Communications.

From the Mayor—

Received, ordered printed in the minutes and filed.

“Mr. President and Members of the Common Council:

“Gentlemen—Following the time honored custom upon assuming the duties of the office of mayor of Ann Arbor I will give you a statement as to the different things which I hope to see accomplished during my term of office, and which I feel will be to the interest of the people of Ann Arbor.

“The first and most important question with which we will have to deal is the water question. This is a question which has been before the people and the common council of Ann Arbor for many years. Yet nothing definite has been accomplished, and a satisfactory settlement of the question has not been brought about. It will give me great pleasure to have the matter disposed of at the earliest possible date, and in a manner which will meet with the approval of a great majority of the people of the city.

“I believe in a strict enforcement of the law, without fear or favor to anyone. Every ordinance passed by the common council was passed for a purpose, and should not be lost sight of for a single instant.

“I desire to see the paving of streets continue as quickly as advisable. In my mind no other thing so prominently shows the progressiveness of a city any more than to see a large number of paved streets within its limits.

“The sanitary condition of a city is a matter which concerns every individual. It is a problem which should be constantly in the mind of every member of this body. To have and keep a city in a clean and healthful condition speaks much for the work of each and every officer. To bring about such a condition means that the city must have the best possible in plumbing. No one thing will produce an unsanitary condition in a city quicker than poor plumbing.

“In conclusion I desire to say that our first duty is to serve the people

of Ann Arbor to the best of our ability. This can best be accomplished by all working in harmony. I sincerely trust that I may receive the earnest co-operation of this body and that our various efforts will be beneficial to our city.

To the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—Replying to your request of March 15th, 1913, for the lowest price at which this company is willing to sell its prop-

erty to the City, and for the the best terms of a new contract to be made with the City, this Company says:

That in pursuance of a resolution of the Board of Directors of this company, made on the 12th day of April, 1913, I am authorized to offer all of the property of this Company to the City for the sum of \$450,000, and the actual cost of all new construction (except repairs) made by the Company after this date, and the actual value of coal and supplies on hand at date of settlement.

Should the City elect to purchase, settlement to be made and account adjusted as of July or August first next, at the option of the City.

In case of purchase, the Company will get in and surrender all outstanding bonds, and pay all claims against the Company, which bonds and claims are as follows:

(a) \$225,000 total authorized issue of bonds, secured by mortgage of the Company to Union Trust Company, of Detroit, Michigan, dated April 1, 1898; due April 1, 1913.

(b) \$98,500 out of a total authorized issue of bonds of \$350,000, secured by mortgage dated December 2, 1901, to Union Trust Company, of Detroit, Michigan; due December 2, 1916.

(c) \$94,000 out of a total authorized issue of bonds of \$650,000, secured by mortgage dated March 7, 1910, to Union Trust Company, of Detroit, Michigan; due March 7, 1930.

Of the \$94,000 of bonds issued and outstanding under said mortgage dated March 7, 1910, \$60,000 par value of said bonds are held by the Company in its treasury, duly executed and certified. These bonds were issued by order of the Michigan State Railroad Commission for revenue earning construction, which has been made from the earnings of the Company.

(d) The debts of the Company not represented by bonds amount to about \$22,500.

If the City does not wish to purchase, this Company is willing to enter into a new contract to be mutually agreed upon.

In order that you, as representatives of the City, may satisfy yourselves that our property is reasonably worth to the City all that we ask for it, we invite an examination of books and property and to that end this Company would extend to you any assistance that it can, in order to make the investigation that you may desire.

The above proposition to be held open until June 15, 1913.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Schultz presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, 'An ordinance regulating the posting of bills, tacking and painting of signs, and the circulating of advertising matter and sample packages, to license bill posters and to regulate their manner of doing business in the City of Ann Arbor,'" passed January 6, 1908; approved January 16, 1908; which was given its third reading as follows:

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled "An Ordinance Regulating the Posting of Bills, Tacking and Painting of Signs, and the Circulation of Advertising Matter and Sample Packages; to License Bill Posters and to Regulate Their Manner of Doing Business in the City of Ann Arbor," Passed January 6, 1908; Approved January 16, 1908. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. That Section 3 of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Regulating the Posting of Bills, Tacking and Painting of Signs, and the Circulation of Advertising Matter and Sample Packages, to License Bill Posters and to Regulate Their Manner of Doing Business in the City of Ann Arbor," passed January 6, 1908; approved January 16, 1908, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. Any person or persons desiring to engage in the business of a bill poster in said city shall make application in writing to the City Clerk of said city for a license to do so. The City Clerk may thereupon grant such license to the applicant upon the payment of twenty-five dollars for one

year, three dollars for one day, and one dollar per day for the next five consecutive days, and upon the further condition that the applicant shall file with the said City Clerk a bond running to the City of Ann Arbor, with two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the mayor, in the penal sum of two hundred dollars, conditioned that the licensee will conform to the ordinance of the city regulating the business of bill posting. The license shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Clerk.

Sec. 2. Any Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

Ald. Schultz presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled 'An ordinance relative to street sprinkling and providing a method of raising by taxation the money to pay and defray the costs and expenses thereof,'" passed July 7, 1899; approved August 4, 1899; which was given its third reading as follows:

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Street Sprinkling and Providing a Method of Raising by Taxation the Money to Pay and Defray the Costs and Expenses Thereof." passed July 17, 1899; approved August 4, 1899. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Sec. 1. That Section 9 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Street Sprinkling and Providing a Method of Raising by Taxation the Money to Pay and Defray the Costs and Expenses Thereof," passed July 17, 1899; approved August 4, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the board of public works to advertise for tenders for such street sprinkling in each of the said districts for the coming year and from year to year, until otherwise ordered by the common council. Bids may be delivered, sealed, at the office of the city clerk, at any time until the hour of four

o'clock in the afternoon of the fourth Monday of April, and the board of public works shall contract with the lowest responsible bidder, and after any such contract shall be concluded, after the first contract, the board of public works shall report and certify the contract price of sprinkling any such district, to the city assessor. The city assessor on receipt of any such report shall proceed forthwith to make or cause to be made, a duplicate special assessment roll for any such sprinkling district for the year in which any such report shall be made, and if any of the lands or premises in any such district shall or may have been transferred or divided, the city assessor shall enter the name of any such purchaser or occupant on the new assessment roll, and shall divide the amount of the assessment on the whole parcel on the former roll, and distribute and assess the same among the parcels into which the said lands and premises may have been divided according to the surface area thereof, And when any such duplicate assessment roll shall be completed the city assessor shall attach his warrant thereto, directed to the city treasurer, and the city treasurer shall proceed to collect the sum and sums of money spread and assessed thereon according to the command of the said warrant, and make return thereof, and the same proceeding shall be had thereon in every respect as is herein provided for the collection, payment and return of the taxes levied and assessed on the original of the said special assessment roll, warrant and return of delinquent taxes assessed thereon, Provided, however, that the board of public works shall have the right to reject any and all bids made, and in case all bids are rejected, or no bids received, the board may then advertise a second time or perform such work and furnish the materials and labor itself.

And if the board shall decide to perform such work and furnish the materials, it shall be the duty of the board to communicate in writing to the common council, at its earliest opportunity, its determination so to do, and after the completion of such work, at its earliest opportunity, the board shall make an itemized report in writing to the common council of all money expended by it in the prosecution of such work, and the

purchase of such materials, stating therein for what particular purpose said money was expended.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.
