That it shall be un-Section 1. law ul for any person, firm or corporation for themselves or as agen s, renters or lessees, to 10cate, build, erect, construct, maintain or op rate any public gasoline or oil fill.ng station or sales depot on or within 190 feet from the curb lin of any street in the city construct or maintain or to d driveway from the street over the curb and sid walk to such public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot, when three- ourths of the buildings on both sides of the street for a distance of 500 feet in either direction from the proposed loaction of each wall of such public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot are used exclusively for residence or ducational purposes or both without first securing from the city council a permit therefore; nor shall any such permit be granted unless the applicant for such permit shall have first secur d the written consent of two-thirds o the owners of property abutting on the street for a distance of 500 feet in each direction from the med'an line ot such proposed public gasoline or oil filling station or sales d pot, according to the frontage on both sides of the street and which said written consent shall be attached to the application for such permit.

2. To Section locate. build. erect, construct, maintain or operate any public gasoline or oil filling station or sales depot in violation of any provision of this ordinance is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation. or any agent, renter or lessee, of any such person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordi-nance shall be fined not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100 for each offense, and each day of continued violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense after the first prosecution has begun.
