Ganzhorn and Mina Ganzhorn for a parcel of land extending northerly from Chubb road and 60 ft. in width, to be used for street purposes and designated as Beechwood drive be accepted, and the bond from said parties for the grading and graveling of said street also be accepted.

2. That the Board of Public Works cause E. Mosley-st. from Main-st. easterly to the Ann Arbor Railroad to be graded and graveled and require the property owners on the north side of said street to remove all obstructions and materials.

3. That the Board of Public Works be instructed to cause Miner street to be graded and opened for public travel from Pearl st. north to Cornell land.

4. That the Board of Public Works be instructed to widen Fifth-av. along the City Hall building.

Curb & Gutter Resolution
By Ald. Sweet:

Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the curbing and guttering of the following curb and gutter districts:

District No. 100, on Fifth-st. from Liberty-st. to Madison-st.; District No. 101, on West Madison-st. from S. Seventh-st. to Ashley-st.; within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and

Whereas, the curbing and guttering of the above named districts, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements; therefore be it

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause the above named district within the limits aforesaid, to be curbed and guttered under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor and in pursuance of the prayers of said petitioners.

Resolved further, that the costs and expense of the construction of curbs and gutters in curb and gutter districts Nos. 100 and 101 shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections and fifty per cent of the remaining shall be paid by the city and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting the above named districts, Nos. 100 and 101, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved further, that the said petitions along with this determination be and the same are hereby referred to the Board of Public Works with directions to report to the Council, with all convenient dispatch suitable plans with specifications for the proposed improvements, the kind and quality of material to be used therefore, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvements.

Sidewalk Committee Report
To the Honorable, the Common Council,
Gentlemen:

Your Sidewalk Committee respectfully recommends that the following sidewalks be ordered built and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the grading and construction of the sidewalks hereinafter mentioned is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvement.

Therefore, It is hereby ordered that Portland Cement concrete sidewalks be graded, built and constructed in the City of Ann Arbor on and along the following property; width of walk to be five feet unless otherwise stated:

East Catherine Street

N. Side. Nos. 1005, 1003 and westward as far as may be necessary to raise walk to level of curb line, or a trifle above it. As these walks are in good condition but below the street level the City should bear their cost.

The W 78 ft. of lot 8 and the W. 78 ft. of the N. 33 ft. of lot 9, B 3 N, R 13 E, Lawrence and Maynard Add.

East Catherine Street

N. Side, from N. Ingalls eastward along lot bearing No. 300 N. Ingalls-st.

Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 except the N 16 1-2 ft. B 3 N, R 12 E, Lawrence & Maynard Add.

West Madison Street

S. Side, from Second-st., eastward to Ashley-st.

Lots 1 and 12, B 6 S, R 1 E, Wm. S. Maynard 2d. add. Lot 1 B 6 S, R 2 E, Wm. S. Maynard 2d. add. and the N 55 ft. of lot 7, Hinman's Sub. of B 6 S, R 2 E.

West Madison Street

N. Side, Nos. 212, 208 and on south side of lot bearing No. 564 on Ashley-st.

The W 88 ft. of lot 10, B 5 S, R 2 E, Wm. S. Maynard Add. also a parcel of land beginning at the S. E. Corner of lot 10, said Block thence E to Ashley-st. N. on Ashley-st. 33 ft. W to E line of lot 10, thence S 33 ft. to beginning.

Packard Street

N. Side, from Main-st. S; eastward for one lot from alley S. eastward to Fourth-ave., from Fourth-ave., S. eastward for one lot.

Ald. Jocelyn made oral report that the Lighting Committee recommends the installation of 100 c. p. street lights as follows:

At corner of Woodside road and Copley ave.; at corner of Wallingford road and Brooklyn ave.; at corner of Washington-st. and Buena Vista ave.; about midway on Buena Vista ave.; at corner of Jackson ave. and Pleasant Place.

Gentlemen:

The undersigned submits the following report of public hearing relative to proposed closing, vacating and discontinuing of that portion of Berkley avenue from the east boundary line of South Main street to its eastern terminus; that portion of Fischer avenue from the east boundary line of South Main street to the west boundary line of Greene street; that portion of Greene street from a point beginning at the south line of Keech avenue south to its terminus; that portion of public alley, running north and south from Granger avenue to Dewey avenue and parallel to White street and Ingalls street, situated in Block 4, Hamilton, Rose and Sheehan's addition, in the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The common council, sitting in pursuance to its order and appointment for that purpose, met at the Council Chamber June 28, 1926 at 7:30 o'clock p. m. Meeting was called to order by the City Clerk and Ald. Freeman chosen to preside. The roll was called and the following members found present: Ald. Due proof was filed of the publication service and posting of notices of meeting. And further, that they shall pay the city interest charges on bonds issued for Sewer District No. 165.
