Sewer Committee Report

To the Honorable, the Common Council,

Gentlemen:

Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimates and reports of the City Engineer relative to construction of lateral sewers in lateral sewer district No. 169, on Beechwood drive from Chubb road northwesterly approximately 680 feet; No. 170, on Charles street for entire length of street on Daniel street from end of present sewer to Chubb road and on Edward street from end of present sewer to Charles street; begs leave to report that we have had such estimates and reports, as well as the resolution of the Common Council, under consideration and have made due inquiry relating thereto and

have heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of said lateral sewers and recommends that special taxing or assessment districts be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of such sewers be charged, street intersections excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided and that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said sewer districts be prepared by the City Engineer and the Board of Public Works be ordered to advertise for bids for the construction of said sewers.

We further recommend that the plans, specifications and preliminary estimates of cost of storm sewers on Hill street from Allen Creek to Brown street, on Greene street from Hill street to Davis avenue and on Davis avenue from Greene street to South Main street; on Gott street from Summit street to north end of street, on H'scock street from Gott street to Miner street, on Summit street from Gott street to Miner street and on Pearl street from Gott street to Miner street; be approved and the Board of Public Works be instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of said storm sewers.

We further recommend that the Board of Public Works be authorized to replace inlet castings on Packard street between State and Arch streets.

We further recommend that the construction of the above named lateral and storm sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Street Committee

By Ald Maulbetsch:

Whereas, there has been present-

ed to the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor an application in writing signed by ten or more freeholders of the city to discontinue and vacate certain portions or parts of the following street:

"That portion of Volland-st included in the following description:

Beginning at the intersection of the westerly line of Fourteenth-st. with the northerly line of Volland-st.; thence westerly along the northerly line of Volland-st. 343.87 feet to the angle in the northerly line of Volland-st.; thence southwesterly along the northwesterly line of Volland-st. 124.38 feet to the northeasterly line of Washtenaw-ave thence southeasterly along the northeasterly line of Washtenaw-ave. to its intersection with the southeasterly line of Volland-st., thence northeasterly along the southeasterly line of Volland-st. to the angle in Volland-st.; thence easterly along the south line of Volland-st. to a point 5.79 feet east of the point where the west line of Fourteenth-st. intersects the south line of Volland-st.; thence northerly to the place of beginning."

And Whereas, the Common Council does hereby determine the proposed improvement, advisable,

There, Be It Resolved, the Common Council shall give notice of the pendency of the question of ordering such proposed improvement to the owners, occupants or persons interested of his, her or their agent or representative by personal service, if they reside within the said city; if they shall reside without the said city, then said service shall be made by posting up notices in five or more public places in said city, which notice shall state the time and place when and where the Common Council shall meet to consider the same, and shall designate to a common certainty the avenues and streets to be discontinued and vacated and which notice shall be posted at least ten days before the time of hearing and at which said meeting the Common Council shall hear the persons interested therein.

And the Council does hereby designate the time and place of said meeting as the nineteenth day of July, A. D. 1926, at two p. m. Eastern Standard time in the Council Chamber, City Hall, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Sidewalk Committee Report

To the Honorable, the Common Council,

Gentlemen:

Your Sidewalk Committee respectfully recommends that the following sidewalks be ordered built and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the grading and construction of sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Therefore, It is hereby ordered that Portland Cement concrete sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the City of Ann Arbor on and along the following property; width of walk to be five feet unless otherwise stated:

South Fifth Avenue—East side, from Sinclair Oil Station southward to cement walk beside Zion church.

Lot 16 and the S 57 ft. of lot 1, B1S, R6E.

West side, extend walk east of City Hall to curb and raise five block to grade.

The E 44 ft. of lot 1, B1S, R5E.

North Fifth Avenue—Nos. 215, 217, 221.

Lot 6 and the E 1-2 of lot 5 B2N, R5E.

East Catherine St.—South side, from N. Fifth ave., westward to alley. Lot 5, B2N, R5E.

East Ann Street—South Side, from N. Fifth Ave. eastward to Division except No. 326.

Lots 13, 14 the N 99 ft. of lots 15, 16, lot 11 the E 19 ft. of lot 12 and the N 70 ft. of lots 9 and 10 all in B1N, R6E.

East Washington Street—South Side, from No. 326 eastward to S. Division walk to be 6 ft. wide.
