

Council Chamber, Ann Arbor, Mich., July 6th, 1915. Regular session.

Meeting called to order by the president. Present: Ald. Heusel, Fiegel, Hanselmann, Albert Lutz, Heck, Markey, Flynn, Sherk, Freeman, George Lutz, Sink and Pres. Wurster, (12). Absent Ald. Koernke, Manwaring and McGregor, (3). Minutes of previous meeting approved.

**Communications.**

From the Mayor—

To the honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—I respectfully announce the appointment of Marland G. Howard, as patrolman, to fill the place on the police force created by action of your honorable body of June 7th, 1915. I also announce the appointment of F.C. Heaton and Charles Watting, as special police at the University, without pay from the City.

From the Hospital Circle of Kings Daughters asking the Mayor and the Common Council to renew for another year the appropriation of the past year, \$200.00, towards the support of the visiting nurse, who works among the poor of the city.

Moved by Mr. Cornwell, that in as much as the Standard Oil Company is the lowest bidder on self measuring gasoline pump and 120 gallon underground tank, that they be given the contract at \$92.00, on approval of the council. Adopted by the board.

From Charles McCalla asking to be compensated in the amount of \$60.00 for damages done by the flooding of his land, owing to the testing of the

large well on the city property known as the Steere Farm.

Received, ordered on file, and the following action taken: Moved by Ald. Fiegel, that claim be allowed, and City Clerk draw a warrant in favor of Mr. McCalla in sum stated \$60.00. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12.

1st. That a storm water sewer be constructed on Edwin street, from State to Division streets, on condition that the property owners along said sewer guarantee the payment of the sidewalk on the top of same.

2. That a storm water sewer be constructed on Glen ave., from the Huron river to Huron street, and on McKinley ave., in front of property of Nettie E. Lewis.

3. That a sanitary sewer be built on Seventh street, from Huron street to Miller ave., and on Bath and Willow streets.

4. That a sanitary sewer be built on Moseley street, between Second and Third streets; and that the City Engineer furnish plans, specifications and estimate of cost of this and the foregoing sanitary sewer.

5. That a sanitary sewer be constructed on all streets in the Hamilton, Rose and Sheehan addition, provided that the property owners stand the entire expense of pumping station to take care of sewerage in said district, and also assume all damages that might occur from such system. Reports of Justice Wm. G. Doty for quarter ending June 30th, 1915, City Treasurer and City Clerk for month of June, and the City Engineer for month of May, received and ordered to take usual course and filed.

The City Engineer stated that on account of requests for curb and gutter permits on Thayer street and Austen avenue, the width of roadway on these streets should be established

by the council. The matter was referred to the street committee.

#### Resolutions.

Ald. Fiegel presented boundary resolution and order of assessment for pavement district No. 34, Division Street, as follows:

Pavement Boundary and Order of Assessment.

By Ald Fiegel: Resolved, that the pavement on Division street, Dist. No. 34, within the city of Ann Arbor, heretofore ordered, in the opinion of the Common Council is and is hereby deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement.

Resolved, further, that all the lands, tenements and premises hereinafter mentioned are deemed and declared to be benefitted by the construction and completion of the pavement heretofore ordered and it is hereby ordered and determined that all the costs of the said public improvement, street intersection and twenty per cent of the balance of the cost of said public improvement excepted, shall be and is hereby ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situated in the special district assessment hereinafter designated and the said special assessment district is hereby fixed as follows, to-wit:

All those certain pieces and parcels of land situated in the city of Ann Arbor, county of Washtenaw, state of Michigan, as follows:

Block 4 N, R 6 E, original plat of Ann Arbor—

All that part of lots 5 and 6 lying east of Detroit street, except a parcel bounded as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the east line of Detroit street with the south line of lot 6, thence east along the south line of lot 6, eighty-nine feet; thence north parallel to Division street, thirty-seven feet; thence northwest at right angles to Detroit street, fifty-three feet to the east line of Detroit street, and southwest along the east line of Detroit street to the place of beginning.

That part of lot 7 bounded as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the north line of said lot 7 with the west line of Division street; thence west along the north line of lot 7, eighty-three feet; thence southwest to a point sixty-six feet south of the north line of lot 7 and ninety-nine feet west of Division street; thence south parallel to Division street, thirty-three feet; thence west parallel to the south line of lot 7, about twenty-two feet; thence southwest to a point on the

All to be assessed on and against said lands, tenements and premises according to the benefits coming to each parcel thereof from such local public improvement, and the City Assessor is hereby required to levy and assess the said sum of money as aforesaid on and against the lands and tenements aforesaid on and upon the special assessment roll for the paving district aforesaid and on and upon each and every of the regular assessment rolls of the City of Ann Arbor for the year and during which any such special assessment may be

payable, until the whole of such special assessment shall be paid in full, all to be assessed in the manner and for the purpose aforesaid pursuant to law

Resolved, further, that the sum of \$6,543.00 is hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such public improvement at street and alley intersections and twenty per cent of the balance of costs of said public improvement; all of which sum of money in ten equal annual installments, with interest, be and the same is hereby ordered and required to be levied, spread and assessed on and upon each and every of the regular annual assessment rolls of the city of Ann Arbor, and on and against all the taxable property within the said city in and during the period in which any part of this appropriation and assessment is or shall be payable.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk do certify this determination and order of assessments to the City Assessor pursuant to law.

Adopted by unanimous vote of the members of council present, 12.

By Ald. Sherk: Resolved, that a crosswalk be built across Cedar street, at the intersection of Pontiac street, and one across Pontiac street, on the South side of Cedar and Moore streets. Referred to the Sidewalk committee.

By Ald. Heck: Resolved, that the City Clerk and City Attorney are here-
