The following communication

was presented and a number of citizens addressed Council relative to the water question:

Nov. 7, 1927.

To the Honorable, the Common Council,

Gentlemen:

Whereas, the women of the City of Ann Arbor have been using Steere Farm Water for a period of seven (7) years and have found that water a common nuisance because of its extreme hardness, its heavy iron content, staining and ruining household fixtures, clogging both hot and cold supply pipes, necessitating a great expense for softening and equipping with extra pipes for cistern water; and

Whereas, the women of the city of Ann Arbor believe that a water whose iron content is so great and is growing greater, and whose total solid content is 512 parts per million is not fit for human consumption; and

Whereas, they are informed that the water table at Steere Farm is extremely low and is in danger of completely failing within a period of ten years;

We petition the Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor as follows: first, and the Council shall take immediate steps, whether the proposed Bond Issue to build a new reservoir, install new mains, and dig four additional wells shall carry or fail, to locate another source of water supply for the city; and second, to instruct their commissioners to invite the co-operation of the women of Ann Arbor through some delegate appointed by their various organizations.
