To the Fire Committee of the Honorable Common Council:

After making thorough investigation in connection with the purchase of the Tractor for our present Aerial Truck, we wish to recommend to your Honorable Body that the following be purchased:

One type 31 American La France six cylinder, 115- H. P. Front Drive, two-wheel tractor attached to our Aerial Truck and one ladder nozzle complete.

You will further note from the proposal attached that the purchase price of this tractor and ladder nozzle complete amounts to \$8,325.00. This price covers all work connecting the tractor to our old truck and a few minor repairs which will place the entire machine in A-1 condition and should serve the City of Ann Arbor for some time to come unless at some future date, the city might wish

to purchase a longer aerial ladder. Should this ever be done, the tractor we now propose purchasing will simply be used on the new ladder equipment.

When this machine is completed, your Board feels that we have a very adequate department and the co-operation which your Honorable Body has given us in bringing this about has been greatly appreciated.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with past custom, we do hereby request permission to put into operation our regular Summer Schedule on the local motor coach lines in the City of Ann Arbor starting Sunday, June 17th, 1928, and to continue the operation of this Summer Schedule until the University of Michigan opens in the Fall.

Our records for the past three years disclose the fact that the Ann Arbor City revenue drops off materially during the Summer months when school is closed and when the residents of Ann Arbor are residing at their Summer homes and as a result of this material drop off in revenue, it is absolutely necessary that we reduce the expense of conducting the operation during these Summer months.

It is our desire to operate our lines as follows during this Summer period:

Washington - Washtenaw Line—

change this headway to twenty minutes.

Packard-Miller Line — change this headway to twenty minutes.

Burns Park - Hospital Route—change this headway to a fifteen minute service.

Broadway Route—We desire to operate the Broadway service by itself, operating over the regular route but making a loop around Ann St., Fourth St., Washington St. and Main St. in the down-town section of Ann Arbor and on this route to operate a twenty-minute service.

Gentlemen:

Your Sewer Committee, to whom was referred the estimate and report of the City Engineer relative to construction of lateral sewer in Lateral Sewer District No. 175, on Wildt St. from Summit So. to Sunset Road, on Sunset road from Wildt St. to Spring St. and from Beachwood Drive to Brooks St. and on Brooks St. from Sunset Road 350 feet southerly, has had said matter under consideration and has heard all persons desiring to be heard in the premises, and your committee is of the opinion that there is necessity for the construction of said lateral sewer and recommends that special taxing or assesment district be fixed by the Common Council upon and against which the construction of said sewer be charged, street intersections excepted, pursuant to the ordinance in such case made and provided, and that resolutions fixing the boundaries of said sewer district be prepared by the City Engineer.

University Ave. from Monroe St. to McKinley Ave.; on Sunset Road from Main St. to Spring St.; on Koch Ave. from First St. to Third St.; on Wilmot St. from Washtenaw Ave. to Mack Road.

We further recommend that the board of Public Works be instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of said lateral and storm sewers and that the construction of said sewers is hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Resolved, further that the said petitions along with this determination be and the same are hereby referred to the Board of Public Works with directions to report to the Common Council, with convenient dispatch, suitable plans with specifications for the proposed improvements, the kind and quality of material to be used therefor, together with an estimate of the probable cost and expense of such public improvements.
