#### City Attorney's Report

In re. matter referred to office of City Attorney regarding Mosley Street and Adams Street.

The City Attorney begs leave to report to your Honorable Body that he has investigated the foregoing matter and finds:

1. That Mosley Street, east of South Main Street to the A. A. R. R. is a public street as shown by the recorded plat of the addition in which it is contained and as such should be maintained by the City.

2. The fee to Adams Street is not in the City and before any pavement is placed on said street the City should receive a proper deed from the owners of said street which when presented by them to the City could then be placed on record.

Gentlemen:

In response to requests made by your Council as to my opinion regarding the question of improvements in new plats of land or in property laid out and sold by metes and bounds, I submit to you herewith my opinion.

It is generally held that in the absence of fraud, corruption or ar-

bitrary action, the judgment of the local or municipal authorities as to the construction of local improvements of the several kinds is conclusive and not controllable by mandamus.

It has been held in the case of Moore v. Haroldsburg, 105 S. W. 926, that the city council will not be compelled by mandamus to extend water mains and electric light lines.

The prevailing rule is that the municipality is the sole judge of the necessity or desirability of sewers and drains; therefore the power to construct and maintain is discretionary as to **when** and **where** to be exercised, the nature, capacity, location, number and cost, and the exercise of the power will not be interfered with by the courts.

It would therefore seem that where plats are not laid out to correspond to the general plan of the city as prescribed by the Common Council or adopted by them, the city could delay the putting in of sewers, water and other municipal improvements and withhold the grade lines of sidewalks and streets, provided that such delays were based upon the best judgment of the municipal authorities.
