Ordinance Committee

Ald. Freeman presented an ordinance, entitled

AN ORDINANCE to regulate electric wiring and the use of electricity and to license persons, firms and corporations installing the same and to provide for the appointment of an electrical inspector, and for the enforcement of rules for the protection of life and the prevention of fires.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. The Board of Public Works of the City of Ann Arbor shall assume the supervision of the putting in of all electric wiring, connections and apparatus in or on any building in the City of Ann Arbor. A competent electrical inspector shall be employed by the Board of Public Works by and with the consent of the City Council, whose duty it is to examine and inspect all electrical wiring and equipment as provided in this code. He may be granted such number of assistants as the Council may deem necessary.

Section II. No electrical wiring, insulation, electrical appliances nor appliances furnishing light heat or power, shall be introduced or placed in any building in the City of Ann Arbor except in compliance with the regulations of this code, and the regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, known as the "National Electric Code" and such rules and regulations, as may hereafter be adopted, by the Board of Public Works, which shall become a part of this code.

Section III. It shall be the duty of the Electrical Inspector to examine all electrical equipment hereafter erected or installed and make a detailed report of the same as to whether it is in compliance with the rules and regulations of this code and board. A record of all such reports shall be kept on file in the office of the Board of Public Works, and when equipment or electrical installation is found to conform to the rules and regulations of this Code, the said Electrical Inspector shall issue a certificate that the terms of this Code have been complied with, and no such certificate shall be granted until the equipment is made to conform to the rules prescribed herein. It shall be unlawful to use any such electrical equipment or to furnish electrical current for the same, until a certificate has been furnished in accordance with the terms of this Code.

Section IV. The Electrical Inspector, or his assistants and subordinates, shall upon proper identification, have the right to enter any building or premises at any reasonable time when it may be necessary for the performance of their duties.

Section V. It shall be unlawful for any person to interfere with the Electrical Inspector or his assistants or subordinates in the performance of their duties.

Section VI. The installation, laying, erecting or using of any electric wiring, fixtures, machinery, devices or other electrical equipment in violation of the terms of this ordinance, shall constitute a nuisance and the Electrical Inspector shall have power, and it shall be his duty to remove the same to the extent necessary for the complete and full enforcement of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section VII. No inspection or acceptance of any work as being in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance by the Electrical Inspector shall establish or create against the City of Ann Arbor any liability by reason of defective or improper workmanship. This ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility of any party owning, operating, controlling or installing any electrical equipment of any kind for damages to any one injured by

any defective electrical work.

Section VIII. No person, firm, or corporation shall equip any building with wiring, fixtures or apparatus or make any alteration of, change in or addition to any electrical wiring or apparatus without first having obtained a written permit from the Electrical Inspector and no such permit shall be issued to any person who is not properly licensed under the provisions of this ordinance.

Provided, that nothing contained in this ordinance shall prevent a property holder from doing his own work on his premises under direction of the electrical inspector.

A separate permit shall be obtained for the work on each building and each separate piece of work of any description. It shall be the duty of the Electrical Inspector to issue to any licensee who has filed a written application and complies with the provisions of this ordinance, a permit to do the work applied for.

No permit shall be valid unless the work authorized therein is started within ninety (90) days from the date of its issuance.

All permits are given for a continuous performance of the work named therein.

Permits shall automatically expire when work ceases for a period of ninety (90) days without good and reasonable cause for same, but will naturally expire upon the completion of the work for which it was issued. Whenever any electrical work is uncompleted and abandoned by the person who obtained the permit for the same it shall be necessary to obtain another permit to finish said work if any journeyman lighting fixture man or journeyman electrician other than the original person named in said first permit shall undertake to finish the work.

No licensee under this ordinance shall allow any other person, directly or indirectly, to obtain a permit to do electrical work in the City of Ann Arbor under his license or under his bond.

Section IX. The Electrical Inspector and his assistants shall have the right and power, and it shall be their duty to cause all electrical wires and apparatus in or on any building in the City of Ann Arbor

to be inspected from time to time, in order to ascertain whether the electrical wiring or apparatus is in any respect dangerous to life or property, and if any part of said electric wires or apparatus shall be found dangerous to life or property, the Board of Public Works shall notify the owners of the building or equipments to cease using the electrical current in such dangerous equipments, to have the defects in said equipment repaired within a reasonable time, not exceeding ten (10) days from date of notice. The Board shall also give notice to the company furnishing the electric current to any such dangerous equipment to cease to supply the same until the defects therein are repaired, and it shall be the duty of such company, immediately upon receipt of such notice, to cease to supply the electric current to any such dangerous equipment, until such defects are repaired.

Section X. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to engage as independent contractors, in the business of electrical contracting, in the installation or construction of electrical wiring or lighting fixtures, in installing or altering electrical equipment for either lighting, heating or power purposes, where the electric motive force exceeds thirty (30) volts within the City of Ann Arbor without first having obtained a license therefor and filing a bond as hereinafter provided, said license to be issued by the City Clerk, which license shall be issued to applicant after the application therefor shall have been made to the Board of Public Works, and duly approved by the Council.

(a). The license shall cover all forms of electrical wiring, construction, repairs, alterations and electrical work for power, heating or lighting purposes.

(b) The bond for this license shall be in the sum of \$2,000.00 and must be either a personal bond with two (2) sureties, or one from a recognized and approved surety company, acceptable to and approved by the Council.

(c) Upon the approval of said bond, and the approval of the Board of Public Works, as to the applicant's qualifications he shall pay to the City Clerk the fee of

fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for said license for one (1) year, and twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for each year thereafter.

Section XI. FACTORY LICENSE. Any industrial or mercantile firm or corporation may secure a factory electrical license. They shall designate some person in their employ, who is capable of passing at least a journeyman's examination (see Section XII) to take charge of this electrical work. His name shall appear on the license. This license shall grant the holder thereof the right and privilege to make additions to or alterations in wiring or equipment, or to change or care for isolated lighting plants, motors, generators, dynamos, or other electrical apparatus, together with wiring or appliances in connection therewith, provided the said right and privilege shall be confined to such buildings or building or single plant as may be under one (1) ownership or management, or such plant or boundaries as are definitely specified in each license issued under this class.

The holder of this license shall pay the annual fee of ten (\$10.00) dollars to the City Treasurer but no bond will be required. The holders of this class of license shall pay the regular fees for electrical installation as provided in Section XIX.

Section XII. JOURNEYMEN. It shall be unlawful for any persons to engage in the occupation or trade of journeyman electrician in the installation or alteration of electrical construction work for light, heat, or power purposes, within the City of Ann Arbor without having first taken an examination and obtained the certificate herein provided. This section shall not apply to journeymen apprentices, and helpers, provided such work as they may do is done under the direction of a licensed journeyman, lighting fixture man or journeyman electrician. A journeyman must have had not less than three (3) years practical experience, before obtaining a journeyman's license.

(a) All applications for journeyman examination shall be in writing. The examination shall consist of an oral or written examination, as the Board of Public Works shall determine and such other

practical tests in examination in the discretion of the said Board. After the application for a certificate, as a journeyman electrician shall have been approved by the Board of Public Works, it shall issue to said applicant a certificate of competency, which certificate shall be issued for a period of one (1) year, and renewed thereafter without the necessity of an examination, and said applicant shall pay to the City Treasurer a fee of two (\$2.00) dollars, per annum. The journeyman shall display said license upon request.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person not so licensed to engage in the occupation or trade of a journeyman lighting fixture man or journeyman electrician. It shall be unlawful for any such licensees to do any electrical or fixture work in the City of Ann Arbor without the payment of the proper fee and filing of a bond as set forth in Section X.

Section XIII. Any licensee whose work does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance, or whose workmanship or materials are of inferior quality shall within five days after receiving notice from the Electrical Inspector make the proper changes to remedy the defects. If such changes are not made within the aforesaid period of time the Electrical Inspector shall either make a complaint against such persons or shall refuse to issue any more permits to such licensee until the work is made to conform to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section XIV. The performance of any electrical work or installation of any fixtures after a "Stop-work" notice shall have been placed upon the work is hereby prohibited and the same shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance.

Section XV. It shall be unlawful for any person to install, lay, erect or use in or about any building in the City of Ann Arbor, any electric wiring fixtures, machinery or other electrical devices or equipment unless such installation, laying, erection and the manner of performing the work shall comply with the provisions of the National Electric Code and this ordinance.

Section XVI. It shall be unlawful for any person having charge or control of any building in the

City of Ann Arbor to suffer or permit the violation of any of the provisions of the National Electric Code or of this ordinance, or to cover or permit or suffer the covering of any electrical work until the same has first been examined by the Electrical Inspector and found to comply with the National Electric Code and the provisions of this ordinance.

Section XVII. It shall be unlawful for any person furnishing or proposing to furnish electric current for light power or other purposes to turn current into or use wires or fixtures hereafter installed until the electric wiring fixtures and apparatus shall have been inspected and found to comply with the requirements of the National Electric Code and the provisions of this ordinance.

Section XVIII. No electrical wiring is to be covered by lath and plaster or other material before said wiring has been inspected by the Electrical Inspector or one of his assistants.

The building contractor shall ascertain if the wiring has been inspected before proceeding with lathing of any building. The Inspector is to be given twenty-four (24) hours notice that work is ready for inspection.

Section XIX. FEES. When, upon application, inspection is made of the wiring or equipment in any building in this city, the company or person installing such equipment shall before certificate is issued pay to the City Treasurer for such inspection the following fees—

One (1) circuit or less, \$1.50; for each additional circuit, .50.

FIXTURES: For the inspection of fixtures for incandescent lamps, 50 sockets (or lamps) or fractional part thereof, \$1.50; each additional 25 or fractional part thereof, .50; arc lamps, stereoptican lamps, D. C. chargers, first one, \$1.00; each additional, .25.

MOTORS AND RECTIFIERS. One horse power or fractional thereof, \$1.00; when more than one horse power and not more than 10 horse power, \$2.00; when more than 10 horsepower and not more than 20 horsepower \$3.00 when more than 20 horsepower and not more than 30 horsepower, \$4.00; When more than 30 horsepower and not more than 40 horse power

\$5.00; when more than 40 horse power and not more than 50 horse power, \$6.00; when more than 50 horsepower, \$7.00

GENERATORS AND HEATING DEVICES, ELECTRIC WELDERS, TRANSFORMERS, ENAMELING OVENS, FURNACES, ETC. One kilowatt capacity, \$1.00; for each additional kilowatt, .50.

Where several motors and generators are to be installed within the same premises at the same time, and for the same party, a charge shall be made for the largest motor or generator in accordance with the above schedule, and for each additional motor or generator a charge of \$1.00 will be made.

ELECTRICAL SIGNS. For inspection of each electric sign, \$1.50.

FAN MOTORS AND CEILING FANS. Where a permit is required for the installation of a fan motor or ceiling fan, one (1) fan motor or ceiling fan, \$1.00; each additional fan motor or ceiling fan .25.

MOTION PICTURE APPARATUS: For the inspection or re-inspection of a motion picture machine, \$2.50

ADDITIONAL INSPECTION: For the inspection of electrical apparatus for which no fee is herein prescribed, and for the re-inspection of electrical installations, and for the inspection of temporary installation for decorative, advertising and theatrical purposes, a fee not exceeding one dollar and fifty cents, (\$1.50), per hour, shall be charged, for the time actually required by the inspector in making the inspection. The minimum fee collected for such work shall not be less than one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50). When more wiring or apparatus is to be installed than is specified in the permit, a new permit will be necessary.

Any person, firm or corporation who does, or attempts to do electrical construction work, whether original work or alterations, without giving notice in writing to the said Board of Public Works and obtain a permit to do such work or who shall engage in the business of electrical wiring or the installation of electrical equipment without first having obtained a license therefor, as provided in Sections 10, 11, and 12 of this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in the sum not less

than ten (\$10.00) Dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each offense, and no person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance for which a penalty is not herein otherwise provided and any occupant and any owner of premises where electrical wiring or apparatus is used or to be used, who shall refuse to allow or shall prevent or interfere with the electrical inspector or any of his assistants, in the discharge of the duties prescribed in this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, for each offense be subject to a fine of not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, at the discretion of the Court and in the imposition of such fine and costs, the Court may impose a further sentence that any offender, under this ordinance may be imprisoned in the County Jail of Washtenaw County, until the payment of said fine, provided that the term of such imprisonment shall not exceed sixty (60) days.

In addition to the penalty herein provided, the Board of Public Works shall have the right to revoke any license granted under the provisions of this Ordinance, for any violation of said license, or of any of the provisions of this ordinance. In such case, the license fee provided herein shall be forfeited.

This ordinance shall take effect in ten days after the legal publication thereof.

Water Committee Report

To the Committee of the Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your Water Commission is at the present time confronted with a very serious problem, the solution of which is beyond the authority of the Commission.

It has been the desire of the Department to at all times furnish the people with an adequate supply of pure and wholesome water, but the increase in demands is now making it impossible to do so at certain season of the year. Dur-

ing the hot dry seasons, it has been necessary to pump a considerable amount of water from the Huron River. The water pumped from the river is treated with liquid chlorine and is tested daily so there can be no question of its purity.

The Commission feels that the entire capacity of the Steere Farm supply has been utilized but has proved inadequate in times of maximum demands. The Washington Street station has been discontinued because of the extreme danger of that supply being contaminated, and this has been done upon the advice of the State Health Department.

Studies of increased or additional supply have been made by the Department but the increase in demands have become so serious that we now feel the need of additional expert study and advice. We feel that the Council should employ a competent engineer to make an investigation and report on the entire matter of water supply.
