Dear Sirs:

We have petitioned for curb and gutter on Washington Heights from Observatory Street to Glen Boulevard. The University have signified to you their willingness to pay their share of cost for such curb and gutter. The fact that so many petitions have been received that it would be impossible to comply with all of them and that the curb and gutter on Washington Heights would undoubtedly not be constructed by the City this year has been called to our attention. We expect by some time in October to have twenty-one houses completed and occupied on this Street. Unless curb and gutter can be built and the Street gravelled, it will be impassable during the winter. Can we not make arrangements to have this work done, paying for it ourselves and have the City's portion refunded to us by the City next year?
