shall not apply when a driver of a vehicle is compelled to stcp by reason of rule 7 of this section.
11. No vehicle shall cross any thoroughfare or make any turn thereon at a greater speed than one-half the legal speed limit upon such thoroagifare.
12. Automobiles crossing any th oroughfare shall signal approaching vehicles and the vehicle nearest the approaching street intersection shail have the right of way wherever a traffic officer is not stationed; otherwise rule 5 must be strictly observed.
13. Vehicles moving stowly shall keep as near as may be convenient to the curb on the right allowing more swiftly moving vehicles free passtise on their left.
14. Drivers of motor vehicles hefore turning, stopping or changins their course, shall make sure that such movement can be made wit'l safety.
15. Vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other in the congest . district, shall do so by turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on that side of the : reet toward which the crossing is made.
16. No vehicle shall stop in the con-
gested district with its left side to rhe curb, and no automobile shall stop anywhere in the city with its left side to t : curb.
17. No vchicle shall remain backed up to the curb in the congested district unless it is actually loading or unloading, and in such case no longer than the artual loading or unloading requires.
18. All automobiles shall carry the proper number of lamps, and shill, during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise, displav the number and kinds of lights required by state law. Automobile drivers may aid themselves in this rule $\mathrm{y} y$ observing the general rule of liohting street lamps.
19. Automobiles leaving any puinlic garage or alley, must stop before crossing the sidewalk line, and gi're proper signal, and the utmost care shall be used in entering same. Signals in such cases may be used freely.
20. The horse or horses attached to a vehicle backed up to the curb in the congested district shall be turned at right angles to the vehicle, and in the direction in which the traffic upon that side of the street is moving.
21. No person while under the influence of liquor shall drive any kind of a vehicle upon the streets, highways or public places of the city.

Sec. 3. Lights on automobiles being operated or standing upon said streets, must be kept burning in front and rear during the time the city lights on the streets are lighted, and each of such automobiles shall carry the state license exposed in front and rear, as reauired by the state law.

Sec. 4. It shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance for any person in charge or control of any vehicle to make with such vehicle or any device connected therewith any excessive noise to annoy the public or to open the muffler on any vehicle, or to permit such vehicle or any device thereon to emit smoke, gas or steam within the streets, highweys or public places of this city.

Sec. 5. Each automobile and motor eycle upon any of the streets, hignways or public places of this city shall be providcd with aderuate brakes, and witin a suitable bell or horn for giving warning or signai of its approach.

Sec. 6. It shall ne, unlawful for a $1 y$ person to use upon any automobile or other vehicle a warning signal similar to that used by the Fire or Police Department of the city of Ann Arbor.

Sec. 7. All persces using bicyc.es shall conform to the general rules as:
in this ordinance set forth.
Sec. 8. Th $\stackrel{\text { drever of any vehicle }}{ }$ shall stop and st: rt upon the siynial from a police offict.

Sec. 9. The Pulice Department, by and with the consent of the mayor, shall have all $y$ iw'ers and duties in relation to the management of the vehicular traffic Whenever the inlice department shall deem it ad,isable for the puolic safety or con. venience temporarily to close aly street, or parts of streets to vehic!! ar traffic, or to vahioles of certain descriptions, or to divert the trafic thereon, or to divert or direct the course of pedestrian travel, said department shall nate power and authority to do so.

Sec. 10. The Police department sha! see that this or linance is posted in all public stables and at hack, cab and other stables, and shall keep copies of them at all of its stations and issue them unon apolication. And it shall be the duty of the owner =nd person in charge of all public stables, garages and other places where vehicles of any description are kept for hire to see that this ordinance is kept posted therein.

Sec. 11. It sha!! also be the duty of a!l persons keeping and c perating delivery wagons, trucks, etc., to keep a copy of these reguiations posted in conspicuous places in their respective stables.

Sec. 12. It shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance for any person to hitch onto or get upon or take passare on any vehicle which is passins through or upon any cf the streets of this city, without the consent of the driver or operator of such vehicle.

Sec. 13. In case of accident to or collision with person or property, upon any of the public streets, parks or parkways of the city of Ann Arbor, due to the driving or operation thereon of any vehicle, the person so driving or operating such vehicle shall stop and give such reasonable assistance as can be given, and shall upon request of the person injured, or any other person, give such person his name and address, and if not the owner, the name and address of the owner of such vehicle, together with the registered number of such vehicle in case wuch vehicle is motor propelled.

Sec. 14. Any vehicle standing at the curb in the congested district shall move away from such curb at the request of a police officer.

Sec. 15. No person shall drop, pla a or throw, or cause to be dropred, placed or thrown, upon ar. $y$ street in
áid city: riny glass, nails, taciss, wire, selaps of metal or any other sui)stances ren. ing to ir ure the tires of iuy : uitomobile, moter cycle sotor v. !r-re i: other vehicles.

Sec. 16. Any person violating an of t.20 fum sicns of this ordinance .l., 1 lis derener giulty of a misdeiniad:un, arid upon conviction thereof sia!ll int fined in the sum not exceeding $\$ 25.00$ for a first offense, and by a fine not less than $\$ 25.00$ and not exceeding $\$ 50.00$ for a second offense, and by a fine not less than $\$ 50.00$ and not riore than $\$ 100.00$, or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, for a third offense, and for any subsequent offense within one year, imprisonnient, not less than ten days nor more than thirty days.

This ordinance shall take effect and lie in force from and after ten days irom legal publication.
