Communication from the Mayor.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—I respectfully return to your honorable body without my approval so much of the proceedings of your last regular session of Monday, January 18th, as is included in the recommendation of your sanitary committee relative to enforcement of the garbage ordinance, and approved by resolution of the council.

The primary purpose of the garbage ordinance is to enforce proper sanitary conditions within the city limits, and from such information as I am able to obtain from people in general in all parts of the city, I think it is being fairly well and peaceably done and more thoroughly than ever before, which indicates that progress is being made, and that, too, without any serious friction or opposition from any quarter. The enforcement of your resolution in its letter and spirit would bring about expensive and annoying litigation without compensating advantages. A more complete enforcement of all details of the garbage ordinance will be had as time goes on, I am convinced, without any drastic action at this time, under the present energetic efforts of the health officer and the health board, and in whose hands the matter rightfully and legally rests.

Since the ordinance places enforcement of the garbage law within the jurisdiction of the health board and the health officer, it appears to me that they should be permitted to carry out their commission without interference, at least until it is demonstrated that they are making no satisfactory progress.

Ordinance Committee.

Ald. Manwaring presented an ordinance, entitled: "An Ordinance Relative to the Poor of the City of Ann Arbor," as follows:

An Ordinance Relative to the Poor of the City of Ann Arbor.

The Common Council of the City of Ann Arbor ordain:

Sec. 1. All the powers and duties connected with and incident to the relief and care of the poor of the city of Ann Arbor shall be exercised by the poor committee of the Common Council under such regulations as the Common Council of the city of Ann Arbor shall from time to time provide.

Sec. 2. There shall be a Poor Commissioner and a City Physician appointed by the Common Council and they shall hold office for the term of one year, and until their successors are appointed and qualified, the said term to commence on the first Monday of March, 1909, and every year thereafter.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Poor Commissioner to keep on record in his office the names of all persons receiving or having received charitable aid from the City, which record shall show the kind and quantity of aid, and medical attendance, furnished to each applicant for relief. Said record shall be at all times open to the inspection of the Mayor, Common Council, City Controller or any committee or member of the Common Council.

Sec. 4. The said Poor Commissioner

provisions, fuel and supplies for distribution among the poor under the advice and direction of the Poor Committee. And in no case shall the Poor Commissioner purchase supplies or provisions to exceed the sum of ten dollars at any one time without the consent of the Poor Committee, or a majority thereof. No purchase of fuel or other supplies amounting to over twenty-five dollars shall be made without submitting the proposed purchase to the Common Council.

Sec. 5. The said Poor Commissioner shall have power to receive and dispose donations for the relief of the poor, but in his monthly statements to the City Clerk, as hereinafter provided, he shall report in detail all cash donations and the distribution of the same. He may act in conjunction with any society or organization for charitable purposes in the city of Ann Arbor and when permitted shall examine the register of all persons receiving relief from such society or organization.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the said Poor Commissioner, when any person being a city pauper shall, by himself, or shall have power to purchase clothing, self or another, apply for relief, to personally make immediate inquiry into the state and circumstances of the applicant and if it shall appear that he or she is in such indigent circumstances as to require prompt support (and is not so sick, diseased, lame or otherwise disabled as he or she can not safely be removed) to remove such person to the Poor House to be relieved and cared for as his or her necessity may require; but if such person can not safely be removed for any of the reasons hereinbefore specified, the said Poor Commissioner may afford such persons relief under the provision of this ordinance until such time as he or she can be so removed and if it shall appear that any person applying for relief as aforesaid requires only temporary or partial support the said Poor Commissioner shall afford him or her such relief as the circumstances of the case may require; such temporary or partial support shall be given in provisions, clothing or fuel to be delivered to such applicant at the place where he or she resides.

Sec. 7. Whenever from sickness or other disability the City Physician shall deem it necessary to place any city pauper in a hospital, he shall do so by removing such pauper to a free bed in one of the university hospitals. Provided, however, that if for any reason, it shall be necessary to place a pauper patient in a private room, then it shall be the duty of the City Physician to place the said patient in a private room in one of the University hospitals, the extra cost to be paid by the Poor Commissioner.

Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the City Poor Commissioner to give to the paupers needing medical aid an order in writing therefor on the City Physician, whose duty it shall be to administer such medical aid when so directed. It shall be the duty of the City Physician to make personal investigation and keep proper records and report to the Common Council when requested the condition as to health and the names of all paupers in hospitals, asylums, or house of refuge, receiving aid from the city of Ann Arbor.

Sec. 9. The Poor Commissioner shall have power, when deemed proper, to procure railroad tickets for paupers who may wish to leave permanently the city and county.

Sec. 10. If any person or persons shall bring to live within the limits of the city any person or persons, poor and unable to maintain themselves and likely to become a public charge, they shall forthwith or as soon as may be thereafter, transport the same to the place whence they were taken and shall provide all the means of comfort and subsistence for such paupers, if requested by them, or by any citizen until so transported. Any violation of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars and costs; and in the imposition of any fine and costs, the court may make a further sentence, that in default of the payment thereof within a time to be fixed by such sentence, the offender may be imprisoned in the Detroit house of correction or in the county jail for the county of Washtenaw for any period of time not exceeding three months.

Sec. 11. In cases where the applicant for relief from the Poor Commissioner shall be considered able to labor, but for any satisfactory reason cannot procure employment, the Poor Commissioner may require such applicant to perform such labor in the city wood yard or elsewhere to such an extent as the said Poor Commissioner may deem a just compensation for the aid or support afforded to such applicant and to any such applicant refusing to perform any such labor the Poor Commissioner may refuse aid and support.

Sec. 12. The Poor Commissioner shall make monthly reports to the City Clerk, said reports to be first approved by the Poor Committee.

Sec. 13. It shall be the duty of the City Physician when directed by the Poor Commissioner to attend any sick, disabled, or infirm person who may be a charge on the city, for any medicine required or surgical dressings necessary, the City Physician shall procure the same at any drug store or give an order to the patient for such medical supplies or any drug store in the city, and said drugs to be paid for by the city on the approval by the City Physician.

Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the City Physician to vaccinate without charge any indigent inhabitant of the City of Ann Arbor, not previously vaccinated within five years, who may apply for that purpose, and he shall also give certificates of vaccination to such persons as may have been vaccinated by him.

Sec. 15. The City Physician and the Poor Commissioner shall receive such compensation for their services as the Common Council may by resolution provide.

Sec. 16. No person shall be eligible to the office of the City Physician who has not received a diploma from a reputable medical college and is a licensed practitioner in this state and county and unless such person shall have at least one year's experience as a practicing physician in the City of Ann Arbor, and shall have been a bona fide resident of the City

of Ann Arbor for at least one year immediately preceding such appointment.

Sec. 17. All complaints against the City Physician or Poor Commissioner shall be made to the Poor Committee who shall investigate the same, and if found necessary, report the result to the Common Council, with their opinion thereon. And the said City Physician and Poor Commissioner may be removed from office as are other officers as provided in the city charter.

Sec. 18. In case of the absence or inability, from any cause of the City Physician to attend to his duties he shall with the consent of the Poor Commissioner, provide at his own expense a competent physician to fill his place.

Sec. 19. In cases where a patient desires another physician and such other physician volunteers his services without expense to the city the City Physician may allow such patients to have the services of such physician, but the city shall, under no circumstances be responsible for such services of such physician or for any drugs or supplies and such patients shall at all times be under no supervision of the City Physician. The City Physician shall determine when each patient shall be discharged from such hospital and notify the superintendent or the proper officers thereof, whereupon the liability of the city shall cease.

Sec. 20. No person shall be treated at any hospital or by the City Physician or receive any aid or assistance from the Poor Commissioner who is not at the time of the application thereto an actual and bona fide resident of the City of Ann Arbor, for at least one year except upon the special order of the Common Council.

Sec. 21. The offices of City Physician and Poor Commissioner as existing prior to the first Monday in March, 1909, are hereby abolished.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after the first Monday in March, A. D., 1909.
