By Ald. Heusel: Whereas, This common council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of Broadway street between the bridge over the Michigan Central Railroad and the northerly line of the intersection of Broadway and Swift street, within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Mich; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of that part of Broadway street, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be a necessary public improvement; therefore

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause Broadway street, within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor, and in pursuance of the prayer of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of such public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections, engineering expenses and twenty percent of the remaining shall be paid by the city, and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting Broadway street, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition, along with this determination, be and the same is hereby re-

ferred, to the Board of Public Works with directions to report to the Council with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expenses of such improvement.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Mayer presented the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION THREE OF AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE PUBLIC CARRIAGES, OMNIBUSES, HACKS, CABS, AUTOMOBILES, TAXICABS, AND TO PRESCRIBE THE RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF THE OWNERS AND DRIVERS THEREOF," PASSED AUGUST NINETEENTH, 1918, APPROVED AUGUST TWENTY-FIRST, 1918.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That section three of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to license public carriages, omnibuses, hacks, cabs, automobiles, taxicabs, and to prescribe the rights and duties of the owners and drivers thereof," passed August twenty-first, 1918, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. The application set forth in the preceding section shall be accompanied by a license fee as follows: For any person, persons, firm or corporation having a bona fide residence within the City of Ann Arbor, five dollars (\$5.00) each for the first five hacks, omnibuses or other vehicles drawn by two horses, to be used by such person, persons, firm or corporation in the conveying of passengers within the City of Ann Arbor for hire, and one dollar (\$1.00) for each of said hacks, omnibuses or other vehicles over five owned by the same person, persons, firm or corporation. Four dollars (\$4.00) each for the first five hacks, omnibuses or other vehicles drawn by one horse, to be used by such person, persons, firm or corporation in conveying passengers within the limits of the said city for hire, and one dollar (\$1.00) for each of said hacks, omnibuses or other vehicles over five owned by the same person, persons, firm or corporation. Eight dollars (\$8.00) each for the first ten automobiles, taxicabs or vehicles driven by motor power and having a standard rated carrying capacity of five people or less; and to be used by such person, persons, firm or corporation for conveying passengers within the limits of the said city for hire; and two dollars (\$2.00) for each of said automobiles or motor vehicles over ten owned by the same person, persons, firm or corporation. Fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for each and every

automobile, taxicab or other vehicle driven by motor power, having a standard rated carrying capacity of not more than ten or less than five people, to be used by such person, persons, firm or corporation in conveying passengers within the limits of the said city for hire. Twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each and every automobile, taxicabs or other vehicle driven by motor power, having a standard rated carrying capacity to exceed ten people, used by such person, persons, firm or corporation in conveying passengers within the limits of said city for hire. The license fee for all such public vehicles owned by any such person, persons, firm or corporation not residing in the City of Ann Arbor shall be double those charged to resident owners. Said license fee shall be for a period of one year, to and including the first day of May following the granting of said license. Provided, however, in case said applicant shall desire only to operate said public vehicle or public vehicles for a short time, the license fee shall be as follows: The sum of two dollars (\$2.00) per day for each and every hack, omnibus or other vehicle drawn by one horse; three dollars per day for each and every hack, omnibus or other vehicle drawn by two horses or more; five dollars per day for each and every automobile, taxicab or other vehicle driven by motor power, having a standard rated carrying capacity of five people or less and seven dollars per day for each and every automobile, taxicab or other vehicle driven by motor power, having a standard rated carrying capacity of not to exceed ten or less than five people. Eight dollars per day for each and every automobile, taxicab or other vehicle driven by motor power, having a standard rated carrying capacity of not to exceed ten people. Provided, further, that any person, persons, firm or corporation desiring to take out a license as aforesaid, shall file with said application a bond in the penal sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of a common carrier, and of each and every one of the provisions of this ordinance, and that he, she or they will not run or allow any other persons to run any public vehicle not owned by them under the license issued on account of this application, and that said licensee shall pay all fines and penalties which may be im-

posed upon him for violation of any of the provisions of the ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor, said bond to be approved by the City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.
