Gentlemen—Some time ago, the matter of the occupancy of a portion of North Fifth Avenue by the warehouse of the Hammond Beef Company was referred to me. I have investigated concerning this matter and find that the building in question is within the boundaries of the street as originally laid out. My information is that this portion of North Fifth avenue was duly dedicated to the city and accepted, and if this be true, I am of the opinion that the building in question is unlawfully in the street.

I may add further that it is claimed that the building has been constructed for more than fifteen years, and possibly the owners of the building may assert a claim by right of adverse possession. However, our charter provides that title to land in a street cannot be obtained by adverse possession and the validity of this provision has been established by the supreme court.
