Report of Special Committee on Gas Rates.

Mr. Alfred H. White, Chairman, presented the following report:

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 16, 1925.
To the Honorable, The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Gentlemen:

Your committee of five members appointed by the Mayor pursuant to the resolution of the Council adopted July 6th, 1925, for the purpose of meeting with the Washtenaw Gas Company to reach with them if possible an agreement relative to the rates for gas in the City of Ann Arbor, reports as follows:

Your Committee with Robert Campbell, Mayor; Roscoe Bonisteel, City Attorney, and R. K. Holland, Engineer, met with representatives of the Gas Company on September 19th at which time the Gas Company's requests for increased valuation, the inclusion of a going concern value, increased working capital and increased guaranteed rate of return was put before the Committee. It was agreed at this meeting that all of the data and information in this matter be put before the Committee in writing. Following this first meeting data covering the details of costs and expenditures of the operation of the Gas Company's properties obtained from the books as audited by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission together with an analysis of the same and studies of the effect of changes in the rate plan were presented to and carefully studied by your Committee.

On November 4th, 1925, your Committee with Roscoe Bonisteel, City Attorney and R. K. Holland, Engineer, formulated a tentative schedule of the gas rate adjustment, incorporating also some modifications of the original gas rate Commission's plan which the seven years experience in the operation of the plan had shown necessary in a clearer understanding of its operation and application.

This tentative schedule was submitted to the Gas Company and a final hearing was held by your Committee with the Gas Company's representatives on Tuesday, November 10th, at which time the Gas Company presented their objections to the tentative schedule. The Committee carefully considered the objections and requests of the Gas Company and adopted and offered to the Company for their acceptance or rejection a schedule which has been unanimously approved by the Committee. The representatives of the Gas Company finally agreed to this schedule. Your Committee recommends the adoption of this mutual agreement between the representatives of the Gas Company and the Committee of amendments to the Gas Commission's plan of flexible rates as follows.

1—The guaranteed rate of the Company to be fixed at 6 per cent and taken upon—

- (a) the agreed value of the Company's physical property, including going concern, at the beginning of the year as set forth herein, plus additions to the properties during the current year, less retirements of the properties during the current year.
- (b) the working capital as hereinafter described.
- (c) the materials and supplies as hereinafter described.

2—The amount used for materials and supplies shall be the total of this item at the end of the current year as shown by the audit of the Company books excluding, however, gas coal stock, gas oil and purifying materials.

3—Working capital for any year shall be taken at 5 per cent of the value of the physical property for that year.

4—The capital additions made to the property shall be taken at the actual cost thereof plus proper allowances for interest during construction, injuries and damages, etc. as approved by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission.

5—Upon the retirement of property credit shall be made to the physical property value of the whole amount shown on the books for the unit retired, less the amount of the actual salvage.

6—Moneys held by the Company from—

- (a) uncalled for customers share of the profits.
- (b) customers share set aside for those customers living outside of Ann Arbor city limits but not in the Chelsea zone.

shall after setting aside for the amount thereof a reasonable reserve for bad debts and uncollectable bills, be credited to and treated as miscellaneous income.

7—From the amount now on hand derived from sources named under Section 6 and from the amount heretofore set aside as the customers share of the Industrial gas takers who do not participate in the sharing, the Company shall be reimbursed to the amount of \$5,845.88, being the amount by which the Company has been underpaid in the application of the rate plan since 1921, principally through lack of clearness of statement the application of the plan in some minor details, and through no fault of the Company. The balance of this amount now on hand after providing for the reserve as described in Section 6, shall be treated as miscellaneous income.

8—Customers of the Company, excepting Chelsea and residents outside of the City Limits, who take gas at other than the primary and secondary rates shall not participate in the customers share. This includes industrial gas users, users of gas for heating, refrigeration and the like. The revenue received by the Company from such customers shall be treated as miscellaneous revenue in the application of the gas rate plan.

9—The agreed value of the Company's physical property (going concern value included) as of January 1 1925, is \$1,238,720.67. The value at the end of any year thereafter (excepting the year 1925, which is adjusted as hereinafter provided) will be the above amount plus the capital additions as described, made in the succeeding year.

10—The sliding scale of division of surplus between the Company and the Customers shall be as follows:

In the application of the rate plan the determination of the Company's share shall be made by the application of the formula hereinafter stated, using the actual percentage thus obtained for the determination of the Company's share of the surplus, and the entire balance of the surplus shall be returnable to the Customers participating (being all primary and secondary customers within Ann Arbor city limits) and in direct proportion to the amount paid by them during the current year for gas, all as provided in the Gas Commission's rate plan.

11—The formula for the corrected rate and the determination of the Company's share and Customers share of the surplus is as follows: (Shown on the page following).

12—The foregoing amendments to the Gas Rate Commission's plan shall go into effect July 1, 1925. The Company and Customers share for the year 1925 shall be obtained by applying the previously existing schedule to the Company's business for the period preceding July 1, 1925, and the gas rate plan as amended above to the period succeeding July 1, 1925. The value of the Company's property used in the application of the plan for the period succeeding July 1, 1925, shall be adjusted to that date, and the additions to the Company's property under the amended plan shall be the additions from July 1st to the end of the year.

13—The Gas Company is directed to have the Gas Rate Commission's report of 1918 edited and revised under the direction of R. K. Holland, Engineer, Incorporat-

ing these amendments, and to have the same printed for distribution to the customers of the Gas Company and citizens of Ann Arbor.

The committee desires to express at this time their appreciation of the promptness and courtesy of the Washtenaw Gas Company, particularly Chas. R. Henderson, Manager, and Clarence M. Shankland, Auditor in placing at the Committee's disposal all of information requested relative to the Company's operations, costs, revenues, their books and auditors reports, as well as furnishing other data and information not requested but which the Company believed to be of value in fully informing the Committee relative to the Company's properties and operations.

Mr. Ray K. Holland presented the following statement:

The City of Ann Arbor originally granted to the Gas Company a 30 year franchise on September 2, 1889. On March 5, 1917 the City granted the Washtenaw Gas Company a 20 year franchise from and after January 1, 1918, and it is this franchise under which the Gas Company is at the present time operating. Section 5 of this franchise contained a schedule of rates which were not to be exceeded. This section contained also a provision for rate revision under this franchise. In January 1918, the Company applied for a revision of rates because the war conditions had forced the price of coal, supplies and labor to a point where the rates would not meet operating charges. In conformity with Section 5 a gas commission was appointed who completed their report on July 1, 1918, and determined upon a plan of flexible rates—that is a rate which adjusted itself between the Company and the Customers so that the Company only got increased earnings through lowering the gas rates to the customers. This flexible rate plan, sometimes called the Ann Arbor Plan, was developed by this Commission and differs from any plan tried in this or other countries, and as far as I can learn is the only flexible rate plan that has had any degree of success in this country.

Too much credit can not be given the Washtenaw Gas Company and particularly to the late Harry Douglas for the courage and foresightedness in acquiescing to a wholly new and untried plan for the flexible gas rates developed by those having no connection with the gas business. The Commission had no precedent, of course, in determining any part of this rate plan, and extraordinary conditions occurring in 1920 made it necessary to increase the scope and adjust the sliding scale as labor and materials had at that time gone to a price making it necessary for the Company to charge under this plan \$1.65 net for primary gas. At that time, however, because of the unusual and unsettled conditions no consideration was given to the question of going value or added value to the Commission's original valuation which was admittedly low.

Under the operations of this plan the customers of the Gas Company paid \$1.65 net primary rate and \$1.45 net secondary rate for gas in 1920, with the Company receiving slightly over 5 per cent return on their valuation, decreasing to a net rate of about \$1.25 per thousand primary and \$1.05 per thousand secondary in 1924, from which rate a rebate was paid to the primary and secondary customers of the Company. Meanwhile the Company's total earnings had increased from the 5 per cent on their valuation to nearly 8 per cent on this same valuation plus additions at cost.

A comparison of the rate paid for gas in Ann Arbor with the rates paid in other cities as obtained from the 1923 report of the Public Utilities Commission is interesting. Keeping in mind that the net rate charged in Ann Arbor is \$1.25 primary, being the first 5,000 cubic feet, and \$1.05 secondary and the customer receives a rebate on this rate. The City of Owosso has a net primary rate of \$1.65 for the first 10,000 cubic feet and \$1.50 secondary. The City of Grand Haven an average rate of about \$1.85 per thousand, the city of South Haven a net primary rate of \$2.01 for the first 3000 and \$1.85 secondary, the City of Monroe \$1.55 primary for the first 10,000 and \$1.50 secondary. The City of

Pontiac where the gas sales are substantially equal to Ann Arbor, \$1.32 for the first 100,000 and \$1.07 for the next 100,000; the City of Lansing \$1.25 primary for the first 100,000 and \$1.00 secondary; the City of Bay City \$1.65 primary for the first 5,000 and \$1.50 secondary; the City of Sault Ste. Marie \$1.70 primary for the first 1000 and \$1.65 secondary; and the City of Grand Rapids with five times the gas sales of Ann Arbor \$1.11 primary for the first 100,000 and \$1.06 secondary. Ann Arbor's net rate to the customers for 1924 was about \$1.13 primary and \$0.93 secondary. The figures that I have given for other cities are all on a fixed rate irrespective of the advantages the Company gained through decreasing material and labor costs, and these rates hold until either the Company or City apply for and obtain a rate revision through the Michigan Public Utilities Commission.

Relative to Report of Committee:

A number of these sections are minor corrections to verify the operation of the rate plan. From a study of the Company's operations we find that the present rate charged customers of \$1.25 primary and \$1.05 secondary will provide the revenue to meet all of the requirements of these amendments and give a rebate to the customers at the end of the year. The Washtenaw Gas Company has been very desirous that any adjustment to the rate would not increase the primary and secondary gas rates of \$1.25 and \$1.05 that they had been charging customers, and expect to see the time within a year or so through gain in efficiency of operation that will permit them to make further reduction in this rate and still have sufficient revenue to meet the rebate at the end of the year. Considerable credit is due your Committee for the conscientious study which they have made of the rate plan and the operations of the Company in reaching an adjustment which they believe to be fair both to the Company and the customers.

Resolution.

By Ald. Lucas:

Whereas, The City of Ann Arbor granted a franchise to the

Washtenaw Gas Company under date of March 5, 1917, and under Section 5 of said franchise provision was made for the fixing of rates and revision of rates, and

Whereas, Under date of July 1, 1918, the said Section 5 was revised in accordance with a gas rate plan of flexible rates, and

Whereas, Under date of August 1, 1920, said gas rate plan was amended and a new sliding scale schedule filed, and

Whereas, Application has heretofore been made in May 1925 by the Washtenaw Gas Company to the Michigan Public Utilities Commission of the State of Michigan for a further revision of the sliding scale plan, and for other changes, and

Whereas, The said Michigan Public Utilities Commission referred the matter back for mutual agreement between the City of Ann Arbor and the Washtenaw Gas Company by reason of a jurisdictional question, and

Whereas, The Common Council has heretofore appointed a Gas Rate Committee and employed Ray K. Holland as an Engineer to advise with the said committee, and

Whereas, The said Committee has completed its work and brought in its reports which are now filed with the Common Council.

Now Therefore be it Resolved, That the said revision of Section 5 of the franchise as contained in said report be approved by the City of Ann Arbor as follows:

1—The guaranteed rate to the Company to be fixed at 6 per cent and taken upon:

(a) the agreed value of the Company's physical property, including going concern, at the beginning of the year as set forth herein, plus additions to the properties during the current year, less retirements of the properties during the current year.

(b) the working capital as hereinafter described.

(c) the materials and supplies as hereinafter described.

Honorable Robert Campbell, Mayor, and City Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Ann Arbor, Michigan:

Gentlemen: We are providing you herewith a statement of the income and expenses of our motor coach operations in Ann Arbor for the entire period of eight months from February 1st to September 30, 1925. You will observe that our gross revenue was \$75,338.08 and our operating expense was \$98,424.42, resulting in a net loss of \$18,086.34, before providing for taxes and depreciation. After providing for taxes and depreciation, our net loss was \$40,402.31.

Constantly throughout the entire period of our operations we have applied our thoughts and efforts in an endeavor to provide the citizens of Ann Arbor proper transportation service at the lowest possible cost and of such a nature as to induce the greatest possible riding. From time to time we have made changes in routes, schedules and equipment toward the accomplishment of our purpose but without having obtained from any and all of such changes such beneficial results as indicate that the operation can be successfully continued by making changes only in routes, schedules and equipment.

Before the inauguration of our service, we designed a tariff from which it was thought that sustaining revenues would be obtained. That tariff has remained in effect without any change whatsoever to this date. As an increased revenue must accompany a lower operating cost, if the City of Ann Arbor is to have an efficient transportation service, we respectfully direct your attention toward a revision of our tariff which contains certain commutation rates which we suggest should be eliminated.

We submit herewith a map of the City of Ann Arbor upon which are marked the bus routes which we request your permission to operate in place of those bus routes which we are now operating. The proposed routes will produce some saving in operating cost and

will provide your city an adequate transportation service.
