Ald. Groves presented the following bills: American Sewer Pipe Co. for Amco blocks \$523.30; S. P. Lockwood, refund of money paid last year for calcium chloride which was not applied, \$125.10.

Ald. Groves moved that bills be allowed and city clerk authorized to draw warrants for same.

Adopted by following vote, Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Slauson, Lucas, Groves, Donnelly, Moore, Spathelf, Freeman, MacGregor, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 11. Nays, none.

Ald. Groves presented bill of Besch and Gutekunst for one month's compensation upon garbage contract as per bid, \$1,273.33.

By Ald. Groves:

Resolved, that this bill be allowed and the Clerk be authorized to draw a warrant for the same in favor of the contractors when the contract as drawn by the City Attorney has been executed by the contractors and the bond provided for therei has been furnished and approved by the City Attorney

By Ald. Groves:

Resolved, that the City Clerk be and is hereby directed to draw a warrant in favor of H. H. Wagoner for the balance due him upon the completion of the incinerator plant on Fuller st. after deducting the amount paid for labor or materials by the City and charged against said account when he has received a notification from the City Engineer that the plant has been completed to his satisfaction and when an assignment of the patent has been made to the City of Ann Arbor and has been approved by the City Attorney.

Adopted by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Sugden, Slauson, Lucas, Groves, Donnelly, Moore, Spathelf, Freeman, MacGregor, Reichert, Pres. Lewis, 11. Nays, none.

Ald. Groves stated that Besch and Gutekunst have objected to the signing of the contract for the collection of the garbage of the City of Ann Arbor claiming that they understood that the sum to be paid to Wagoner upon the completion of the incinerator plant was to be \$2,400. However, the proposal offered by the contractors provided that they would pay to the city of Ann Arbor the sum which the City would pay to Wagoner according to the proposal then on file with the City Clerk. Wagoner's proposal as then on file with the City Clerk was the sum of \$2,400 and interest on the same at the legal rate for three years, making a total payment to Wagoner of \$2,760.

The contractors also ask that they be given more than six months time, as now provided in the contract, in which to pay to the City this sum of \$2,760.

The matter was referred to special committee, the Mayor, President of Council, City Attorney, City Engineer and Health Officer.

### Ordinance Committee
