When the Michigan Bell Telephone case was heard before the Michigan State Utilities Commission in January, 1923, the writer, then Director of Public Service of the City of Grand Rapids, put in testimony in behalf of all the cities in Michigan with the exception of the City of Detroit.

I, also, assisted Messrs. John Farley, City Attorney of Flint, and Ganson Taggart, City Attorney of Grand Rapids, in preparing the engineering information contained in the various briefs submitted in behalf of the cities, both to the Utilities Commission, and, also, before the Master appointed by the State Supreme Court to hear the appeal from a decision of the Utilities Commission.

About May 1st, the Utilities Commission will again furnish the cities with the appraisals, operating statements, etc., of the Michigan Bell Company, brought up to a recent date and hearings will again be held on a new case.

It seems especially important at this time for the cities again to take an active interest in this situation, for the reason, that the City of De-

troit, in the last hearing before the Commission some two months ago, took an independent stand for itself, loading onto the paying exchanges in the balance of the State all the unpaying small exchanges.

The City of Grand Rapids, while I was Director of Public Service, and, also since I am in independent practice as Consulting Engineer, has gladly furnished my services during the previous case, but it only seems reasonable that in this new case, an attempt be made to have the other cities join in the expense of presenting the municipal side of this case at the next hearing.

Acting, therefore, on the suggestion of City Attorney Taggart of Grand Rapids, I have apportioned the approximate expense of \$4,500 among the fourteen cities whose City Attorneys joined with Messrs. Farley and Taggart in signing the brief presented in behalf of the municipalities in the last Michigan Bell case.

I have developed this allocation of expense among the various cities on the basis of the census of 1920 and according to this, the expense to your city would be approximately \$180.00.

I would be glad if you would kindly give this matter your consideration and advise me as to your desires in this matter.

May 7, 1918, amended July 6 1920 amended April 18, 1921, amended May 1, 1922, amended May 7, 1923, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6 After such determination the city clerk shall forthwith certify such resolution, so fixing the boundaries of such assessment district, with the estimated costs of such improvement, exclusive of such portions of said estimated costs less than the whole thereof, as the common council may have determined should be assessed on the owners of the real estate adjacent to said proposed curb and gutter, which shall not be more than eighty per cent exclusive of street intersections, to the city assessor of said city who shall without delay proceed to make a special assessment roll in which he shall set down all of the lands and tenements situated in said special assessment district liable to taxation, under the proper description and with the names of the owners or occupants, also the number of front feet of each owner abutting on said proposed curb and gutter and shall assess to the owners or occupants of each and against each parcel of said land so liable to taxation such sums of money as shall be equal pro rata share per front foot of all property abutting thereon.

Sec. 2. This amendment shall apply to all petitions hereafter received by said City of Ann Arbor and shall be in full force and effect ten days after legal publication thereof.
