Annual Report of Water Works Dept.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and Common Council of the City of

Ann Arbor, Michigan:

Gentlemen—The Board of Water Commissioners have the honor to present herewith the thirteenth An-, nual Report of the Water Works Department covering the fiscal year from Feb. 1, 1926, to Jan. 31, 1927. The past year has been in general a very satisfactory year.

At the close of the last fiscal year a water works expert was employed by your honorable body at our request to make a survey and report of the requirements of the ron River. Water Works Department, pertainwater supply. Maury & Gordon, Consulting Engineers of Chicago, Illnois, were engaged and their report was filed with your honorable body during the year.

The law suit brought about by farmers near the Steere Farm Pumping Station was satisfactorily settled by the decision of the Supreme Court. There are two very important problems now before us. First, an adequate and satisfactory

Moore, water supply; Second, additions to Pres. the distribution system to improve the pressure and fire protection and to provide feeders for future extensions. These will be discussed under proper headings in the following:

Law Suits:

The law suit against the City brought by Carrie Davison and others which included a majority of the property owners joining the city pumping station property at the Steere Farm, was decided by the Circuit Court last year that there was no cause for action and the injunction asked for which was to close down the pumping station was denied. The State Supreme Court confirmed this decision. This is the first time since the oper-C. C. Freeman, B. H. Graf, C. was Water Supply:

During the past year the water Ald. Slauson, Jocelyn, Maulbetsch, supply was obtained from the No. Graf, Sweet, Lucas, Dwyer, Ham- 3 (Steere Farm) and No. 1 (River) mial, Moore, Bursley, Freeman, Pumping Stations. The No. 3, or Lutz, Pres. Woodbury, 13. Nays, Steere Farm Pumping Station furnished 93%, and the No. 1, or River Pumping Station furnished 7% of the total water used in the city. About 2% of the water furnished by the No. 1 Pumping Station was from the Huron River and about 5% from artesian wells. The water supply from the No. 3 or Steere Farm Pumping Station is entirely dependent upon rainfall. Last year the rainfall tensity and distribution was such as to give a sufficient supply from the artesian wells, with the exception of the month of July when the extreme hot and dry weather increased the consumption to such an extent that it was necessary to supply the deficiency from the Hu-

The water supply from the arteing principally to the future of the sian wells requires no treatment for harmful bacteria. The Huron River supply is treated with liquid chlorine at the pumping station for the elimination of harmful bacteria. Daily samples of water are tested by the City Chemist and the treatment of the river water when used is adjusted to maintain City water free from harmful bacteria. The quantity of water pumped during the last year increased 19.5% over the previous year. The

4,540,000 gallons per day. creased continually since when the meters were installed. This continual increase in the amount of water pumped indicates that a new water supply which is safe for domestic use at all times of the year will be required within the next few years, and immediate steps should be taken in regard to construction of such a water supply. While the river water is clear the present sterilized river supply which augments the artesian water supply is fairly satisfactory, but in the spring of the year and after heavy rains the river water is very turbid and contains a very large quantity of mud and sediment. In the past few years it has been possible to only supply river water when it was clear, but with the continual increase of water consumption we will soon be in a position when we will not be able to select the time when river water is pumped, so that if a filtration plant is not built to remove this mud and sediment it will be necessary to pump this water into the mains. On Sept. 3, 1926, we sent a communication to your honorable body which incorporated the following:

That the Steere Farm, or No. 3 Pumping Station, be operated to the maximum capacity of the wells.

That to agument the Steere Farm supply a filtration plant of 6 million gallons per day capacity be constructed at No. 1 Pumping Station to supply filtered river water which will be safe and palatable.

It is our opinion that this is a sure, safe and practical way to solve our water supply problem, and in fact is the only real solution that takes into account future

growth of the City.

There are a number of springs within the City Limits and some a short distance outside of the city which supply small quantities of water and are subject to the same variation in flow as other ground water supplies depending on the amount of rainfall. As the maximum demand for water in the city is in the dry periods when these springs give their minimum flow they do not yield sufficient quanti-

Pumping Plants:

The No. 1 Pumping Station is located near Barton Dam about one-half mile outside the Northwest corner of the City. This station has installed two electric motor driven centrifugal pumps, one of 5 million gallons per day capacity and one of 7 million gallons per day capacity, and one steam driven pumping engine of 2,500,000 gallons per day capacity.

The No. 3 Pumping Station located about three miles South of the city on State Street at the so-called Steere Farm, has installed two electric motor driven centrifugal pumps of 3,700,000 gallons per day capacity each. The total daily pumping capacity of the two city plants is therefore 21,900,000 gallons per day, thus providing adequate reserve pumping capacity in each pumping plant.

Additional water supply will eventually require additional pump-

ing equipiment.

Distribution System:

During the year there were 11144 feet of new main laid, which is only one-third of the amount laid the previous year. There were 9 new fi're hydrants added. All water mains were laid by the Water Works Department. The high level districts in the Southeast and west sides of the city continue to have poor pressure during the periods of maximum demand. This condition will continue to grow worse and can be remedied by feeder trunk line mains. The City has been expanding so rapidly that additional trunk line mains are now necessary to continue to give good service and fire protection.

The reservoir is small and open. It should be enlarged so as to hold more water, should be raised to increase the pressure and should be covered. This can only be done by completely rebuilding the present reservoir or the construction of a

new one.

Population Served:

The Water Works Department

supplies water to the inhabitants of capacity be constructed to the low the corporate limits of the city of Ann Arbor. From statistics compiled by the Ann Arbor Times News the present population is 27,712 inhabitants and in 1920 the census gave 19,516, a gain of 42% in seven years. During this period the gain in domestic water services was 65.8% and a gain of 74% in the amount of water pumped. figures give some idea of the problems confronting this Department. Meters:

All customers taking water from the Water Works System are metered. The water used for the flush tanks of the sewer system, street washing, flushing of water mains and for fire fighting purposes is not During the past year there were 261 new meters added and 305 new taps made.

Financial:

The net revenues of the water Works Department during the past fiscal year being the gross revenue from the sale of water less discounts from refunds amounts to \$175,705.50 as compared w ith \$158,-528.48 of last year, or an increase of 10.8%; while the operating expenses of the Department amounted to \$53,710.53 compared with \$53,-695.25, an actual increase of less than 1%.

The revenues of the Water Works Department have been sufficient to pay all operating and maintenance expenses, the interest on outstanding bonds, the principal of the bonds that fell due, a sinking fund for the retirement of future bonds as they became due, and a surplus sufficient for current extensions to the water distribution system.

Recommendations:

After a careful study of the water question by your Water Commissioners and after investigating all sources of supply, we make the following recommendations:

1. That the Steere Farm, or No. 3 Pumping Station, be operated to the maximum capacity of the wells.

- 2. That to augment the Steere Farm suply a filtration plant of 6 million gallons per day capacity be constructed at No. 1 Pumping Station to supply filtered river water which will be safe and palatable.
- 3. Chubb Road reservoir be enlarged, concreted and covered.
 - That supply mains of large

5 That your honorable body supply funds in the amount of \$678,-400 to meet the above improvements, which will satisfy the present requirements of the works system and which will be of sufficient capacity, we believe, for 10 years in the future with our present rate of growth. Both principal and interest of money borrowed for the Water Department can be paid from revenues of the Department.

Conclusions:

In conclusion we would commend to you the efficient and willing co-operation of the employes of the Water Works Department who have contributed so largely to the successful and economical operation of the Water Works Sys-
