Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Sugden presented the following ordinance which was given its second reading by unanimous vote of those present, passed to and given its third reading:

An Ordinance to amend an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to curbs and gutters, passed May 6th, 1918, approved May 7th, 1918, amended July 5, 1920."

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. That Section seven of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance relative to curbs and gutters passed May 6th, 1918 and approved May 7th, 1918 and amended July 5th, 1920," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. After the certification of any such assessment district as provided in Section 6 of this Ordinance the Common Council may, at any regular meeting thereof, by resolution, adopted by a majority of all the members elect, authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute under their hands and the seal of the City of Ann Arbor,

bonds of said City payable to bearer four years from the date of issue.

All such bonds shall be known as "Curb and Gutter Bonds" and issued in series conforming with the number of the curb and gutter districts on account of which any such bonds shall have been issued. All such bonds shall be delivered by the City Clerk to the City Treasurer provided that not more than Forty Thousand Dollars in amount of any such bonds shall be outstanding at any one time.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after legal publication.

The Chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Sewer Committee Report.

To the Honorable, the Common Council, Gentlemen: Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer, relative to the construction of lateral sewers in sewer districts No. 98, on Soule Blvd. from Maxwell ave. to Elder Blvd.; No. 99, on Elder Blvd, from Soule Blvd. to Buchanan ave.; No. 100, on Lutz ave. from Elder Blvd, to Eber-White Blvd; Dist. No. 101, on Pontiac st. from Moore st. to City Limits; Dist. No. 102, on Onondaga st. from Hill st. to Dorset Road; Dist. No. 103, on Seventh st from Madison st. to Davis ave., begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports, as well as resolution of Council, under consideration and have made due inquiries relating thereto and have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of such lateral sewers in said districts, and that special taxing or assessment districts ought to be fixed by the common council upon and against which the construction of such sewers may be charged, street intersections excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided.

Your committee further recommends that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said districts be prepared by the City Engineer, and

the Board of Public Works ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of above named sewers.

Your committee further recommends that matter of Cook Spring Co. assessment in sewer district No 94, and also the matter of raising funds for converting Allen's Creek into a storm sewer or a county drain be referred to City Attorney to report to Council at next meeting.
