Moved by Ald. Manwaring, that the matter be referred to the Cemetery committee, with power to employ some one to take Mr. Luippold's place temporarily, if he insists on his resignation being accepted. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12, Pres. not voting.

From the University of Michigan, relative curb and paving on State street, from present concrete retaining wall to North University eve.

May 4, 1916.

Honorable Council, City of Ann Arbor, Michigan: Gentlemen—A year ago last summer we constructed immediately east of the car tracks on State street, and south of Williams street, a re-enforced concrete retaining wall, which has added materially to the appearance of the former embankment. In order to improve the appearance similarly north of Williams street, we propose to continue the line of this curb to North University avenue, leaving a space approximately the width of William street where the present curb exists, that will be three or four feet wide, and out of line with our curb.

We have noticed that the pavement between the two turnouts of the street railway is badly in need of repair, and presume that some time soon you will undertake its replacement. This communication is to advise that when this is done we will be willing to build the curb, provided it is in line with the present retaining wall and the one which we are proposing to build, and that the city will provide the strip of pavement three or four feet wide between the present curb and the new one.

We are sure that by this co-operation we will add materially to the appearance of the street. I am enclosing a blue print of our drawing No.

729-N-7, explaining this matter in detail. Yours truly, James H. Marks, Superintendent.

To Board of Public Works:Gentlemen—I am presenting herewith plans and specifications for the installing of a heating system in fire station No. 1, boiler plant to be in basement of city building, and heat both city building and fire station. The estimated cost of this work, including engineering and contingencies, is \$2,500.00. Moved by Mr. Arnet, that Mr. Cornwell and Mr. James be a committee from the board to confer with a committee from the council on the matter, and report back to the board with such recommendations as they think best.

Moved by Ald. Fiegel, that the recommendation be accepted and the chair appoint such committee. Adopted, and Fire committee named.

From the Board of Public Works:

Engineer presented plans, specifications and estimate of cost for paving Miller Avenue.

City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, May 3, 1916.

To the Board of Public Works, Ann Arbor, Michigan: Sirs—I present herewith plans and specifications for the pavement on Miller avenue, from Main street to Seventh street.

Under the charter provision which allows an outstanding bond indebtedness of \$150,000, the City of Ann Arbor can, on the 1st of August, raise \$23,939.87. I have, therefore, estimated the cost of this pavement in four different ways, in order that you might choose between them. The first way, brick pavement from Main street to Seventh street, would cost as follows:

This, you will notice, is more than the amount which can be raised. The other three ways: first, brick pavement as far as Gott street, including intersections, 2d, reinforced concrete from Main street to 7th street; and 3d, a brick pavement to the west side of Spring street, and a reinforced concrete pavement from there to 7th street, would, I estimate, all cost less than the amount which it is possible to raise.

Resolved, further, that the sum of three thousand five hundred six dollars and forty cents (\$3,506.40) is hereby appropriated by virtue of the votes of the people of the city of Ann Arbor, authorizing the same, for the purpose of paying the bonds and interest due August 1st, 1916, for motorizing the fire department.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. A. Lutz presented an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to regulate and establish a line upon which barns, stables, chicken coops, sheds and other buildings shall be erected, and prevent the deposit of filth upon sidewalks or near line of streets or dwellings."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to erect, place, cause or permit, or allow to be erected, build, or place within a distance of thirty feet from the line of any avenue, or street, or within thirty feet of any dwelling house, situated upon an adjoining lot or parcel of land, in the City of Ann Arbor, any barn, stable, chicken coop, or other building shed, or inclosure, to be used, or which shall be used, for the purpose of securing or keeping any animal or animals or poultry, or for the purpose of storing or keeping hay, grain, or other food for any animal or animals or poultry or in which to

feed any animal or animals or poultry.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any persons or persons to deposit or cause to be deposited upon any sidewalk, or within thirty feet from the line of any avenue or street, or within thirty feet of any dwelling house, upon an adjoining lot or parcel of land any manure or other filth, or allow same to be dumped upon any premises owned or occupied by him, her or them, or cause or allow to be fastened or keep upon any premises owned or occupied by him, her, or them any animal or animals within thirty feet from the line of any street or avenue, for the purpose of keeping such animals in such place longer than twenty-four hours, including temporary removals, or for the purpose of using such place as a stable or feeding place for such animal or animals; provided, that this section shall not be construed to prevent any person from distributing over his premises manure for the purpose of benefiting the soil.

Section 3. Any person or persons violating any of the above provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars and the cost of such prosecution, and in default of payment of such fine the Court may make a further sentence that the offender be imprisoned in the County Jail of Washtenaw county, or any jail or lockup of said city until such fine and costs be paid. Provided such imprisonment shall not exceed ninety days.

This ordinance shall be in force and take effect on and after ten days from legal publication.

Which was given its first reading by title, passed to and given its second reading, and referred to the Ordinance committee by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Sewer Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your Sewer committee respectfully recommend that the gutter on the west side of Olivia avenue be deepened, from tile across said street east to Granger avenue.

That the City Engineer prepare plans, specifications and estimate of cost for storm sewers on Jefferson street, from Third to Sixth street, and on Madison street, from First to Fourth street.

I. L. Sherk, chairman Sewer Committee.

Ald. Sherk moved adoption of report and recommendation. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Street Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your street committee have had the following matter under consideration and recommend: That the proposition of the University of Michigan relative to the repair of the pavement between the turnouts and the pavements of State street, along the proposed new curb line, from present retaining wall to North University avenue, be accepted and work completed as soon as practicable.

That Baldwin avenue, from Wells street to south line of No 1024 Baldwin avenue, be graded and graveled.

Albert Fiegel, E. B. Manwaring, Frank E. Heck, Albert S. Lutz, and John McGregor, Street Committee.

Ald. Fiegel moved the adoption of the report, which was adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

By Ald. Fiegel: Resolved that plat of the Granger and Bixby addition to the City of Ann Arbor be accepted, and that W. H. Morton, agent for the Granger and Bixbys' deposit the sum of \$1,500.00 with the City Attorney with his bond of \$5,000.00, to insure the placing of the streets in a condition acceptable to the City Engineer. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres not voting.

To the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Sidewalk committee have had the following matter under consideration, and recommend that new sidewalks be constructed as follows:

No. 314 East Washington street (S. side Washington bet. 5th ave. and Division st.)

No. 320 East Washington (S. side Washington bet. 5th ave. and Division st.)

No. 307 South 4th ave (E. side 4th ave. bet. Liberty and William st.)

No. 309 South 4th ave (E. side 4th ave. bet. Liberty and William st.)

Front of property between No. 316 and No. 322 S. Main st.; 14 ft. wide

(W. side Main bet. Liberty and William st.)

Liberty street side No. 303 South Division st (S. side Liberty bet. Division and Thompson st.)

No. 406 East Liberty st. (S. side Liberty bet. Division and Thompson st.)

No. 503 East Liberty st. (except the west 15 feet), (N. side Liberty bet. Division and State st.)

No. 202 South Division st. (W. side Division bet. Washington and Liberty).

No. 611 North Main (W. side Main bet. Felch and Summit st.)

East side North Main st. from Summit st. south to No. 718 N. Main st.

West side North 7th st., beginning at north end of No. 209 North 7th street and running south to Bath street.

East side North 7th st., across and on both sides of culvert (about 36 feet in length) between Huron and Bath street.

East side South Main, from Madison st. south to Ann Arbor Buggy Co. property.

South side East Madison, from Main street east to Ann Arbor Railroad Co.'s right of way.

Resolved, that the construction of the foregoing sidewalks is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement, therefore it is hereby ordered that cement sidewalks be built along the property heretofore mentioned in this report.

Also erect suitable railing east side 8th, from culvert railing northwardly about 70 lineal feet.

In front of lot northwest corner Main and Mosely st., on Main st.

We further recommend that the following crosswalks and sidewalks be built by city:

New sidewalk in front of triangle, west side Detroit, from Summit to Beakes st. (city property).

Crosswalk across Summit, west side Detroit st.

Crosswalk (to replace old cobble stone crosswalk) across Kingsley, south side 4th ave. and extensions southwest corner.

Crosswalk across Willow street, south side 7th street.

Crosswalk across Jefferson street, east side 6th street.

New extensions northwest corner Madison and 5th avenue, and repair crosswalk across Madison, east side 5th avenue.

Ald. A. Lutz moved adoption of report and resolution, which was adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Fire Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your Fire committee, to whom the following matters were referred, respectfully recommend that the Board of Public Works be ordered to have the repairs to engine house No 1, made, as recommended by the Board of Fire Commissioners May 1st. 1916. The City Clerk to order such paint as is necessary to comply with the recommendation, and the firemen to do the painting.

William P. Flynn, Frank Heck, Albert Fiegel Fire Committee.

Ald. Flynn moved adoption of report, which was adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Lighting Committee.

To the Council: Gentlemen—Your Lighting committee have had the following matters under consideration, and recommend:

1st. That an arc street light be placed in center of Chapin street, twenty feet south of entrance to West park, and the tungsten light now in that locality removed.

2nd. That arc light now on arm at intersection of Jefferson and Main streets be placed in center of the intersection.

3rd. That tungsten light be removed from the northwest to the northeast corner of Clark and Ann streets.

4th. That an arc light be placed in center of intersection of South Univer-

sity avenue and Twelfth street, and tungsten light now there be removed.

5th. That arc light be placed on Washtenaw avenue, in center of street at intersection of Geddes avenue, about where manhole is in Washtenaw avenue, and that tungsten light now there be removed.

6th. That an arc light be placed in the center of intersection of Main and Philips street.

7th. That light on Bath street be moved about one hundred feet east, and placed on the south side of Bath street, opposite street, leading into Buchholz's court.

8th. Your committee further recommends that hereafter no arc lights be placed on arms.

Moved by Ald. McGregor, that report and recommendations be adopted. Adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Ald. Mayer moved adoption of report, and recommendation which was adopted by unanimous vote of those present, 12. Pres. not voting.

Special Committee.

Mr. President: As a delegate appointed by your Honor to represent the City Council of the City of Ann Arbor at the Good Roads convention, held at Battle Creek, May 10 and 11, I beg to report as brief as possible. The meeting I was told was the greatest gathering of the kind ever held in Michigan. The big feature of the convention was the discussion of Detroit-Chicago highway or trunk-line.

I can say I have never seen a more enthusiastic meeting of Boosters for

any cause in my life. There was nothing directly interesting for cities and villages, nevertheless we heard a great deal which we could apply to the building and maintaining of pavements and dirt roads in our city.

I could not begin to give you the full program, but if you will bear with me I will try and give you a few thoughts that proved most interesting to me.

Our honorable and popular Governor, Woodbridge N. Ferris, addressed the convention, in which he declared that Good Roads meant improved rural conditions, greater rural population, shorter distances to churches and schools; where there are now three schools, he declared one with better teachers would be more efficient, and building good roads was the highest form of patriotism, as it was a lasting service to the community.

Mr. M. O. Eldridge, assistant in road economics of the United States Dept. of Agriculture, gave an interesting illustrated lecture on road construction.

W. W. Cox, inspecting engineer of the State Dept., gave a talk on road maintainance.

There was a great deal said about permanent roads, but we were also told that there was no such thing, as every kind of road will require maintainance.

Mr. Cox advises the patrol system of maintainance, as the most practical way to keep roads in first class condition. He further said that he finds dragging is usually done too late; it should be done after a rain when the material is still wet and will bind.

Supervisor Jno. W. Boardman of Jackson county said they have spent \$75,000 in gravel roads the last four years, and today they have practically nothing. In this not all agreed with him as a gravel road properly built was good.

C. C. Jacobus, chairman of the committee on highways and bridges, of Milwaukee county, said his experience was not satisfactory where concrete roads were built with unwashed gravel. He also advised going over the roads once or twice every year, and repair same as soon as defect is noticeable, in that way they can be kept in good shape and not cost over \$25.00 per mile.

Thursday morning the delegates on special cars were taken to Urbandale to see the laying of the first block of

paved road on the Detroit-Chicago road outside of Wayne county. This was for demonstration only, because the engineer found the gravel contained a spongy sand stone not to be used in concrete pavement. I was told this stone absorbs moisture and in cold weather it expands so that it "pops," blowing holes in the concrete, consequently the output of that pit was condemned and the supply will be gotten elsewhere. This road is being built 16 feet wide, single course type, and mixture 1-1 1-2-3, varying somewhat according to the size of gravel. Cost per mile as I remember it, is \$14,000. They receive from State reward \$3,400, the balance to be paid by the abutting property, township, and county, such proportions as the Highway Commissioners shall designate. I am convinced that good roads will do more for us all than we at present realize; that good roads will mean as much for the next generations as the steam roads in the past. As one of the speakers said, there is no other device which modern life can suggest which will reach out into the farthest sections of the townships and counties and put the population in touch with the central life of the various communities of the State, as will good roads, built and maintained to carry the traffic which they will have to bear. Those who have followed these matters in cities know that paving a street will immediately cause a bettering of conditions upon that street; the houses are repaired and better kept, flower beds will appear, sidewalks built, etc.

If the country roads were equally treated, there is no question but the same change would be quickly noticed. Paved roads connecting cities and towns will bring about an intensive farming along the line of such highways, which will mean smaller places but better kept ones. Country life will then in a short time be regarded as it is by many even now, as the most desirable kind of life.

The president of the association, Mr. Colgrove, said it was very important that more boosters among the farmers themselves were needed. If they could only be aroused to take hold of this matter, they could get good roads leading into every section in the next few years, decreasing the cost of marketing their products and making the roads accessible all the year round.

L. C. Smith, deputy state highway commissioner, told some changes that were made in the road laws.

One new law permits the State Department to order grade separations at dangerous railroad crossings. Another increases the required strength of bridges from ten to fifteen tons. And another, in regard to the election of road commissioners, which moves the election from spring to fall, so that they can take office in the winter and have time to plan their work.

Now one thing more and that is in regard to the dust nuisance. I was surprised from all the information I could get, I did not find one man that was in favor of oiling any kind of street or road. Mr. W. J. Cleary, the road engineer of Berrien county, said oil will not make a road good and if it is not properly applied it is liable to make a good road bad. What seemed most reasonable to me was the information I received from Prof. Cox, of our University, who had in charge a display from the highway department, who also told me he was not in favor of oil on our streets, as it only made it appear as though there was no dust, but you could see it on the back of vehicles, on the fences and trace it in the houses. He said what is so often neglected was the proper care of streets early in the spring, the time when the frost is coming out, when most people would say it was too wet, but he declared that was the proper time to grade and drag the roads, omitting sod, old leaves and other material to be scraped in the road, as that would only grind up and make the dust which carries the germs in the air which we must breath.

As to our pavements, the only practical solution by men of experience, was the purchasing of a street flusher, providing our sewer was properly arranged for that, which would cleanse the streets from all fine material, also leaves, horse droppings, etc., is soon ground up by the traffic and blown from the pavements which carry with it tubercular and other diseases as quickly as anything else.

In closing I wish to say in my mind the convention was a great success.

I regret, however, that we did not have a larger delegation present, and especially men that are and should be interested along the line of good roads. To my knowledge there were

only three representatives from the county present, namely Mr. Wagner and Mr. Waite from Dexter, and myself. Hoping that in the near future this county will enjoy its proportion of good roads, with other counties of the State.

Annual Report of The Board of Park Commissioners.

Ann Arbor, Michigan, May 1st, 1916.
To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—We beg to submit a report of the work done by the Ann Arbor Park Commission for the year ending May 1st, 1916, together with a detailed financial statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Park Department for the same period. An itemized budget was presented one year ago to the Council, stating in detail the work to be done during the year 1915-16, and we wish to report that all the work contemplated at that time and for which the Council allowed in our annual appropriation, has been completed with but one exception.

The installation of toilet and sewer connections at West Park, due to the fact that until late last fall the city had not installed a sewer which could be reached.

The work is now being done, however, and one hundred and fifty dollars more is needed to complete it.

In order that this work could be completed and ready for public use by the opening of the season this spring, the contract was let and the work begun.

Olmsted Brothers, of Brookline, Mass., are still working on a general plan for development for the city and surrounding property, and another year will complete it. The first year's installment in our budget for this work has not been touched as yet, and remains in reserve in our balance for the year.

Briefly stated, the important work done during the past year, aside from general maintenance and improvements, is as follows:

Power lawn mower and roller used on park, tennis courts and ball diamond.

Shade tree nursery started, with 925 seedlings, at an initial expense of \$50.00, and which in five years will cost at least \$1,000 to purchase.

Grand stand at Burns park repaired.

Riverside park extension made and improved by the planting of several hundred shrubs, trees and vines.

Shade trees on parks trimmed, together with trees on streets mentioned in the financial statement, and over one hundred dead trees and poplars removed.

Together with the work on our parks, drives and shade trees, the department has furnished expert advice and assistance to all residents of Ann Arbor in regard to the care and planting of trees and shrubs, and general improvement of their property. Approximately five hundred calls have been made throughout the year on work of this nature. Also, a systematic spraying campaign has been organized, whereby any resident can get spraying properly done and at moderate prices. Several hundred fruit trees and other trees and shrubs in the city have been sprayed in this way.

A shrubbery campaign has been conducted each spring and fall, since the spring of 1913, and a total of over 35,000 shrubs, trees and vines have been purchased by no less than 900 residents of the city, since the beginning. Approximately 5,000 plants are purchased each season through this campaign, by at least 125 residents.

Another achievement which our department has been instrumental in helping carry out, is a Yard and Garden contest, together with public gardens for the children in each ward

of the city. Our ambition is to stimulate a desire for gardens and well-kept yards which will unconsciously benefit our city and its inhabitants in many ways. From present indications, more than 400 children will be enrolled in our public gardens this year.

All these various public enterprises, we believe, are for the interests and betterment of the community at large as well as a great convenience to the residents of the city.

In accordance with a special election held on September 10th, 1915, two additional pieces of property have been purchased by the city for park purposes, from the proceeds of bonds sold for that purpose; better than seven acres from Mr. Michael Fritz adjoining West park, and about one and one-half acres of land in a triangular piece bounded by Washtenaw ave., Baldwin ave., and Cambridge road.

Both of these properties were purchased at a low cost to the city, the Fritz property being purchased for what the owner paid for it several years before, and the city paid but

one-fourth the cost of the Triangle on Washtenaw, the residents in that neighborhood contributing the balance. With rolling topography and beautiful shade trees, these two pieces of property are both ideal lands for park purposes, and favorably located, making a fine addition to our present park system.

The Board of Park Commissioners also wishes to present at this time its estimates of expenses for the coming year. Aside from the general cost of maintenance, there are several important items mentioned, among which are the following:

Two new tennis courts; a concrete bridge at the Island; grading inside of track at Burns park; playground apparatus, and service machine for the department.

While our budget calls for a larger appropriation than heretofore, we trust that the Common Council will consider seriously the various items mentioned therein.
