Mayor's Veto

To the Honorable, the Common Council,
Gentlemen:

The proposed budget for the City of Ann Arbor for 1927, and 1928, dated May 12, 1927, and presented to me for my consideration has been carefully considered by me.

At the outset I am impressed with the fact that the proposed budget carries a total expenditure for the period of \$569,890.03. Compared with the budget for 1926 and 1927 or \$535,773.18 this shows an increase of \$34,116.85.

Business principles dictate that those in charge of public expenditures shall have in mind the important fact that it is of prime importance to the taxpayers that such expenditures shall be kept and maintained at the lowest possible figure consistent with satisfactory management and operation of the various departments of the city government.

With this thought in mind I feel constrained to disapprove certain items of the budget. In so doing it has not been my purpose to cripple or impede the operation of any department. Rather my thought has been to discourage the appearance of extravagance in any of the departments.

The items disapproved by me and the reasons therefore are as follows:

1. The item of \$1,200.00 for new clerk, indexing and filing, in the office of the City Clerk is disapproved because in my judgment the present force of the department of the City Clerk is amply sufficient to care for the duties

of that office. The present amount appropriated for salaries alone in this department is \$7,200.00.

2. Another item which I cannot find consistent with principles of economical administration is the provision for an additional expenditure of \$14,488.00 for the police department. This sum would be used, not primarily to afford additional protection to the city, but to reduce the hours of service of members of the department. This amount added to the already increasing burden of taxation is, in my judgment, not justifiable either from the point of view of the needs of the department, or of the taxpayers who will eventually be called upon to assume this added burden.

Although I do not approve of this provision, I do not wish to be construed as being in opposition to changes which will shorten the hours of duty of members of the police force I do not question so much the need of this reduction as the suddenness with which it is proposed to bring it about. Instead of making the shift to the shorter day all at once I suggest that we reduce hours gradually.

This item, therefore, of \$14,488.00 for seven new first-year men and one desk sergent is herewith returned disapproved.

3. In the item of "Special funds" in your budget you have appropriated the sum of \$80,220.86 in the Bridge, Culvert and Crosswalk fund, which is an increase of \$24,000.00 over the appropriation of the preceding year. This increase appears disproportionate to me and I disapprove of \$10,000.00 of the proposed increase.

In your budget I also find an item of \$24,000.00 for "Laying dust" on dirt streets, While I fully recognize the fact that this service is appreciated by the residents on such thoroughfares, I respectfully call to your attention the fact that this sum represents the interest on over a half-million dollars at our local bond interest rates.

While I do not disapprove the item, nevertheless, I beg to call to your attention the fact that if this sum might be made available for street paving, it would soon ob-

viate the necessity for such an outlay annually for purely temporary purposes.

Resolved, further, that the sum of Four thousand, four hundred ninety three and 50-100ths dollars (\$4,493.50) be and the same is hereby appropriated, by virtue of the vote of the electors of the City of Ann Arbor authorizing the same, for the purpose of paying the bonds and interest due August 1, 1927, for the construction of Broadway bridge.

Resolved, further, that the sum of Seven thousand, five hundred thirty dollars (\$7,530.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated, terest which will be due during the budget year or to apply on the cost of the construction of the Fuller Street Bridge.

Resolved, further, that the sum of Thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) be and the same is hereby appropriated, by virtue of an act of the Legislature authorizing the same, for the purpose of paying the bonds due February 1, 1928, amounting to Thirty-one thousand dollars (31,000.00) for purchase of Water Works plant, property rights and franchises and all appurtenances of the Ann Arbor Water Company; and for the purpose of paying a part of the interest due August 1, 1927, said appropriation to pay interest on said bonds being Four thousand dollars. (4,000.00).

Resolved, further, that the sum of Eight thousand, nine and 2-100ths dollars (\$8,009.02,) be and the same is hereby appropriated to the Uncollected City Tax Fund for the purpose of reimbursing said fund for unpaid personal taxes.

Resolved, further that the sum of Eighty thousand two hundred twenty and 86-100 dollars (\$80,220.86) be and the same is hereby appropriated, by virtue of the authority granted to the Common Council by the general laws of the State, for the purpose of maintaining in good order and repair the several bridges, culverts, storm sewers, streets and crosswalks within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor.

Ald Slauson supported the resolution.

The Chair put the question, "Shall the resolution pass, the Mayor's veto notwithstanding?"

In supporting the resolution Ald. Slauson stated that the Budget Committee had spent four long evenings in consideration of the budget assisted, the first evening, by the Mayor who, when the addition to the Police force was under consideration, said that he would take the judgment of the Police Commission. On the evening preceding the present council meeting, the Budget Committee had again considered this addition with the Police Commission present and had been unable to find any plan that would provide for the gradual adoption of the proposed increase in force.

Business men had asked for additional police protection and the Board of Education wanted police protection at schools located on streets having heavy traffic. These requests could not be met with the present force even when working 12 hours per day; with the proposed increase in force and nearly, or quite, a nine-hour schedule, it should be possible to give what had been asked for.

The additional clerk in the City Clerk's office was not to be employed in routine or regular work but in doing something that had been needed for a long time; viz. making an index of the proceedings of the City Council and a complication of the city ordinances now in affect. The Board of Public Works had asked for copies of the ordinances that it is their duty to enforce.

The ten thousand dollars vetoed in the Bridge, Culvert and Cross-walk fund is not specific and we cannot know to what item in the budget it referred.
