Assessor's plat No. 4 in the City of Ann Arbor, which was approved

by Board of Public Works October 20, 1920, was presented, and on motion of Ald. Lutz plat was approved by unanimous vote of those present, 12.

From Board of Water Commissioners.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Dec. 16, 1920
Resolution by Commissioner Cornwell, supported by Com. Lindenschmitt,

Whereas, the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor has made a thorough investigation of the needs of said city for a water supply, and

Whereas, the said city has already acquired lands and made certain extensive expenditures in connection with the procurement of a water supply for its inhabitants at a place known as the Steere farm in the township of Pittsfield, county of Washtenaw and State of Michigan, and

Whereas, said Board of Water Commissioners has determined that it is necessary to obtain additional land adjoining its lands in said township of Pittsfield upon which to sink wells to supply water to the inhabitants of said city, and

Whereas, the said city has been unable to agree with the owners of the land desired for said public improvement on a price commensurate with the true value of said land, and

Whereas, said lands are required by the city of Ann Arbor for a necessary public improvement,

Therefore, Be it Resolved by this Board that the land described in the attached Resolution is necessary for said public improvement, and that the taking of said property by condemnation is necessary for the use and benefit of the said city of Ann Arbor.

Resolved further that the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor be requested by this Board to pass said attached Resolution.

Council Action

Resolution offered by Alderman Moore:

Whereas, the city of Ann Arbor, a public corporation of the State of Michigan, desires to obtain and secure an adequate supply of water for said city, the said public cor-

poration, and for the use and benefit of the public, and

Whereas, the said public corporation, the said city of Ann Arbor, has already acquired certain lands and made extensive expenditures in connection with the procurement of a water supply for its inhabitants at a place known as the Steere farm in the township of Pittsfield, county of Washtenaw and State of Michigan, and

Whereas, the growth of the city and increase of population have made it necessary for the use and benefit of the public that an adequate supply of water should be obtained and secured, and that additional land is necessary upon which to sink wells for said public improvement to supply water to the inhabitants of said city, and

Whereas, the following described pieces and parcels of land have been selected and determined by the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor as a necessary part or portion of the lands required for such public improvement:

Parcel 1. "Commencing at the center of the northwest quarter of section sixteen, town three south, range six east, being at the southeast corner of the northwest quarter of said section sixteen, thence south 50 degrees west along the north line of land deeded to Christian and George Miller to the center of the northwest quarter of said section sixteen, thence 20 degrees west along the center of the said highway to the south line of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of said section sixteen, thence east along said line to the place of beginning."

Parcel 2. "Commencing on the south line of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section sixteen at a point twenty rods west of the center of said quarter section, thence north parallel with the west line of said quarter section ten chains and thirty-seven links, thence west parallel with the north line of said section ten chains and ninety-three links to the center of the road, thence southerly 20 degrees east along the center of the road to the south line of said quarter section, thence east eight chains and twenty-six links to the place of beginning; being ten acres more or less.

"Also a piece or parcel commencing on the west line of the east quarter of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of section sixteen, ten chains and thirty-seven links north of the half quarter line, thence west parallel to the north side of the section, eleven chains and ninety-three links to the center of the highway; thence north 20 degrees west along the center of the highway to a point in the section line thirty-seven links east of the northwest corner of said section, thence east fourteen chains and sixty-three links to the west line of the east quarter of said northwest quarter, thence south to the place of beginning, containing twelve and 92-100 acres of land, reserving and excepting about one acre of land in the northwest corner of the last named description which was deeded by Hudson T. Morton to James H. Mead, the sixteenth day of March, 1878, and recorded the sixteenth day of March, 1878, in Liber 86 of Deeds on page 385. The above description of land is situated in town three south, range six east."

Parcel 3. "Also beginning at a point in the middle of the pole road fifty feet south of the east and west center line of the northwest quarter of section sixteen, thence west along the north line of land belonging to the city of Ann Arbor to the east line of the Davison place, thence north to the corner of the East place, thence east to the center of the pole road; thence southeasterly along the center of the pole road to the place of beginning, containing nineteen acres of land more or less."

Parcel 4. "Also beginning at a point in the pole road in section sixteen, that point being the northeast corner of land owned by Edward I. Steere, thence west along the line of land belonging to the said Edward I. Steere to the southeast corner of a four acre plot of land belonging to Mrs. East; thence north along the east line of this plot to the south line of the East farm; thence east along the said south line of the East farm to the center of the pole road. Thence along the center of the pole road southeasterly to the place of beginning, containing eleven and 3-10 acres more or less.

All of said described lands lying in Sections sixteen and seventeen in the township of Pittsfield, county of Washtenaw and State of Michigan.

And whereas, the Common Council of said municipality, the said public corporation, deems it necessary for the public interest to acquire said above described lands adjoining lands now owned by said public corporation, and that the said municipality, the said public corporation, has the constitutional and statutory right to acquire the same for public use, and

Whereas, the city of Ann Arbor, the said public corporation, has endeavored to purchase the above described lands from the owners thereof, and is unable to agree with the owners of said described property for said public improvement on a price at all commensurate with the true value of said lands,

Now therefore, Be it Resolved, by the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor that the securing of an adequate water supply for said municipality is a necessary public improvement for the inhabitants of said city, and that the taking of the above described property be and is hereby declared necessary for the use and benefit of the said municipality, said public corporation, and of the public, and that said public improvement is a necessity and that the city attorney for the city of Ann Arbor, in behalf of said city of Ann Arbor, the said public corporation, shall institute the necessary proceedings in behalf of said public corporation, said municipality, to carry out the object of this Resolution in regard to taking said private property above described by condemnation for the use and benefit of the public, and that said city attorney shall sign and verify a proper petition in the Circuit Court for the county of Washtenaw for the condemnation and taking of said above described property and sign all other papers necessary or proper in the conduct of said condemnation proceedings.

Gentlemen:

In order to construct concrete stands on the north side of the present gridiron, Ferry Field, and the completion of a modern Stadium on that site it is quite desirable that a portion of the construction extend beyond the present North Property Line into Hoover Avenue. The amount and location of such encroachment is indicated on the accompanying drawing and is more fully described as follows:

At a point approximately 53 feet above south sidewalk on Hoover ave. an overhang of about four feet.

Footings for columns along south line of Hoover Avenue to project under the sidewalk about three feet at an elevation of approximately five feet below sidewalk level.

Your permission is respectfully requested for use of the street to the extent indicated.

Resolved, that the curb and gutter on Oxford road, between Hill street and South University avenue, known as District No. 2; that the curb and gutter on Forest avenue, from Willard street to Hill street, known as District No. 3; that the curb and gutter on Hill street, from Lincoln avenue to Washtenaw avenue, known as District No. 4; that the curb and gutter on Cambridge road, from Lincoln avenue to Baldwin avenue, known as District No. 5; that the

curb and gutter on Martin place, from the alley to Wells street, known as District No. 6; that the curb and gutter on Hill street, from Oswego street to Berkshire road, known as District No. 7; that the curb and gutter on East University avenue, from Hill street to Oakland avenue, known as District No. 8, and that the curb and gutter on Forest avenue, from South University avenue to Willard street, known as District No. 9, within the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, heretofore ordered, in the opinion of the Common Council are, and are hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Resolved, further, that all the lands, tenements and premises hereinafter mentioned in each particular district are deemed and declared to be benefited by the construction and completion of the respective curb and gutter heretofore ordered, and it is hereby ordered and determined that all the costs of the said respective public improvements, street intersections and 50 percent of the balance of the cost of said public improvements excepted, shall be and is hereby ordered to be levied on and assessed against the lands, tenements and premises situated in the respective special assessment districts hereinafter designated, and the said special assessment districts are hereby fixed as follows, to-wit:

Resolved, further, that the sum of \$535.84 for District No. 2; the sum of \$755.48 for District No. 3; the sum of \$855.15 for District No. 4; the sum of \$1,030.68 for District No. 5; the sum of \$628.36 for District No. 6; the sum of \$1,189.57 for District No. 7; the sum of \$740.94 for District No. 8; and the sum of \$584.40 for District No. 9, is hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of such respective public improvements at street and alley intersections, and 50 percent of the balance of costs of said public improvements; all of which sums of money, in four equal annual installments with interest, be and the same are hereby ordered and required to be levied, spread and assessed on and upon each and every of the regular annual assessment rolls of the city of Ann Arbor, and on and against all the taxable property within the said city, in and during the period in which any part of this appropria-

tion and assessment is or shall be payable.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk do certify this determination and order of assessments to the City Assessor, pursuant to law.
