In the matter of petition for amendment to the Zoning Ordinance changing the use of certain property on Fifth Avenue between William and Liberty Streets, the Board of Appeals of the Zoning Ordinance, to which the petition was referred by the Council, respectfully reports:

1. That the property in question

2. It is classified as business or "C" area in the Zoning Ordinance, and a small portion of it is now being used for business purposes.

3. Since the passage of the Zoning Ordinance additional frontage on Fifth Avenue, between the Streets above mentioned, has been acquired for business purposes, and plans for such development will be indefinitely postponed if the Ordinance is amended as proposed.

4. There is a difference of opinion as to whether or not the Ordinance should be changed a counter petition having been filed asking that the Ordinance remain as it now stands. In other words, some of the home owners desire to maintain the block for residence purposes only, while others are willing to vacate if and when there is a favorable opportunity to do so.

It is the sense of the Board of Appeals that this property being in the path of business growth between Main and State Streets was properly placed in the business zone in the Ordinance.

It is the further sense of the Board that, in general, changes should not be made in use districts after steps have been taken to develop property as permitted by the Ordinance. Whether, under the circumstances as noted above, a change should now be made in this particular case is a question for the Council to decide after having given all concerned an opportunity to be heard at a public hearing as provided for by the Ordinance. The Board does not feel that it can fairly make a recommendation prejudicing the case one way or the other without having had the benefit of such a hearing.
