To The Honorable Members of Council, City of Ann Arbor, Mich.: Gentlemen—Subsequent to remitting my resignation as fire commissioner to His Honor, the Mayor, I have been apprised of section 40 of the charter, which vests the power to accept resignations solely in your Honor...ble Body, wherefore I beg that you will receive the attached communication and act upon it, as if addressed to your Honorable Body.

Honorable Chas. A. Sauer. Mayor of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan:

Dear Sir—I herewith tender you my resignation as a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor to take effect as soon as possible.

I am compelled to take this action by reason of the following conditions existing in the department, and no remedy for which appears to be in

immediate prospective.

As an official of a labor organization, which has prided itself, and made wonderful progress, in the provision of sanitary working conditions for its members, it is hardly conconceivable that I should be requested to continue to serve on a body which has paid little or no attention to the sanitation of the fire stations that house its employes.

It has been a noted fact for number of years, and has been called to the attention of the members of Council on various occasions that fire station No. 2 has been officially condemned on more than one occasion because of its unfitness to house human beings. Notwithstanding this knowledge, that Honorable body appears to have made absolutely no effort during my connection with the department, to provide suitable, sanitary and safe quarters for the accommodation of the men compelled to spend the major portion of their time therein.

Aside from the legal standpoint which makes, (according to my understanding of the law), each and every member of Honorable that Body, as well as the individual fire commissioners. responsible in event of an accident. it is hardly conceivable that a man, because he is employed by the City of Ann Arbor, should by virtue of that fact, be compelled to abide in a place that in my estimation is unfit to house anything human. It is insanitary, unsafe, and has been condemned, and were such a condition brought to the Council's attention on the part of any party, that Honorable Body would be righteously indignant if the employer were not to remedy the evil when his attention has been called to the condition and undoubtedly the offender would be dealt with as the law designates. Why then, should

not the Members of Council enable recommendation the Fire Commissioners to put a stop Adopted by una to a proceeding that this body would council members not countenance for one week from

any other citizen?

Upwards of six months ago a communication was forwarded to the Council calling attention to the insanitary sewer conditions prevailing in the Number 1 station, or properly, the entire lack of sewer connections in this house.

This condition has likewise been entirely neglected, despite the fact that attention has been called to same. Were a private citizen to commit a similar offense, recourse would be had to the law to prevent its continuance in order to protect the health of the community, but no effort has been made to protect the health of the firemen.

The prospects for immediate relief from this condition, appear very remote and I cannot conscientiously remain a party to such treatment accorded employes in a department over which I am presumed to have a share in the supervision and for this reason I solicit the early acceptance of my resignation.
