#### From Board of Public Works.

Clerk reported that matter of submitting program of public works for next year was referred by Council to Street committee and the Board of Public Works.

The following members of Street committee were present: Ald. Henderson, Slauson, Groves, Spathelf, MacGregor.

The following recommendation to Council was adopted: That storm water sewers be constructed during year 1921 as follows: On Hill st. from Church st. to Lincoln ave.; on N. State st. from Huron st. to Huron river; on Granger ave. from Golden ave. to Olivia ave. and on Olivia ave. from Granger ave. to Wells st. and on Packard st. from Granger ave. to Brooklyn ave., and

ditch on Golden ave. On June 7, 1920, council authorized Board to re-advertise for bids for or proceed with construction of the foregoing storm sewers. Action was deferred by Board on account of cost of labor and materials.

Also that storm water sewers be ordered constructed in alley in B. 2 N., R. 3 E.; in alley in B. 3 N., R. 4 E., and on Beakes st. from Kingsley st. to Depot st.; on Hill st. from Oswego st. to Onondaga st.; and on Washtenaw ave. and N. Main st. and on such intersecting streets to Washtenaw ave. and N. Main st. as may be necessary before Washtenaw ave. and N. Main st. are paved.

It was further recommended that following streets be paved in year 1922 in order named as near as possible:

State st. from Huron st. to Fuller st.; Packard st., from Granger ave. to city limits; Hill st. from State st. to Washtenaw ave.; alley in B. 2 N., R. 3 E.; Monroe st. to E. University ave.; Miller ave. from Seventh st. to Gott st.; alley in B. 3 N., R. 4 E.

Finance Committee.

Ald Lutz moved the adoption of report, which was adopted by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Slauson, Henderson, Lucas, Groves, Donnelly, Moore, Spathelf, Freeman, MacGregor, Lutz, Pres. Lewis, 11. Nays, none.

Ald. Lutz presented City Engineer's estimates for construction of curb and gutters as follows: For Thos. Hession, contractor, Dist. No. 3, final estimate, amount now due, \$134.16; Dist. No. 4, second estimate, amount now due, \$710.64; Dist. No. 5, final estimate, amount now due, \$169.44; Dist. No. 9, final estimate, amount now due, \$102.24. For A. F. Thompson, contractor, Dist. No. 6, final estimate, amount now due, \$119.64; Dist. No. 7, second estimate, amount now due, \$642.60; Dist. No. 8, final estimate, amount now due, \$142.38. City engineer presented bills due city for cement as follows: Thos. Hession, \$230.26 and A. F. Thompson, \$35.60.

Moved by Mr. Hutzel, that estimates be approved and we recommend to Council that the City Clerk be authorized to draw warrants for amounts now due contractors when bills due city are paid.

Moved by Ald. Lutz, that recommendation of Board be concurred in.

Enter Ald. Reichert.

Ald. Lutz presented City Engineer's estimates as follows: 12th estimate for construction of pavement in Dist. No. 43, Letchfield & Stewart, contractors, amount now due, \$1,154.23; and 12th estimate for construction of pavement in Dist. No. 44, Letchfield & Stewart, contractors, amount now due, \$1,-

369.07 ;and following action of Board of Public Works thereon.

Moved by Mr. Rentschler, that estimates be approved and recommended to Council for payment, provided that Ann Arbor Asphalt Construction Co. presents written guarantee to complete the pavements satisfactory to this Board, and provided, further, that said guarantee be approved by City Attorney.

Moved by Ald. Lutz that the 12th estimates presented to the Board of Public Works by the City Engineer for Letchfield & Stewart, contractors, on paving districts Nos. 43 and 44 be allowed and the clerk be authorized to draw necessary warrants, when Board of Public Works reconsider their action on the allowance of said estimates and approve of the allowance of said estimates without requiring any guarantee from the Ann Arbor Asphalt Company.

#### **Ordinance Committee.**

Ald. Reichert presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

An ordinance to license and regulate the operation of Turkish coffee houses, commonly called coffee houses, in the city of Ann Arbor, Washtenaw county, Michigan. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, ordain:

Sec. 1. This ordinance shall apply to that class of business places commonly called "Turkish Coffee Houses," or "Coffee Houses," in the city of Ann Arbor. The words "Turkish Coffee House," or "Coffee House," shall mean and include a place of business where coffee is made and served for pay, or given away; or a place where coffee is made and served to patrons of the place, where the playing of cards as a pastime is permitted; where singing and dancing is permitted; where some form of amusement is provided for its patrons, and where the place is frequented generally by foreigners; but the same shall not include hotels, restaurants, or ice cream parlors.

Sec. 2. No person, firm or corporation shall be entitled to oper-

ate as a business, a "Turkish Coffee House," or "Coffee House," in the city of Ann Arbor, Mich., as herein specified, without first having obtained a license for that purpose from the mayor, as provided herein. Each person, firm or corporation desiring to engage in said business shall file with the city clerk, to be presented to the mayor, a written application under oath, stating the name of the proprietor of the business, location, street and number of the place of business.

Sec. 3. The mayor may, in his discretion, if he is satisfied that the statements contained in the application are true, grant a permit based upon such application to said applicant.

Sec. 4. After such permit is granted, and upon payment in advance of a license fee herein provided for, the City Clerk shall issue to the applicant a license to operate such business. Such license shall not be transferable.

Sec. 5. All licenses granted under this ordinance shall expire on the first (1) day of May subsequent to the date of issue.

Sec. 6. For every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of operating such "Coffee House," the license fee shall be twenty-five dollars per year, payable in advance; provided, the rate for any license issued after December first (1st) of each year shall be one-half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) of the annual rate.

Sec. 7. All such places of business commonly known as "Turkish Coffee Houses, or "Coffee Houses," shall be closed from 11 o'clock p. m. until 6 o'clock a. m. of each calendar or week day, and shall be closed from 12 o'clock p. m. on Saturday until 6 o'clock a. m. the next day; and at all times when such place or places may be open, any member of the police department of the city of Ann Arbor, or the sheriff, or any deputy of the county, may enter the same freely and inspect the same.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons in any such "Coffee House," at any time, to play cards or dice therein for the purpose of gambling or betting upon such cards or dice, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons in any such "Coffee House"

to play cards therein on a Sunday.

Sec. 9. The mayor may, on his own initiative, for incompetency, or for any unlawful act, or any improper conduct, suspend or revoke any license under the provisions of this ordinance. The mayor shall give his reasons for revoking said license to the Common Council in writing and the finding of the mayor in such matter shall be conclusive and final; provided, further, that the City Marshal or Acting City Marshal may, for any of the causes enumerated in this ordinance, suspend any license granted under this ordinance for a period of twenty-four (24) hours, and cause such license to be delivered up to him, and he shall forthwith report in writing such action to the mayor, and upon the approval of the mayor, in writing, the license shall stand revoked or suspended.

Sec. 10. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and costs of prosecution, or be imprisoned in the county jail of Washtenaw county, for not more than ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

#### Bond Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your bond committee has had the following bonds under consideration and recommends approval of the same:
