Communications.

From the Mayor—

Sept. 5, 1916.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, City of Ann Arbor: Gentlemen—Since our last meeting we have had the misfortune to lose, by death, our respected Chief of Police, Frank Pardon. His death has made vacant the office filled by him. However, since the time intervening between now and the spring election is so short that an appointee to that office would scarcely become familiar with the duties of that office, when a change might again be made, I do not deem it wise to at this time appoint a Chief of police. It is my intention, therefore, to allow the present Police Sergeant, Thomas O'Brien, to continue as acting Chief of Police for the balance of the unexpired term of the late Chief of Police.

It is my intention, by acting as I have outlined above, to save to the present Police Sergeant, his present position. However, I feel that he should be compensated for the extra work involved, and the responsibilities which will rest upon him during the time that he is acting Chief of Police. I trust that the Council will take the matter up at once and act in accordance with this recommendation.

Later, I expect to appoint another patrolman, so as to bring the police force up to its usual strength. The appointment being made with the understanding that it is only for the time that the Police Sergeant is acting Chief of Police.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Sink presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading:

An ordinance to amend Section twenty-five, and repeal Section twenty-six, of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Relative to Parks, Boulevards and Lawn Extensions within the City of Ann Arbor." passed Oct. 7th, 1907; approved October 16, 1907; amended May 2, 1910; amended August 3d, 1914.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That section twenty-five of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance relative to Parks, Boulevards and Lawn Extensions within the City of Ann Arbor, passed Oct. 7, 1907; approved Oct. 16, 1907. be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25. On the drive known as "Cedar Bend Drive," vehicles must enter from Broadway and go down hill past Island, and exit at Wall st. bridge, EXCEPT, that vehicles may enter at Wall st. bridge and go as far as the Island shelter, in the opposite direction. On Glen drive vehicles shall enter from Geddes ave. or from Observatory st., at the Observatory, and go down hill along the river, and exit on Fuller st., at the foot of Observatory st. hill.

Sec. 2. That section twenty-six of said ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Passed by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Fiegel, Heusel, A. Lutz, Mayer, Heck, Flynn, Donnelly, Manwaring, Sherk, Freeman, Sink, Geo. Lutz, 12. Nays, none.

Ald. Sink presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An ordinance to prohibit the turning on of water for any premises from the water works system of the city of Ann Arbor, by any person other than an employee of the Water Works Department, or the Fire Department, of the City of Ann Arbor.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any persons, other than an employee of the Water Works Department, or the Fire Department of the City of Ann Arbor, by himself or his agent, by false key or otherwise, after the water has been cut off from any premises, to cause or suffer the water from the water works system of the city of Ann Arbor to be turned on to any such premises, or to in any way cause any premises to be supplied with water from said water works system, without a permit from the water works department of the city of Ann Arbor, PROVIDED, however, that this section does not prevent any licensed plumber of the city of Ann Arbor from turning on the water to any premises for the purpose of testing his work, the water being immediately turned off after such test is completed.

Sec. 2. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than

twenty-five dollars, and costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment of such fine, such person or persons shall be imprisoned in the Washtenaw county jail until such fine and costs are paid, not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That section four of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance prohibiting persons under sixteen years of age from being in the streets, alleys or other public places of the City of Ann Arbor after certain hours of the night," passed March 3, 1913; approved March 13, 1913; amended November 2, 1914, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. That the striking of the clock on the Court House and the striking of the campus clock at the hours named in this ordinance or such other signals as the Council may from time to time by resolution designate shall be the signal of the curfew hour. The failure to sound the curfew signal shall not be a defense to any action brought for a violation of this ordinance.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after ten days from legal publication.

Sewer Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Sewer

committee has had the following matters under consideration, and respectfully recommends that sanitary sewer be constructed on all streets in Killns' Heights sub-division.

We have had the petition of Charles E. Barthell, et al., for storm sewer on Vinewood and Washtenaw avenues, under consideration but owing to lack of funds we cannot recommend the construction of the same this year.
