Re Closing Portion of Oakland Ave.

To the Hon. the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor:

Your petitioner, the regents of the University of Michigan, respectfully submit the following to you and ask a release be executed by the mayor and the city clerk of any rights that the city may or might have in that portion of Oakland-av. included in the following description:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe street and the east line of Oakland-av., thence westerly to the point of intersection of the north line of Monroe-st. and the west line of Oakland-av., thence northerly to the point of intersection of the south line of the South University-av. and west line of Oakland-av., thence easterly to the point of intersection of the south line of South University-av. and the east line of Oakland-av., thence southerly to the point of beginning.

2. That the property on both sides of the above described street has been acquired by the University of Michigan.

3. That pursuant to the memorandum of agreement made on the 19th of June, 1922, it was agreed between the city council and the regents of the university that as soon as the property was acquired by the university or the State of Michigan on both sides of the above described street that the city would release any rights it had therein to the university, but such release would in no way abridge or curtail the terms of the contract made on the 19th of June, 1922.

4. That there is enclosed herewith a quit claim which the regents desire to have executed by the Mayor and city clerk if it is found that it is in accordance with the agreement between the regents and the city.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Johnson presented the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE to require the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor to lay water mains pipes or aqueducts upon the petition and payment of the pro rata cost by 25 per cent or more owner of the property to be benefited, and to provide for the assessment of the remainder of the property to be benefited thereby, and for the collection therefrom of the balance of the cost of such improvement.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. In any district within the City of Ann Arbor which is not served by water mains or aqueducts, it shall be competent for the owners of 25 per cent or more of the real estate within such district, to present a petition to the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor asking that proper water mains, pipes or aqueducts be laid to serve such district. Such petition shall be accompanied by a sum of money equal to the petitioner's pro rata share of the total cost of such improvement, which share is hereby fixed at the sum of fifty (50) cents for each lineal foot of real estate of such petitioner fronting upon the street or alley where such main or aqueduct is to be laid. Provided, that

wherever the owner of a lot facing intersecting streets has paid an assessment on one side thereof he shall be assessed for the other side twenty-five (25) cents a lineal foot thereof, but in no case shall this basis of assessment be for a greater distance than 132 feet. Upon receipt of such petition the Board of Water Commissioners shall adopt a resolution specifying the streets and alleys through which it shall be found necessary to lay such mains and pipes in order to serve such petitioners and shall proceed to lay the same at the earliest possible moment from funds at its disposal. Provided however, in the event that so large a number of such petitions are filed with the Board as to render impractical the immediate laying of all the mains petitioned for, the Board shall, in its discretion decide the order in which such mains shall be laid. Provided, further, that any person dissatisfied with such decision of the Board may appeal to the Common Council therefrom. Such resolution shall further contain a list of the lots to be served by such mains or pipes, together with the number of feet front of each such lot and the name of the owner of record of the same. Such resolution shall ratably assess the cost of such improvement upon such lots at the rate of 50 cents for each lineal foot fronting upon the street or alley where such main or aqueduct is to be laid except as otherwise provided herein.

Sec. 2.—No application by any person, firm or corporation, except one of the original petitioners therefor, to tap or make connection with any main, pipe or aqueduct, laid in pursuance of the provisions of this ordinance shall be granted unless the same is accompanied by a sum of money amounting to fifty (50) cents per lineal foot of the real estate of such applicant fronting upon the street or alley where such main, pipe or aqueduct is laid, together with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum upon such amount from the date when such resolution was adopted by the Board of Water Commissioners. Provided, however, that interest shall be at the rate of ten per cent per annum in case of purchase of such assess-

ment by the City Treasurer as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. The Board of Water Commissioners shall cause to be published on at least three different days, in a newspaper circulating in the City of Ann Arbor a copy of the resolution above referred to immediately after its adoption. The board shall further cause to be mailed to each record owner of property in such district a notice containing the substance of such resolution, together with a statement setting forth the amount assessed against the property owned by such person. The amount of such assessment shall be deemed a lien upon the property assessed from the date of the mailing of such notice and shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, from the date of the adoption of such resolution.

Sec. 4. Six months or more after the mailing of such notices the Board shall prepare a list of the lots the assessment against which have not been paid, together with the names of the owners thereof and shall transmit such list to the City Treasurer, together with a copy of the resolution providing for such improvement. The City Treasurer shall forthwith send, by registered mail, a notice to each of such delinquent owners stating the fact of such delinquency, the amount due, and a recital that unless such amount is paid within thirty days after the mailing of such notice the lot upon which such assessment is due will be sold to satisfy the same.

Sec. 5. Thirty days after the mailing of such notices, the City Treasurer, shall compile a list of the lots and the owners thereof still remaining delinquent and shall forthwith put up such lots for sale and shall notify the City Clerk of the time and the place of such sale. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk to appear at such sale and to bid in for the city, for a term of ninety-nine years, for the amount of the assessment due, plus ten per cent per annum from the date of the original resolution providing for such assessment, every lot upon which such assessment has not been paid. Upon all such bids, certificates of sale and leases for ninety-nine years shall be executed by the City Clerk and ac-

knowledge in the same manner as provided in other cases of sale for assessment of taxes. The City of Ann Arbor thereupon shall be deemed to be the owner of a ninety-nine year lease upon each lot so sold for such assessment. Such lease shall thereafter not be assigned or relinquished by the city except to the owner of such lot upon the payment to the city of the amount of such assessment plus ten per cent per annum from the date of the original resolution.

Sec. 6. Whenever applications shall be made for the laying of dead-end water mains the Board of Water Commissioners shall have the right to exercise discretion in the matter of laying said mains and shall determine whether the laying of said dead-end mains shall be practicable before the same are laid.

Sec 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances of the Common Council, and all rules, regulations, by-laws and ordinances of the Board of Water Commissioners in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Sec 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force after ten days from the legal publication thereof.
