Ann Arbor, May 28, 1913.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—We now have a city hall and the building should, as nearly as possible, house all the active city officers. It would please me very much to have it so arranged that the Health Officer be provided with a room to be used as an office, work shop and place where he can keep the many valuable documents connected with the office that are now scattered all over the city. It would seem to me that the city officers should be furnished room in preference to any outside parties or organization. I, therefore, recommend that the room now occupied temporarily by the Civic association be turned over to the Health Officer. Yours truly, R. G. MacKenzie, Mayor.

Ann Arbor, Mich., May 24, 1913.

To the Honorable Common Council: Gentlemen—I desire to submit the following report upon matters pertaining to the public health of our city, which I trust will meet your careful consideration. During the past twenty years much valuable matter of record has accumulated in this department. The time is at hand when this material must be properly cared for. At the present time your health officer is compelled to keep these records and documents, some of them in his cellar, some of them in his attic, and some of them in his private office and in the way of other things. Under this arrangement some of these papers and records are in danger of being lost completely. Since the enactment by your honorable body of an ordinance governing the milk supply of this city, much valuable matter of record has accumulated, pertaining to this branch of the public health of the city. These records, under the present arrangement, have to be kept at the home of your milk inspector. They should be kept where the health officer at all times could have easy access to them. Since the passage of the milk ordinance, the department of health has also established

and equipped quite a considerable laboratory. This equipment is at present housed in some of the rooms of my predecessor, Dr. James F. Breakey. He has informed me that these rooms may be needed by him in the near future. When this time arrives your health officer will be compelled to rent other rooms in which to house the laboratory, and at a cost of not less than from \$10 to \$15 per month. Then again our placards, signs and notice forms are all kept in the police department, where they are taking up the room needed for the equipment of the police force. It seems to me, therefore, gentlemen, that the time has come when your public health department should have a home of its own, and the only logical place for such home is in the municipal building. We are a branch of the city government, and should occupy a part of the city building. There is still much unoccupied space in this building, some of which could be given over to our uses at a very nominal cost. I ask for nothing elaborate, only enough to meet the necessities of my department.

From Board of Public Works.

Communication relative to various tar surfacings for concrete pavements received and ordered printed in minutes.

Engineering Department, Ann Arbor, Michigan, May 21st, 1913.

To the Board of Public Works, Ann Arbor, Mich., Sirs:—Complying with a resolution of the Common Council, I present to you the following report of the experiments made during the past year with various tar surfacings for our concrete pavements:

For the wearing surface of pavements laid and resurfaced in 1912, tar from the following concerns was used: "Dolarway Bitumen," from

have very little refining; only enough is desirable to remove the water and very lighter oils and to insure a uniform product. The tar should be heated to about 300 degrees F in the tank or kettle so that it will be almost that hot and in its most liquid form when applied to the surface of the pavement. If an unrefined tar is used the heating to 300 degrees F will give it the necessary refining, but the heating unrefined tar to this temperature will take somewhat longer and be a little more extensive than heating a refined tar which has previously had the water and lighter oils removed. I would estimate the difference in cost of heating refined and unrefined tar to 300 degrees F at much less than one cent per gallon.

The pavement should be laid with a top coat of mortar with about two parts of washed and screened sand or fine gravel to one part of cement. The surface of the concrete should be very clean and dry when the surfacing is applied, and surfacing applied on a very hot dry day will stick much better than that applied under other weather conditions for at such a time the pores in the concrete are open and the liquid tar penetrates into them.

The Ann Arbor Grfs Co. makes the proposition to furnish the City with unrefined tar pumping from the bottom of their tar well into the City's storage tank so that the City will receive the best grade of their tar and that which contains the least water and lighter oils for a price of 5c per gallon delivered into the City's tank.

To the Honorable Common Council: Gentlemen—It becomes the duty of your Health Officer to call your attention to a condition of things in this city, absolutely intolerable. I refer to the fact that a number of dwellings and business houses on Miller av., from Main st. to N. First st., are connected with the storm sewer for the disposal of their sewage. This sewer empties into Allen's creek at the Miller av.

culvert and thus befouls Allen's creek to the imminent peril of all residents at or near the intersection of Main and Summit sts., and also Depot st., all of which is in violation of an ordinance relative to nuisances, section 4, page 300, of book of ordinances. A sanitary sewer on so much of Miller av., as is covered by this report, is an imperative and immediate necessity.

The Honorable the Common Council, Ann Arbor, Michigan: Gentlemen—Concerning the proposed paving of Huron street: We beg to advise that we have been able to arrange for the necessary funds with which to reconstruct our track and pave the same between Ashley street and a point seven hundred and forty-seven feet (747 ft.) west of the westerly line of Chapin street, at which point we plan to leave the street and to construct our tracks on a right-of-way to a connection with the existing tracks at a point west of the city line.

Under this plan, we desire to remove our tracks, poles and wires on Huron street and to abandon our rights thereon, from the point at which we enter the right-of-way to the westerly city limits.

We trust this arrangement is entirely satisfactory to you.

City Attorney's Report.

To the Honorable Common Council: Gentlemen—The petition of Marie L. D. Shearer for \$170.00 for injury to her Baker electric car, referred to me by your Honorable Body at your regular meeting of March 3, 1913, has been fully considered, and I find that as the claim had not been filed within the time prescribed by law, there is no legal liability on the part of the city. Also, the claim of Mr. George B. Darrow was not filed within the prescribed time and for that reason is no legal claim against the city. Both claims are outlawed.

It may be that following out the technical rules governing claims against our city is an injustice to a citizen who has suffered an injury. It is not for me to go beyond what the law provides, yet, an innocent citizen ought not to be barred if the claim is meritorious. I therefor recommend that both the claims be referred to the street committee and street commissioner for a complete investigation of the facts concerning each case.

The injury to Margaret Morrison being caused by slipping on an icy sidewalk is not one for which the city is liable.

The repairing and resurfacing of paved streets to Sept. was all done with Dolarway Bitumen. The repairing on Washtenaw ave. was done with unrefined coal tar.

The costs of these materials f. o. b. Ann Arbor, was as follows:

- Unrefined coal tar, 5c per gal.
- Dolarway Bitumen, 8c per gal.

All road tars, 9c per ga^l.

On tank car quantities, however, the manufacturers of these road tars agreed to furnish their product at 6,9c and 7c per gal.

The amount of refining to which these products had been subjected varied from least to most in the following order:

1. Unrefined coal tar.
2. Dolarway Bitumen.
3. Lewis Road Tar.
4. Tarcoat.
5. Tarco.

The unrefined coal tar was heated to about 280 degrees F before being applied to the pavement surface. This heating served to drive off all the water and lighter oils and made it practically the same product as the Dolarway Bitumen which boiled at about this same temperature. The Lewis Road Tar had much more refining than the Dolarway Bitumen and Tarcoat and Tarco, which were nearly the same, had much more refining than the Lewis Road Tar.

Maynard st. was resurfaced and Mary st. surfaced during September while the temperature was comparatively high, and the weather fair, but in Oct. and Nov. while Ashley st. and Hill st. were being surfaced and the surfacing on Washtenaw ave. repaired, the temperature was much lower and the work was frequently interrupted by rains. In all cases after Sept. 1st the tar was heated to between 250 degrees and 300 degrees F except on Washtenaw ave., where the heating was done in the old tar wagon in which the tar could not be brought to this temperature. All of the tar was applied from sprinkling cans having a spreader nozzle and was well rubbed into the concrete with rubber brushes. The torpedo gravel was well applied by spreading with a shovel.

The results are as follows: On Maynard st. the Dolarway surfacing is in good condition, while the Tarco surfacing has peeled and come off in places. On Mary st. the entire surfacing is in good condition except a little of the Tarco surfacing near the Packard st. end. On Ashley st. the surfacing is all peeled off, but the Lewis Road Tar sections are in much better condition than the Tarco or Tarcoat sections.

The conclusions which I would draw from these experiments and my observations of our paved streets are as follows: The tar used should
