**Ordinance Committee**

Ald. Slauson presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING SPECIFICATIONS FOR BACK-FILLING AND MAINTAINING ALL EXCAVATIONS, SERVICE AND OTHER TRENCHES DUG IN

CITY STREETS AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF," PASSED MAY 7, 1923; APPROVED MAY 9, 1923.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That Section 2 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance Providing Specifications for Back-filling and Maintaining All Excavations, Service and Other Trenches Dug in City Streets and Providing a Penalty for Violation Thereof," passed May 7, 1923; approved May 9, 1923, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. If the person, firm or corporation who digs the trench does not backfill and maintain same in accordance with the above specifications then the maintaining and backfilling shall be done by the city and the cost plus 20 per cent shall be charged against the person, firm or corporation who dug the trench. And further shall protect and save harmless the said city from all damages and action at law that may arise or be brought on account of any negligence in the protection or handling of the same in accordance with the provisions of this and other ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor. Provided, however, that the Board of Public Works shall have and are hereby granted the right and may cause the applicant to furnish a cash bond in an amount sufficient to care for the backfilling and maintenance of any excavations of service and other trenches dug in city streets as provided in this ordinance before a permit shall be granted. Failure to back fill and maintain all excavations, service and other trenches dug in the city streets immediately upon completion of said work for which permit was granted satisfactory to the Board of Public Works shall work a forfeiture of said bond.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication thereof.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND CONTROL THE CONSTRUCTION, ERECTION AND MAINTENANCE OF ILLUMINATED ELECTRIC SIGNS AND PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF," PASSED SEPTEMBER 29, 1924; APPROVED SEPTEMBER 30, 1924; AMENDED DECEMBER 19, 1927.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor Ordain:

Section 1. That Section 7 of an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance to Regulate and Control the Construction, Erection and Maintenance of Illuminated Electric Signs and Provide Penalties for the Violation Thereof," Passed September 29, 1924; approved September 30, 1924; amended December 19, 1927; be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. Every person, firm or corporation installing or maintaining one or more electric signs shall file with the City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor a bond approved by the Common Council of said city and running to the City of Ann Arbor in an amount of \$1,000 for each sign so installed, to keep and save harmless the City of Ann Arbor from any damage of any nature whatsoever arising or resulting from any privileges granted or conferred by this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication thereof.

**Street Committee  
Pavement Resolution**

By Ald. Maulbetsch:

Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the grading and paving of the following pavement district:

District No. 101, on Forest Ave., from Washtenaw Ave. to East Huron St., within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the grading and paving of the above named district, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvement; therefore be it

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause the above named district, within the limits aforesaid, to be graded and paved under the charter and ordinances of the City of Ann Arbor and in pursuance of the prayers of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the cost and expense of the construction of said public improvement shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: all street and public alley intersections and twenty per cent of the remaining shall be paid by the City and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assessment levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting the above named district, within the limits aforesaid.

Resolved, further, that the said petition along with this determination be and the same is hereby referred to the Board of Public Works to report to the Council, with all convenient dispatch, suitable plans with specifications for the said proposed improvement, the kind and quality of material to be used therefore, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvement.

**Curb & Gutter Resolution**

By Ald. Maulbetsch:

Whereas, this Common Council has been applied to in writing by a majority of the owners of the lands, which are liable to be assessed for the payment of the construction of the same, praying for the curbing and guttering of the following curb and gutter districts: District No. 142, on Brockman Blvd. between Copley Ave. and Shadford road; District No. 143, on Baldwin place; District No. 144, on Abbot Ave. between Virginia Ave. and Montgomery Ave.; District No. 145, on Third St. between Mosley St. and Davis Ave.; District No. 146, on Edgewood Ave. from Davis Ave. to Hoover Ave., on Davis Ave. from Fifth St. to the intersection of Davis Ave. with the east boundary line of lot 74 of Edgewood Subdivision and on Wilder place from Davis Ave. to Hoover Ave.; District No. 147, on Woodlawn between Packard St. and Sheehan Ave.; District No. 148, on Onondaga St. between Hill St. and Geddes Ave.; District No. 149, on N. University Ave. formerly known as Volland St., between Observatory St. and Forest Ave.; District No. 150, on Forest Ave. between Washtenaw Ave. and S. University Ave.; District No. 151, on Seventh St. between Madison St. and Pauline Blvd.; within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan; and

Whereas, the curbing and guttering of the above named districts, within the limits aforesaid, is deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements; therefore be it

Resolved, that it is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Common Council to cause the above named districts, within the limits aforesaid, to be curbed and guttered under the charter and ordinances of the city of Ann Arbor and in pursuance of the prayers of said petitioners.

Resolved, further, that the costs and expense of the construction of said public improvements shall be charged, assessed and paid as follows: All street and public alley intersections and twenty per cent of the remaining shall be paid by

the city and the remainder shall be assessed and paid by special assesment, levied and assessed according to benefits on and against all the lands, tenements and premises lying on or fronting the above named districts, within the limits aforesaid.
