Gentlemen:

The \$75,000.00 Bond Issue for the installation of meters and the \$45,000.00 issue for the completion of the Steere Farm Station matured on August 1st, 1929. We respectfully recommend that your honorable body authorize the issuance of serial refunding bonds to run over a period of twenty years. Regarding the issue of \$75,000.00, we recommend that this issue be retired at the rate of \$4,000.00 a year for a period of fifteen years.

and \$3,000.00 a year for the remaining five years. Regarding the issue of \$45,000.00, we recommend that this issue be retired at the rate of \$2,000.00 a year for fifteen years and \$3,000.00 a year for the remaining five years. In this manner both of these bond issues will be retired at the end of twenty-year period.

Ordinance Committee

Ald. Severance presented the following ordinance which was given its third reading, and moved its adoption.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE ELECTRIC WIRING AND THE USE OF ELECTRICITY, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE INSPECTION THEREOF, AND TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, Ordain:

Section 1. The Common Council shall appoint an electrical inspector, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Common Council and receive such salary as shall, from time to time be fixed by the Common Council. Said Inspector shall have the supervision of the installation, additions to and alterations of all electric wiring, connections, apparatus, and of all electrical equipment installed within the City of Ann Arbor, except such as is owned, operated or maintained by a public utility.

Section 2. All such electrical wiring, connections, apparatus and equipment shall be installed, used and maintained in accordance with the provisions of the latest edition of the "National Electrical Code," as issued by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, and the regulations imposed by the "Public Utilities Commission of the State of Michigan."

Section 3. All Electrical Contractors, doing business within the corporate limits of the City of Ann Arbor, shall on or before the first day of May, of each year, pay into the City Treasury of the City of Ann Arbor, an annual license fee

in the sum of Fifty Dollars, which sum shall be deposited by him in the contingent fund, and upon the presentation to the City Clerk of a receipt showing that such sum was paid, the said clerk shall issue a license authorizing the person, firm or corporation named in said receipt to do business for the ensuing year. At the time of receiving the license the applicant therefor shall deposit with the City Clerk a bond in the penal sum of One Thousand Dollars, running to the City of Ann Arbor, its successors and assigns, conditioned for the faithful compliance with the provisions of this ordinance and also conditioned that the City of Ann Arbor will be indemnified and saved harmless from all damages occasioned by reason of the issuance of such license, and also from any and all claims arising by reason of any negligence of the licensee or any unfaithful or inadequate work done by him, it or them, by virtue of the license; and no license shall issue to any person, firm or corporation until such bond is filed.

Section 4. Each electrician employed in the City of Ann Arbor to install or repair electric wiring, fixtures or implements, shall be examined by a committee consisting of the City Electrical Inspector and one other electrician appointed by the Mayor and holding office for one year. Upon recommendation from said examining committee the City Clerk shall issue to each electrician found after examination to be competent to install electrical wiring according to this ordinance, a license termination May 1 following date of issue. Fee for electrician's examination and license shall be \$2.00 each, which shall be deposited with the City Treasurer.

Section 5. The license of any electrician or Electrical Contractor may be revoked by action of the Common Council, upon the written recommendation of the Electrical Inspector and the presentation by him of reasonable cause therefor; provided, however, that any

persons so proceeded against be given written notice thereof and shall upon request be given an opportunity to be heard before the council and no such license shall be revoked except by a vote of a majority of the members elect of the said Common Council; provided also that any person desiring such hearing shall file a written request therefor within ten days from the date such recommendation of the Electrical Inspector is made.

Section 6. Excepting as hereinafter provided in Section 10, no person, firm or corporation shall install, alter or use any electrical wiring, apparatus or equipment subject to the terms of this ordinance, without first obtaining a permit therefor from the City Clerk, and notifying the Inspector giving him ample opportunity to make such inspection. Such notice to the Inspector shall in all cases be given before any wiring or equipment become concealed by structural work and such wiring shall not be covered or made inaccessible until after inspected.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Inspector to examine each electrical installation hereafter made in said City of Ann Arbor and to determine if the same conforms to Section 2 hereof. Said Inspector shall issue a certificate to the owner of each electrical installation when and as soon as the same conforms to this ordinance, but no such certificate shall be issued until there has been such compliance, in the judgment of said inspector; and it shall be unlawful to use any of such installation or equipment, or to furnish electrical energy for the same until a certificate has been issued under this ordinance. The Inspector shall keep a record in his office of each examination made by him, and also a copy of each certificate issued.

Section 8. The Inspector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty to cause all present installations in said city to be inspected

in order to ascertain if they are in any respect dangerous to life or property, and if any such installations are found dangerous to life or property, the owner thereof shall be notified by the Inspector and given a reasonable length of time, not exceeding thirty days, to remedy the same. If, after the expiration of the time specified following such notice defects are not remedied, the Inspector shall notify the owner or his agent to cease using such dangerous wiring, apparatus, or equipment, and it shall be unlawful thereafter for such owner or his agent to use or permit the use thereof. Said Inspector is also authorized to give to the person, firm or corporation furnishing electric energy to the wiring apparatus or equipment found to be in dangerous condition, notice to cease supplying the same until the defects complained of are repaired, and upon receipt of such notice, the furnishing of such electric energy shall terminate.

Section 9. For inspection of all installations of electric wiring, apparatus or equipment hereafter installed in the City of Ann Arbor, the Inspector shall be entitled to, and shall collect from the owner of the premises, etc., before the issuance of his certificate, the following fees, which shall at the end of the month in which they are collected be deposited with the City Treasurer. Report of each deposit with a list of inspections made and certificates issued, shall be made at the same time to the City Clerk.

Incandescent Lighting

For the inspection of a complete installation of circuits for incandescent lighting (concealed or open):
 One circuit or less\$1.00
 For each additional circuit..... .25

If additional circuits are installed after the original permit, the above fees will be collected as for a new installation, and a new permit will be issued.

For the inspection of one or more outlets added to a complete in-

stallation twenty-five cents each for the first four outlets. Outlets more than four in number shall be treated as a new installation.

Fixtures

For the inspection of fixtures for incandescent lamps, each fifty (50) sockets or fractional part thereof of \$1.00.

For arc lamps, stereopticon lamps, battery chargers, the first two, \$1.00.

Each additional, 25c.

The minimum fee collected for such work shall not be less than fifty cents (50). When more wiring or apparatus has been installed than specified in permit, a new permit will be necessary.

Section 10. All industrial and manufacturing plants or establishments, which are regularly inspected by the State Fire Marshals' department or State Factory Inspector's department, shall be inspected for the following fees to be paid annually on the first day in May: For all such plants or establishments using:

The payment of such sums shall be construed as a compliance with the terms of this ordinance.

Section 11. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than 100.00, together with the costs of prosecution, or in default thereof by imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, unless payment thereof be sooner made, and if imprisonment be adjudged in any case it shall be in the Common Jail of the County of Washtenaw, Michigan.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect on or after ten (10) days from date of legal publication thereof.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "AN ORDINANCE REGULATING RESTRICTING AND DISTRICTING THE LOCATION OF RESIDENCES, TRADES, INDUSTRIES, BUSINESSES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDINGS DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIED USES, AND ESTABLISHING THE BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS FOR THE SAID PURPOSES; ESTABLISHING HEIGHT AND AREA DISTRICTS; REGULATING AND DETERMINING THE AREA OF YARDS, COURTS AND OTHER OPEN PLACES SURROUNDING BUILDINGS; TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE DENSITY OF POPULATION; PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHING OF SETBACK LINES AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF SAID ORDINANCE. The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor, ordain:

Section 1. That section two of an ordinance entitled, An ordinance to amend an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance regulating, restricting and districting the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and establishing the boundaries of districts for the said purposes; establishing height and area districts; regulating and determining the area of yards, courts and other open spaces surrounding buildings, to regulate and limit the

density of population; providing for the establishing of set back lines and providing a penalty for the violation of said ordinance. Passed September 4, 1923; approved September 6, 1923; amended January 19, 1925; amended September 21, 1925; amended November 21, 1927; amended August 6, 1928; amended October 15, 1928, amended May 6, 1929," be and the same hereby are amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Use District and Height and Area Regulations.

In order to regulate and restrict the location of residences, trades, industries, businesses and the location of buildings designed for specified uses and in order to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered, and to regulate and determine the area of yards, courts and other open spaces surrounding buildings, and to regulate and limit the density of population; the City of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into districts, of which there shall be five (5) known as:

"A" Residence District.

"B" Residence District.

"C" Local Business District.

"D" Commercial District.

"E" Commercial and Industrial District.

The City of Ann Arbor is hereby divided into five districts as shown upon the map attached hereto and being made a part of this ordinance, being designated as the "Map of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, showing Districts for Use and Height and Area Regulations, as passed by the Common Council, Sept. 4, 1923, and amended by the terms hereof, and by the amendments of Jan. 19, 1925, Sept. 21, 1925, Nov. 21, 1927, Aug. 6, 1928, Oct. 6, 1928, May 6, 1929, said map and all notations, references and other information thereon shall be as much a part of this Ordinance as if the matters and information set forth by the said map were fully described herein.

Except as hereinafter provided no building shall be erected or altered nor shall any building or

premises be used for any purpose other than is permitted in the Use District in which such building or premises is located; neither shall any building be erected or altered except in conformity with the regulations herein established for the Height and Area District in which such building is located. No lot area shall be so reduced or diminished that the yards or open spaces shall be smaller than prescribed by this Ordinance.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after ten days from legal publication thereof.

Curb and Gutter Boundaries and Order of Assessments

By Ald. Schlenker:

Resolved that the following curbs gutters, in curb and gutter districts Nos. 157 to 161 inclusive, and Nos. 163 to 175 inclusive, within the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, heretofore ordered, in the opinion of the Common Council are and are hereby deemed and declared to be necessary public improvements.

Water Committee Report

Resolution by Ald. Schlenker

Whereas, the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor did on July 15th, A. D. 1929, send a communication to this Council requesting that this Council arrange for a bond issue of three hundred twenty-five thousand dollars, to recover contemplated improvements to the distribution system of the city water supply plant, and

Whereas, the afore-mentioned Water Commissioners have presented the following estimates of the cost of the contemplated improvements as follows:

- (1) 6,000,000 gallon, reinforced concrete covered reservoir with surface elevation at 10 feet higher elevation than present reservoir, with connection to water mains, \$110,000.00.
 - (2) Cast Iron trunk line water mains, \$150,000.00
 - (3) Connecting dead end mains and installing additional hydrants, \$45,000.00.
 - (4) Contingencies and engineering, \$20,000.00.
- Total, \$325,000.00

and have given the following explanation of the needs for the contemplated improvements and of the

benefits to be derived therefrom and also a plan for the payment of their costs, to-wit:

The six-million-gallon reservoir is to replace the present two-million gallon structure, which is an old open type structure and in bad condition. For years the old reservoir has not been considered safe to carry more than one million gallons storage and this amount is dangerously inadequate. The proposed new reservoir is to be of reinforced concrete and entirely covered and of sufficient capacity to insure the city against a shortage of water in the event of a bad fire. The covered reservoir will keep the water in better condition and at a lower and more uniform temperature.

The cast iron trunk line water mains are for strengthening and improving the distribution system and will insure adequate water at times of maximum demand to all parts of the city and at slightly better pressures, and at a much more uniform and satisfactory quality to all consumers.

The new trunk line mains together with the contemplated smaller connecting dead end mains will relieve the condition of stagnant water throughout the city and will improve the condition of the water to all consumers.

Your Water Board feels that these are badly needed improvements and are so laid out that they will work in with, and in fact be necessary to, any future developments of the water system.

The interest on the proposed bond issue, together with the retirement of the bonds, will be paid from the revenue of the Water Department and will not therefore in any way affect the taxes of the city; and

Whereas, these additions to the distribution system of the City Water Supply Plan are hereby declared to be a necessary public improvement and their period of usefulness is hereby determined to be a period of thirty (30) years or more;

Now, therefore, be it resolved, that at a special election to be held in the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, on Monday, the 30th day of September, A. D., 1929, the proposition of raising by loan the sum of \$325,000.00 be submitted to the qualified voters of this city.

Resolved, further, that the said election be held in the several wards and precincts in the city of Ann Arbor as follows:

First ward, voting room, in basement of City Hall; Second ward, ward building on South Ashley Street; Third ward, ward building on Miller avenue; Fourth ward, voting room in basement of Armory on North Fifth avenue; Fifth ward, ward building on Pontiac Street; Sixth ward, voting room, old Engine House on East University Avenue; Seventh ward, first precinct, City building on Mary Street; Seventh ward, second precinct, voting room in the Eberbach School, corner Wells Street and Forest Avenue.

Resolved, further, that the polls of said election be opened at the designated places from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P. M. Eastern Standard time.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized to give notice of the said election according to the law of the State of Michigan and the charter of the City of Ann Arbor and that he cause to be printed white paper ballots of equal width and length for the use of the electors at the said special election, which shall be in the following form:

"For the raising by loan the sum of \$325,000.00, and issuing the bonds of the City of Ann Arbor therefor, payable not more than 30 years from date of issue and bearing interest not exceeding six per cent per annum, said money when raised to be used for contemplated improvements and additions, by the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Ann Arbor, Michigan, including reservoir, trunk line water mains, connecting dead end mains, and additional hy-

drants, contingencies and engineering.

Resolved, further, that the City Clerk be and he is hereby directed to issue and publish the notice of registration of electors for said special election in compliance with the charter of the City of Ann Arbor, and that said clerk make all necessary arrangements for the registration of electors for the said special election.

D. 1919, did authorize the raising by a loan of the sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars, and the issuing of bonds of the City of Ann Arbor therefore, payable not more than ten years from the date of issue and bearing interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, for the purpose of installing a water meter system within the City of Ann Arbor; and

Whereas, this body is in receipt of a communication from the Board of Water Commissioners, in which said communication this body is advised that the bond issue, authorized as above stated, did mature on the first day of August, A. D. 1929, and in which said communication the said board recommends the issuance of serial refunding bonds, maturing in annual installments over a period of 20 years, to the amount of Seventy-

five Thousand Dollars, to the end that funds will be available to meet the aforesaid obligation; and,

Whereas, the estimated period of usefulness of the improvement for which the said bonds were issued is determined as thirty years, leaving the period of twenty years for the maturity of the serial refunding bonds, above referred to, according to the form of the statute in such case made and provided; and,

Whereas, it is the sense of this body that the recommendation of the said Board of Water Commissioners be concurred in and that the time of payment of the said outstanding Water Works Meter Bonds should be extended for a period of twenty years, by the issuance of serial refunding bonds, maturing at the rate of Four Thousand Dollars for the first fifteen years and Three Thousand Dollars for the remaining five years, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually;

Resolved, further, that the estimated period of usefulness of the improvement for which the original bonds were issued is hereby declared and determined to be 30 years and upwards, and the estimated period of usefulness of the improvement for which the refunding Bonds are issued is hereby declared and determined to be 20 years and upwards.

Resolved, further, that the bonds provided for in this resolution be furnished by the City of Ann Arbor, and that the said City also furnish to the purchaser thereof the opinion of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, as to the validity thereof.

Adopted by the following vote: Yeas, Ald. Graf, Schlenker, Harris, Allmendinger, Bradley, Kurth, Severance, Townley, Freeman, Fisher, 10. Nays, none.

Resolved by Alderman Schlenker; whereas, the electors of the City of Ann Arbor, by a vote of more than three-fifths of the votes cast at the regular election, duly held on the 10th day of April, A. D. 1919, did authorize the raising by a loan of the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars, and the issuing of bonds of the City of Ann Arbor therefor, payable not more than ten years from the date of issue and bearing interest not to exceed six per cent per annum, for the purpose of completing the installation and erection of the water works of the City of Ann Arbor; and,

Whereas, this body is in receipt of a communication from the Board of Water Commissioners, in which said communication this body is advised that the bond issue, authorized as above stated, did mature on the first day of August, A. D. 1929, and in which said communication the said board recommends the issuance of serial refunding bonds,

maturing in annual installments over a period of twenty years, to the amount of Forty-five Thousand Dollars, to the end that funds will be available to meet the aforesaid obligation; and,

Whereas, the estimated period of usefulness of the improvement for which the said bonds were issued is determined as thirty years, leaving the period of twenty years for the maturity of the serial refunding bonds, above referred to, according to the form of the statute in such case made and provided; and,

Whereas, it is the sense of this body that the recommendation of the said Board of Water Commissioners be concurred in and that the time of payment of the said outstanding Water Works Completion Bonds should be extended for a period of twenty years, by the issuance of serial refunding bonds, maturing at the rate of two thousand dollars for the first fifteen years and three thousand dollars for the remaining five years, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually;

Now therefore, it is hereby resolved that bonds of the city of Ann Arbor be issued in the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars for the purpose aforesaid; that said bonds be forty-five in number and in denominations of One Thousand Dollars each, numbered consecutively from one to forty-five; that said bonds be dated August 1, 1929, and become due as follows: Two Thousand Dollars thereof annually for a period of fifteen years, and Three Thousand Dollars thereof annually for a period of five years, with interest thereon at a rate not to exceed four and one-half per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of February and August of each year, as evidenced by interest coupons to be thereto attached, bearing the lithographed or printed signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk of the City of Ann Arbor,

both principal and interest to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer, located at the City Hall, in the City of Ann Arbor, County of Washtenaw and State of Michigan;
