Sidewalk Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your Sidewalk committee has had the following matters under consideration, and recommend that a new sidewalk extension be constructed at the north-east corner of Fifth ave and Detroit st.; that the sidewalks along numbers 402 and 406 on east side of Detroit st. be raised; that the sidewalks along the south side of McKinley ave., from White st. west about 75 ft., be raised to make even grade.

We further recommend and offer the following resolution: Resolved, that the grading and construction of the following sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement, therefore, it is hereby ordered that cement sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the city of Ann Arbor on and along the east side of Ninth st., in front of the property of C. W. Allmand and W. A. Begole; on the south side of Moseley st., between Second and Third sts.; on the north side of Beakes st., along number 219; on the west side of East University ave., along numbers 636 and 638; on the north side of East Washington st., from 603 to 609 inclusive; on the west side of Wells st. from Baldwin ave. to Ferdon road.

Arc light at intersection of Twelfth and N. University ave., over center of N University ave.

Arc light over center of intersection of Oakland ave. and Church st.

Tungsten light at northeast corner of Vaughn and Packard sts.

Tungsten light at northeast corner of Roosevelt ave. and Church st.

Tungsten light at northeast corner of Twelfth and Hill sts.

Tungsten light at intersection of Second and Liberty sts., to be hung on south side of pole.

Tungsten light at corner of Third and Liberty sts., to be placed about 75 ft. west of railroad track and on the south side of street.

Move Tungsten light in alley back of Schumacher Hardware Co. south 25 ft.

Special Committee.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: "The hand of death has taken from us our first citizen, a man distinguished in many lines of activity, and one whose death has brought real grief to the country at large, but

to us who have known him so intimately, especially.

"For many years the form of Dr. James B. Angell has been familiar to us all and through his gentility of manner, his great wisdom, and untiring efforts in bettering and advancing in every way the conditions of his fellow-men, he made a deep impress upon all with whom he came in contact, or who were so fortunate as to come within the sphere of his influence if even remotely.

"Dr. Angell, while eminent among the great where he wielded a tremendous influence was essentially a man of the people, and if he was loved, respected and revered by those in the higher walks of life, he was none the less so among the humblest citizens, for one could not come in contact with him in any way without being led to higher things and made better because of his presence. Thus his kindly and generous influence will continue to work for the betterment of mankind, not only through the lives of his educational colleagues and the many students who have come in direct touch with him, but through the better lives and greater deeds of those who have but talked with him, or known him, or who have been but touched by his influence through others made better by closer contact with him.

"It is but fitting that this council, as representing the citizens of Ann Arbor where he spent so many years of his active life, should feel his loss most keenly, and therefore,

"Be it resolved, that while we mourn the death of Dr. Angell, and while we realize that the country has lost one of its most distinguished citizens, we rejoice that he lived so grand and so full a life and that it was our good fortune to have had him as a friend, an acquaintance, and a fellow citizen for so many years for we have all been led to better and higher things because of his noble character.

"Be it further resolved, that these resolutions be made a part of the permanent record of this body, that they be published in the Times News, and that a copy be sent to the members of his family."

Annual Report of Fire Department.

To the Honorable Board of Fire Commissioners: Gentlemen—I herewith submit the 27th annual report of fire department, April 1st, 1915, to March 31st, 1916:

Station No. 1—One combination automobile pumper and hose, carrying 1,500 feet 2.2" hose, two three gal. chemicals and other tools.

One combination automobile city service truck and 40 gal. chemical tanks, two three gal. chemicals, 45 ft. extension ladder, 35 ft. extension ladder, one 28 ft., two 25 ft. 24'-20'-16' and two roof ladders, fully equipped with necessary tools.

One steam fire engine in reserve.

One aerial truck, 65 ft. ladder, 40 ft. extension, 30 ft. 24 ft. 20 ft. 16 ft. and roof ladder, two 3-gal and two 6-gal chemicals, equipped with all necessary tools, 3 horses.

One combination chemical and hose wagon carrying 1,000 ft. 2.2" hose, 50 gal chemical tank, two 3-gal chemicals, drawn by two horses.

Chief's wagon used for chimney and grass fires, inspecting hydrants, buildings, etc.

Exercise and supply wagon, with rope, chains, deluge set, etc.

Reserve hose wagon, 1,000 ft. 2.2" hose pipes, tools, etc.

Horses—We have 6 all in good condition. During the year 4 were sold.

Harness—We have one double and one three horse hitch and one single and one extra.

Horse barns are furnished complete with blankets, sponges, brushes, etc.
