Eastern Michigan Edison Company, Washtenaw Division, Ann Arbor, Mich., October 4th, 1915.

The Mayor and Honorable Common Council, of the City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—We propose to light the streets of Ann Arbor with 193 magnetite arc lamps at \$60.00 per lamp per year, and 243 60-candle power Mazda tungstens at \$18.00 per lamp per year.

We will also furnish electric energy for operating the system of ornamental street lighting at the rate of 4c per kilowatt hour.

These prices are based on a five-year contract, dated January 1st, 1916.
