After deliberation, I veto that par: or portion of the proceed ngs of the Common Counc:! of he ci y of Ann Arbor at its session held July $\because, 1923$. relating to the matter of letting the contract for the p inting of the proceedings and puilleat:ons for the cty of Ann Arbor for the fol'owing reasons:

1. Each b:dder was asked to submit with his bid and to be made a pa!t of the b:d a sworn statement of the paid circula on of i's newspaper in the city of Ann Arbor. The Washtenaw Post did not : ubrnit any sworn statement of its rirculation.
2. I bel'eve the fundamen ${ }^{\star}$ al reason for publica ion of the councll proceedings and proceedings of the Board of Public Works 's to keep the public informed as to what the council and board are do-in:- consequently it is extremely important tha this information as to croulation of the newspaper be g:ven in order that if possible, it sha'l reach the largest number of taxpayers.
3. I do not believe that the difference in submission of price for the work is commensurate with the publicity that would be given to the proceedings in a publication w'th a larger circulation.
4. I do not see how under the terms of our charter a weekly paper can publish the proceedings of the Board of Publ'c Works and of the Council with'n the time specified by the charter which is mandatory as to time of publication. The proceedings of the council must be printed within one week from the date of its meeting; the proceedings of the Board
of Fublic Works must be published with'n five days from the date of its meeting, which said bodies meet respectively on the firs and third Monday's and Wednesdays of each month; also there are many special meetings.
5. Other legal publications must be made from time to time giving not ces of hearings of the several bod'es of the city and it will be difficult to hand'e this matter and expedite the business of the city, if published in the weekly paper.
