#### Ordinance Committee Report

The Ordinance committee begs leave to submit the following report to the Common Council on the matter of the proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance of the City of Ann Arbor as submitted by the council to said committee for its consideration, and makes the following recommendations and amendments to the said zoning ordinance as now in force and effect and as proposed.

The following described property shall be placed in the classification as hereinafter set forth.

West half of block 1 north, Range 2 East, Original Plat, change from Class "B" Residence District to Class "C" Local Business District

The east 99 feet of lots 4 and 5, the east 106 feet of Lots 6 and 7, Block 1 North, Range 13 East, Eastern Addition, change from Class "C" Local Business District to Class "B" Residence District.

Block 3 and 4 Brown and Fullers Addition, Block 7 except the southeast 132 feet, Brown and Full-

er's Addition. A parcel of land bounded as follows: On the north by Cedar Street, on the east by Wright Street, on the south and west by the Huron River. A parcel of land bounded on the North by the South line of Kellogg Street extended, on the East by Traver Street, on the South by Moore Street and on the West by Pontiac Street. A parcel of land described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the west line of the east half of the northeast quarter of Section 21, Town 2 South, Range 6 East, and a line parallel to and 132 feet northwest of the northwest line of Broadway; thence southwesterly along said line parallel to and 132 feet northwest of the northwest line of Broadway to a line parallel to and 132 feet east of the east line of Traver Street, thence northerly parallel to and 132 feet east of the east line of Traver Street to the south line of Geo. R. and Allen Flowerday property; thence south 52 deg. 35 min. east 427.02 feet; thence north 41 deg. east 396.66 feet; thence north 52 deg. 35 min. west to the east line of the Detroit, Jackson and Chicago Railway property; thence southerly to the southeast corner of the Detroit, Jackson and Chicago Railway property; thence north 32 deg. 35 min. west to a point 132 feet east of the east line of Traver Street; thence northerly parallel to and 132 feet east of the east line of Traver Street to the north City Limits thence easterly and southerly along the City Limits to the place of beginning, change from Class "D" Commercial and Industrial District to Class "B" Resident District.

Except the following described property which shall be classified as follows:

G. A. Zachman property described as Lots 1, 2 and 3, Block 2 Brown and Fuller's Addition except Ann Arbor right of way changed from Class "D" to Class "C" and the property of the Ann Arbor Foundry Company described as Lots 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 and the northeasterly 8 feet of Lot 9 Traver Addition be left in Class "D."

Ald. Freeman presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading, and which included the accompanying map, as amended at this meeting, made a part of said ordinance

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING, RESTRICTING AND DISTRICTING THE LOCATION OF RESIDENCES, TRADES, INDUSTRIES, BUSINESSES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS FOR THE SAID PURPOSES; PROVIDING FOR AND ESTABLISHING SET BACK LINES AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE," PASSED SEPTEMBER 4, 1923, APPROVED SEPTEMBER 6, 1923, AMENDED JANUARY 19, 1925.**

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. That section two of an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance regulating, restricting and districting the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, an establishing the boundaries of districts for the said purposes, providing for and establishing set back lines and providing for the violation of said ordinance," passed September 4, 1923, approved September 6, 1923, amended January 19, 1925, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Use District Regulations.

In order to regulate and restrict the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, the city of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into "Use Districts" of which there shall be four known as

"A"—Residence District.

"B"—Residence District.

"C"—Local Business District.

"D"—Commercial and Industrial District.

The city of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into four (4) districts and the boundaries of such districts are shown upon the map attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance being designated as the "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, 1923-1925 A, showing Districts for Use Regulations," and said map and all notations, references and other things shown thereon shall be as much a part of this ordinance as if the matters and things set forth by said map were all fully described herein.

Except as hereinafter provided no buildings shall be erected or altered, nor shall any building or premises be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the Use District in which such building or premises is located.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"

Freeman presented an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance to Regulate the Parking of Vehicles and Provide for the Collection of Fees for a Penalty for the Violation thereof and to create a Vehicle Pound." The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain: which was given its second reading, and, on motion of Ald. Freeman, referred to Ordinance committee by following vote: Yeas, Ald. Jocelyn, Slauson, Graf, Maulbetsch, Lucas, Sweet, Nichols, Dwyer, Ware, Moore, Freeman, Lutz, Pres. Woodbury 13. Nays, none.

Ald. Freeman, in behalf of the Ordinance Committee, presented the following ordinance, which was given its third reading:

**AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE PARKING OF VEHICLES AND PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF FEES**



**FOR A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF AND TO CREATE A VEHICLE POUND."**

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Section 1. There is hereby created an automobile and vehicle pound, to which automobiles and other vehicles may be removed by the Department of Police in the cases hereinafter provided. Such pound shall be located and operated at a place designated by the Police Commission. The Police Commission shall designate an officer or officers to remain in attendance at said pound from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m. each day except Sunday, for the purpose of receiving, safeguarding and discharging vehicles and collecting the fees hereinafter provided for.

Section 2. Whenever any vehicle shall be found by a police officer, parked in violation of this ordinance, such police officer may file a complaint in the Justice Court of the City of Ann Arbor against the owner or driver of such vehicle; or such vehicle may be removed and conveyed by means of towing the same or otherwise, be a police officer, to the Automobile and Vehicle Pound. Such vehicles shall not be discharged or removed from said pound except upon the payment, by the owner of such vehicle, or his duly authorized representative, to the officer in charge of such pound, of a fee of one dollar for the first violation of this ordinance by such owner, of three dollars for the second violation, and of five dollars for each subsequent violation. Provided that no violations committed prior to the date when this ordinance goes into effect and no violations committed more than one year prior to any other violation shall be considered in determining the number of violations committed by a particular owner. When the owner of a vehicle impounded, or his representative, presents himself at the pound to claim his vehicle, it shall be the duty of the officer in charge to inform such owner or his representative of the nature and circumstances of the violation on account of which such vehicle

has been impounded. In case protest is made by such owner or his representative against the payment of such impounding fee, and such protest is supported by a denial by him under oath of the facts constituting the alleged violation, there shall be given him, by the officer in charge of said pound, upon payment by such person of the proper fee, according to the number of violations, a receipt for the same marked "Paid under Protest." But in such case, it shall thereupon be the duty of the officer having knowledge of the facts, to forthwith make a complaint in the Justice Court of the City of Ann Arbor, under this ordinance, charging the owner or driver of such vehicle with that violation of the ordinance on account of which the vehicle was impounded. Provided, however, that in case such person is subsequently found not guilty by the Justice Court of having committed the violation on account of which the vehicle of such person was impounded, it shall thereupon be the duty of the City to refund to such person the fee paid by him under protest.

Section 3. When it is deemed impractical, or inadvisable by an officer, witnessing a violation of this ordinance, to tow the offending vehicle to the pound, he may, instead, post or affix a notice to such vehicle notifying the driver of the facts of the violation and directing him to pay to the officer in charge of the pound, the fee which would have been charged if the vehicle had been impounded. Such notice shall further state that, if such fee is not paid within forty-eight hours from the time of the leaving of such notice, a complaint will be made in the Justice Court against the violator. If the owner of such vehicle or his representative presents himself at the pound in response to such notice, he shall be subject to the same penalties and entitled to the same rights as though his vehicle had been impounded. If he does not present himself as directed or does not pay the proper fee within forty-eight hours from the time such notice was posted, the officer having



knowledge of the facts shall forthwith make a complaint against such violator in the Justice Court charging him with the violation on account of which such notice was posted.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Police Commission to each month account for all fees collected under this section and to pay the same into the City Treasury. It shall also keep a record of the names of the owners of all vehicles impounded, the numbers of their state license tags, the nature and circumstances of each violation and the disposition of each case.

Section 5. This ordinance shall cover the following parking violations on streets of the City of Ann Arbor:

1. Parking in a prohibition parking area as established by the Common Council.

2. Parking overtime in a time regulated parking area as established by the Common Council.

3. Parking nearer than 15 feet to a fire hydrant.

4. Parking left side to curb.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication thereof.

The chair put the question, "Shall this ordinance pass?"
